CITY SCHOOL HEAD HAS SORE HAND

Aubrey G. Smith, superintendent of the public schools, who had planned to leave early this week to attend the U. of O. summer school, has postponed going there indefinitely because of suffering with a bad case of blood poisoning in his left hand, which started from a little scratch a week ago and gradually spread, causing his hand and forearm to swell greatly. It was feared for a time that the consequences would be serious, but the condition is better now following an operation performed yesterday to afford relief. Until the swelling has subsided and there is no longer danger, Superintendent Smith will not leave for Eugene.

FRENCH IN FAVOR OF RETURN MATCH

PARIS, June 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Public sentiment in France is in favor of a return match between Georges Carpentier and Jack Dempsey, according to a vote taken of the sports newspaper L'Auto.

In this poll, 15,783 voted yes, and 5,227 no, to the query "Is a Carpentier-Dempsey return match desirable?"

Carpentier's plan for other bouts do not take Harry Greb, the American light heavy weight, into consideration. In fact he displays an unexplained annoyance when the Pittsburgh fighter's name is mentioned.

ANOTHER BOARD FOR THIS STATE URGED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—Miss Evelyn Gail Gardner, executive secretary of the social welfare league of Seattle, advocated creation of a state board for public welfare in addressing the annual conference of social workers associations of Oregon here today. She said this would go a step further than the child welfare commission.

Discussion of the proposed removal from its location near the state prison and the school for the feeble minded, of the boys industrial school at Salem, for which an appropriation was made at the last session of the legislature, occupied delegates who believed another location would be more advantageous.

NEW CHINA RULE MEETS BAPTISM OF FIRE AND BLOOD

PEKING, June 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—The newly established republican regime in China, apparently is receiving that baptism of blood without which few new governments have fixed themselves in power. Between ten thousand and fifteen thousand troops of the forces under Wu Pei-Fu, chief military leader of the new government, have mutilated and slain "thousands" of persons in Kiangsi province, according to reports reaching here.

So far, reports of the mutinies are vague, but those telling of the broad extent of the mutineer's ruthlessness apparently are authentic. Today's dispatches indicate that the situation in that province is worse, if anything, than it was last night.

Reports of activities of the mutinous troops received from Hankow and Nanchang stated that the mutineers were led by General Tsai Chen-Hsun, military commander of Peking, who was leading his men northward and approaching Changshu Ki.

PHILIPPINES ARE DENIED FREEDOM

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(By Associated Press.)—President Harding told members of the Philippine parliamentary committee today, that he could not urge upon congress the desirability of Philippine independence.

Members of the mission who called on the president today at his request to receive a reply to the independence petition presented last Friday, said the executive indicated that he was not unalterably opposed to Philippine autonomy but regarded the matter as a question of time.

MARKET PRICES BY RADIO IN FORCE

CHICAGO, June 22.—Market information, including cattle prices, fruit, vegetables and dairy product quotations and weather reports are included in a 3,200 word radio report broadcast daily from the Great Lakes Remote central station according to an announcement by Jonah H. informed the women that he would never be taken alive. About 4:30 o'clock Mrs. West summoned up courage and telephoned to Plainview for Harry De Atley. West asked De Atley to tell the coroner to come and get the bodies of his two victims, but said that if anyone else should attempt to enter the yard he would shoot him.

De Atley immediately left the ranch with his wife and two children and telephoned officers here what had taken place.

District Attorney L. G. Lewelling and Coroner E. Foshier, with a large posse of men left for the West ranch about six p. m., and another posse was dispatched from Brownsville under the leadership of Deputy Sheriff Hume. These posse united under direction of Van Sitt, ex-sheriff who posted a cordon around the ranch house to prevent any attempt of West to escape.

The bodies of Sheriff Kendall and Rev. Mr. Healy and that of their slayer were brought to Albany early today.
