Chinook salmon were jammed in a solid mass for a distance of one and one-half miles below Gold Ray dam, one Hogue river, when officials of the state game commission removed the blockade at the fish ladders last Saturday, according to Captain A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden who returned today. The Gold Ray ladders had been blocked to prevent salmon going up stream until the federal fish racks at Trail could be repaired. The repairs have been in progress for a month. Burghdoff estimated the salmon run to be the largest ever recorded in the Hogue river. He also said that the extent of the run at Gold Ray dam refuted claims that the ladders over Savage Rapids dam near Grants Pass were inefficient.—Portland Journal.
