

MADALYNNE IN FRAME-UP, IS CONVICT'S CLAIM

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—Paul Roman, an inmate of Folsom prison, on a felony charge, testified for the prosecution today that while he was confined in the county jail here last year, Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain "framed up" a story that he was to testify that J. Belton Kennedy was killed by two men who were trying to blackmail him.

Roman testified in the afternoon that he had known Mrs. Obenchain before her arrest, and that they had made several trips together to beaches and other places. Since being imprisoned at San Quentin and Folsom, he said he had corresponded with her, and he identified several letters as being from her.

These letters were written in an extremely friendly tone. They called him "Dear Paul" and were signed "Madalynne." In the first of them the writer says she was not able to sleep after he was taken from the county jail to the state prison. "I can't tell you how my heart aches for you," it read. "Is there anything I can do to make you happy?"

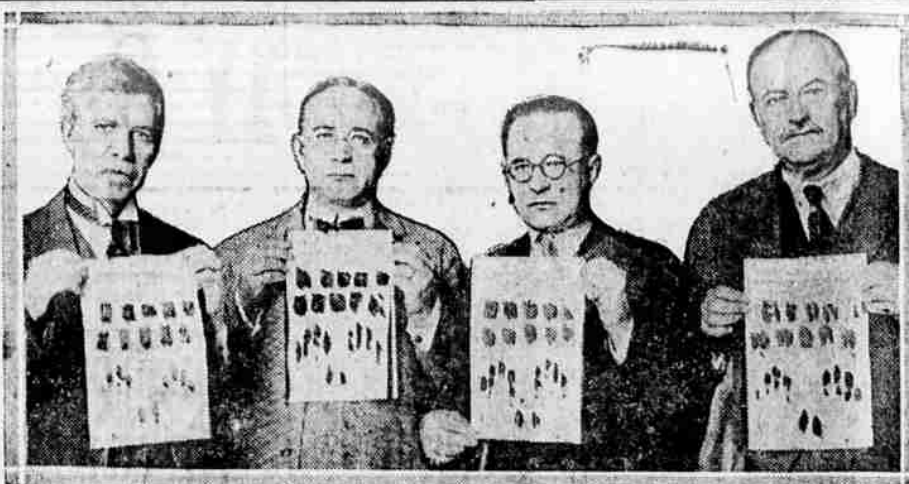
ALL PRISON MADE GOODS UNIFORMED

WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 23.—Line representatives of manufacturing interests in the state of Washington, three each from Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma, headed by George Black of Seattle, will visit the state prison here on June 29th to investigate the entire program of industrial work by prisoners proposed by Warden Pace, according to an announcement of Mr. Pace today. This investigation will precede the meeting here of superintendents of state institutions, announced in Olympia Tuesday, for the purpose of standardizing the goods being made at the prison for use of inmates of state institutions. The manufacturers are said to oppose any extensive plan of manufacturing goods at the state prison.

CHECK UP DEAD LIST AT HERRIN

CHICAGO, June 23.—The Hargrave secret service, which sent 30 guards to Herrin, Illinois, for the Lester Strip mine, where the rioting occurred yesterday, this morning announced they could account for only two men, A. P. Finley and an unidentified man, the latter beaten into an unrecognizable condition and for a time believed dead, were in the hospital at Herrin, it was said. Other unconfirmed reports from Herrin were that Sidney Morrison, one of the agency's men, was mortally wounded and that three others had been wounded.

VIRGINIA MINERS ON STRIKE SHOW UPRISING SIGNS

CLARKESBURG, W. Va., June 23.—The Harris county court late today authorized Sheriff Local Young to deputize one thousand men to assist him to preserve order in connection with the miners strike in this region. The court took up the question after it received reports of an attack by a mob on a street car carrying non-union miners and officials of the Hudson Coal company. Two men were killed in the fight.

FAIRMONT, W. Va., June 23.—A crowd of men which the authorities estimated at 400 marched through the principal streets of Fairmont this morning across the Monongahela river to the east side of the city. County officials watched the situation on reports that they were headed for working coal mines near North Fairmont. Later it was reported that the marchers had passed working mines at Norwood without making any effort to disturb the miners. It was said the men were going to Montann, W. Va., to attend a union meeting.

NEW YORK, June 23.—The athletic commission revoked the license of Johnny Wilson of Boston, middle-weight champion on the ground that he had failed to meet Harry Greb of Pittsburgh in a match scheduled for Madison Square Garden last January.

EARLY PEACE NEAR IN MINER'S WAR

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Inability to bring about an agreement between the operators and miners as to the territorial scope of the proposed conference had block results until recently. Secretary of Labor Davis said, but something definite is expected within a few days. The secretary indicated that the operators were about to agree to a centralized conference involving the Central competitive fields.

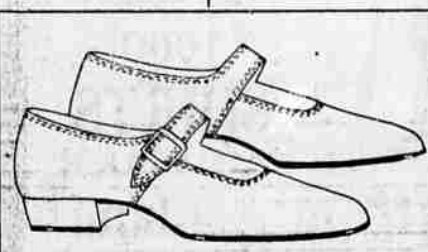
