

TARIFF TO BREED FLOCK OF TRUSTS DEMOCRAT CLAIM

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The prediction that another era of trust formation would follow passage of the administration tariff bill was made today in the senate by Senator Hitchcock, democrat of Nebraska. He charged that the real purpose of the measure was to shut out imports in many commodities and give a monopoly to favored manufacturers so they could increase prices at the expense of the American consumer.

"Time after time in this decision," the Nebraska senator said, "high tariff schedules have been defended as necessary to check imports from Germany. Time after time German competition has been given as the reason for raising the tariffs. The settled purpose of the authors of this bill seems to have been to attack German trade and make it impossible for German imports to enter the country."

JAPAN DECIDES TO LEAVE SIBERIA

TOKIO, June 23.—The Japanese cabinet today decided that Japan shall evacuate Siberia, according to reports received by the Japanese news agencies. The decision has been referred to the imperial diplomatic council.

The cabinet decision to withdraw from Siberia is declared to constitute a reaffirmation of Japan's policy in that country. The date of evacuation will not be fixed until after the matter has been considered by the diplomatic advisory council tomorrow.

COYOTES IN RADIO ON WESTERN AREAS

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 23.—The most serious situation to arise west of the Cascade mountains in reference to depredations of coyotes had been found near Mossy Rock in Lewis county, according to Glenn R. Bach, federal predatory animal inspector here today. E. H. Lester, a resident there, lost 57 sheep and 20 goats within three weeks, representing about 75 per cent of the flock. Efforts to capture the coyotes by drives failed utterly and a regularly employed federal hunter was assigned to this territory. Dr. Bach said a trap line had been run around the Lester place and it is believed that the marauders will soon be destroyed.

DR. SUN YAT SEN ON WARSHIP, NOT ON RUN, IS CLAIM

AMOIY, China, June 23.—(By the Associated Press)—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of the South China republic, variously reported as attacking Canton, fleeing that city for Shanghai and a prisoner of the United China forces, is aboard one of his own warships at Canton. Negotiations are proceeding for his departure.

His wife, reported a prisoner of Wu Pei-fu's forces, has escaped to Hong Kong. This information was telegraphed here from Canton.

Bombardment of Canton has ceased with the refusal of gunners of Sun Yat Sen's navy to continue their attacks.

Cheung Chung-Ming's troops are advancing north along the railway and river to intercept Sun Yat Sen's troops.
