HOODED CAP NO EMBLEM FOR G. O. P.

Editor Ingalls of Corvallis Delivers Speech Against K. K. at Meeting State Republican Committee—Captain Gown of Burns Is Ready to Lead Fight.

PORTLAND, June 24.—Republican leaders from every section of the state were in session here today to organize the republican state central committee. After hours devoted to organization and oratory, the session adjourned until this afternoon when officers were to be elected.

Thomas H. Tongue, Jr., of Hillsboro, chairman, presided. Tongue had indicated that he did not wish to succeed himself and there were seven names mentioned in talk concerning a new chairman. At a caucus last night, the chairmanship was offered to state senator L. A. Patterson, one of the candidates for the republican nomination for governor at the recent primaries, but he refused to accept. A minority of those present then indicated they favored Walter L. Toole, Jr., of McMinnville.

There was, however, an element among the delegates opposed to Toole.

After chairman Tongue called the meeting to order today and urged that the party must hold together in the fall with a united front, State Secretary Clarence R. Hotchkiss made his report. Committees named were:

Credentials—E. E. Blanchard, Grants Pass; W. G. D. Mercer, Eugene; C. E. Woodson, Morrow county; B. W. Johnson, Benton county and John Cochran, Portland.

Resolutions—George Neuner Roseburg; Willard L. Marks, Albany; A. A. Bailey, Portland; S. S. Smith, Medford and W. G. Trill, Forest.

C. E. Ingalls of Corvallis, speaking at the session this morning pleaded for party unity and declared the primary law should be changed so that democrats could not vote the republican ticket. He stirred applause when he said:

"The emblem of the republican party in Oregon should not be the Rosary and the Cross; it should not be the white gown and the hooded cap. I want to say that the emblem of the republicans in this state should be the grand old party elephant, the emblem of Garfield, McKinley, Roosevelt, Taft and Harding."

"I will give the last lock of my old gray hair to help put the K. K. out of politics and in its place," shouted Captain A. W. Gowan of Burns.

Captain Walter Eddy, recently elected chairman of the Multnomah county central committee, made a plea for peace.

F. D. McCully of Joseph, declared the party has a real fight to carry eastern Oregon. He stated that the national government, through various ex-service men's commissions and farm loan boards, was not doing the party any good by its rulings.

Walter Lynn, W. F. Dennis, and others made short talks.

3 Killed Canadian Storm, Damage Great

WINNIPEG, Man., June 24.—The death list resulting from the destructive wind storm which swept Manitoba early yesterday still stood at three this morning. Property damage at Portage La Prairie and surrounding district was estimated at more than 2,000,000. Damage here ran into hundreds of thousands of dollars and it is believed the total property loss will be in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000.

Victim of 30-Cent Assault Portland, Dies From Injuries

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—Edward Cushman, 64 years old, piano finisher, died at a hospital early today from a fractured skull, suffered as a result of being knocked down following an argument over a 30 cent difference in his pay check last Monday, according to reports to Deputy District Attorney John Mowry.

George Kern, 22 year old bookkeeper of a local music house, who was alleged to have struck Cushman, left the city, but his attorney has advised Mowry that he will return and place himself at the disposal of the authorities.

G. DARNEILLE IS KILLED BY 40 FT. FALL

Well Known Medford Man and Trusted Lineman of California-Oregon Power Co. Instantly Killed at Corner of Central and Jackson Streets—Hand Slipped From Pole.

Grover Darnelle, 35 years of age, and one of the oldest linemen for the California-Oregon Power company, from a standpoint of service, was killed instantly this morning at 8:10 o'clock when he fell 40 feet from a pole at the corner of North Central and Jackson streets.

Work on the new pole was just complete, all the lines having been fastened to the insulators and Darnelle had just unsnapped his safety belt preparatory to coming down the pole. He had hold of the pole with one hand and was about to attach the loose end of the safety belt to his belt. In order to do this it was necessary to change the hold on the pole from one hand to the other. Just before changing his grip, his hand slipped and his climbers held fast. He was leaning from the pole and as his feet were held in a stationary position by the climbers, he fell head first, his feet remaining stationary until his head had reached a lower level and had pulled the spikes of the climbers from their seat in the wooden pole.

Killed Instantly.
He struck the cement sidewalk on Central Ave., 40 feet below head first and was killed instantly. The fellow workers on Frank Stinson's crew rushed to his aid, but nothing could be done. One man was coming down the pole at the time of the fall and Darnelle fell past him while another of his fellow workers was close to the base of the pole and took several quick steps in an effort to catch him before he struck the ground.

A brace used for boring holes for bolts was lying on the sidewalk and was hit squarely by the back of Darnelle's head. The wooden handle, which one grasps in order to turn the brace, was smashed completely by the impact.

Leaves Wife, 2 Children.
No lines closer than 20 feet to Darnelle were carrying a charge of electricity and the accident is therefore not attributed in any way to an electric shock. Darnelle was one of the company's best linemen and had been climbing poles for years.

The work was being done early in the morning in order to inconvenience none of the persons whose power was cut off and the new pole was set in order to allow the north-west street corner of Central to be cut off so that the intersection might be enlarged.

W. ROCKEFELLER ONE OF RICHEST MEN IN U.S. DEAD

Brother of John D. Passes After Short Illness—In Public Eye During Money Trust Probe—Death Will Have No Effect On Stock Market.

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., June 24.—(By Associated Press). William Rockefeller, oil magnate and brother of John D. Rockefeller, died here today from pneumonia, shortly before 7 o'clock.

Mr. Rockefeller had been ill at his home, Rockwood Hall, in north Tarrytown since Sunday but word of his condition was not made public.

Five doctors, under the charge of Mr. Rockefeller's personal physician, Dr. W. J. Robertson, were in attendance when he died.

Practically the entire Rockefeller family was assembled at the death bed.

Mr. Rockefeller, who contracted a heavy cold during the rains of the last week-end, had just completed building a \$250,000 mausoleum in the Sleepy Hollow cemetery, according to his own plans and under his personal direction.

Mr. Rockefeller, who was 81 years old had not recently been active in business, although he was active head of the Standard Oil company of New York from its establishment in 1865, until 1911. Although somewhat overshadowed by his elder brother, John D. Rockefeller, William was one of the richest men in America.

Almost the only time when his activities claimed much newspaper space was in 1912 and 1913, when the congressional committee investigating the "money trust" combed the country for him as a witness. He was finally located at Nassau, Bahamas Islands and returned to Florida. When an effort was made to question him in his cottage there, he was caught with such spasms of coughing that the committee was warned by his physicians that it might cause his death if the examination was continued. It then was admitted that he was suffering from cancer of the throat.

Although he retained many of his directorships, Mr. Rockefeller of late years shifted much of his business responsibility to the shoulders of his son, Percy.

None of his Wall street associates have ventured an estimate of his fortune, but it was generally believed that he had between \$100,000,000 and \$250,000,000, concentrated in various Standard Oil companies, Anaconda Copper, Consolidated Gas, Brooklyn Union Gas, St. Paul and National City Bank.

A friend recently stated that Mr. Rockefeller's death, when it came, should have no appreciable effect on the stock market, as none of his holdings would be tossed on the open market.

Announcement of his death was received in Wall street nearly an hour before the market opened.

Mr. Rockefeller returned to his home last Thursday after a visit with his brother to the farm on which they were born at Richmond, in Tioga county.

Friday Mr. Rockefeller complained of not feeling well, but the following day he insisted on going out and was drenched in a heavy shower. Sunday his cold gave his family concern, and pneumonia quickly set in. During the week relatives were summoned.

Mr. Rockefeller began to sink rapidly.

U. S. A. NOT FREE ILLINOIS MINE TROUBLE SHOWS

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The southern Illinois disorders were held up by Senator Myers, democrat of Montana, in the senate today as "proof" that there is no free America and a justification for the assertion that there can be "no free America so long as American citizens cannot work where, when, and for whom and at whatever price they choose without seeking the consent of an invisible government, an organized minority."

The Montana senator read to the senate news dispatches recounting details of the disorders in the Herrin district, declaring them to be "more horrible than those committed by the Germans during the war, atrocities which men stood here on this floor and condemned in the most vigorous fashion."

He asserted that most of the victims of the massacre were men "guilty only of the crime of exercising their constitutional right of earning an honest day's wage."

"We call this free America," he continued, "and as free American citizens those men were attempting to sell what they had to dispose of, their labor."

"They found men who wanted to buy that labor. The price was arranged. The men went to work. They have a constitutional right to be protected in that work. Their employers have the right to be protected in hiring them."

Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, declared that conditions should be taken into account. Mine operators, he said, should have known by experience what the results of other attempts to use strikebreakers have been but added that even as strikebreakers the workers had the right of protection.

WHISKAWAY IS AGAIN VICTOR OVER MORVICH

Supremacy of Whitney Horse Over Former 3-Year-Old King Clearly Established in Latonia's \$50,000 Race—Morvich in Third Place.

LATONIA, Ky., June 24.—(By Associated Press). Whiskaway won the special \$50,000 race for three year olds at Latonia late today before a crowd of 50,000 persons.

Thibadeaux was second and Morvich was third.

The time for the mile and a quarter was 2:02 4-5.

Whiskaway, who triumphed over Morvich a week ago, won the race in a driving finish by half a length.

Morvich was decisively beaten, finishing three lengths back of Thibadeaux. The Kentucky derby winner started away like a sure winner, getting the jump on the other four starters and leading the race as they swept past the cheering stands on their mile and a quarter dash.

Whiskaway caught up to Morvich at the half mile post and with Jockey Penman laying the whip in, shot into the lead. As he swung into the stretch Morvich began to lose ground and the fast coming Thibadeaux jumped into second place, retaining it to the finish. A \$2 ticket in the pari mutual paid \$11.20 on Whiskaway to win.

CINCINNATI, June 24.—(By Associated Press). Today all roads led to Latonia, Kentucky, across the Ohio river from Cincinnati where the cream of the country's three year old thoroughbreds meet this afternoon to battle for honors and gain in the rich Kentucky special race at one mile and a quarter. The stake carries a cash value of \$50,000 and in addition to his share of the money a \$2000 gold cup goes to the winner.

The conditions provide that each horse shall carry 126 pounds.

Governor Small Is Acquitted Charge Appropriating Cash

WAUKEGAN, Ill., June 24.—(By Associated Press). Governor Len Small today was found not guilty by a jury in the Lake county circuit court, where he was tried on charges of conspiracy to embezzle interest on public monies, while serving as state treasurer.

The jury was out but one hour and 35 minutes.

Cheers that shook the rafters of the ancient Lake county court house greeted the verdict. Friends by scores poured through the gates to the bar enclosure seeking to grasp the governor's hands.

The flashlights of a half dozen photographers boomed and for minutes pandemonium reigned.

FEAR MORE OUTRAGES IN MINE AREA

Southern Illinois Coal Company Pleads for Troops to Avert More Trouble—Declare Sheriff and Local Officials Refuse to Do Duty—Governor Acts.

WAUKEGAN, Ill., June 24.—Governor Len Small announced today that he would immediately order the demobilization of the state national guard units held in readiness since Friday morning, for possible dispatch to the disturbed mine zone of Southern Illinois.

Knoxville, Iowa, June 24.—Three non-union coal mines near Knoxville were closed today following a visit of a large group of union sympathizers from Pershing. The non-union workers were ordered to leave the mines, which they did. According to reports, there were no disorders. Pershing is a mining town 7 miles southeast of here. The strike sympathizers came in automobiles and trucks.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 24.—John E. Shoemaker, prominent Seattle civil engineer, former assistant engineer of the Port of Seattle, and at one time president of the Seattle master builders' association, was killed in the mine rioting at Herrin, Illinois, Thursday, according to word received here today.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 24.—(By the Associated Press).—The trouble at the Lester mine, near Herrin, Illinois, was precipitated by the coal company attempting to run the mine non-union with imported strikebreakers under armed guards, Frank Farrington, president of the Illinois branch of the United Mine Workers of America, said in a formal statement issued here today.

CHICAGO, June 24.—Counsel for the Southern Illinois Coal company, whose strip mine was burned Thursday and the non-union men slain by striking miners and sympathizers, today sent a telegram to Adjutant General Carlos E. Black, at Springfield, requesting that troops be sent to Williamson county. The attorneys charged that the sheriff of the county was still refusing to do his duty and that there was danger of further outbreaks.

I. C. COMMISSION TO SETTLE S. P. AND C. P. DISPUTE SOMETIME IN OCTOBER

WASHINGTON, June 24.—The interstate commerce commission in a notice today declared that it would probably take up some time in October, in its general railroad consolidation hearing, the matter of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific railroad merger, recently declared illegal by the supreme court. Meanwhile the commission can not consider requests that it intervene to bring about some alteration in the situation precipitated by the decision.

DR. RATHENAU IS MURDERED BY GUNMEN

German Foreign Minister Assassinated On Leaving Residence in Berlin Suburb—Two Gunmen in Motor Car Do Job—Tremendous Excitement in Reichstag.

BERLIN, June 24.—(By Associated Press). Dr. Walter Rathenau, German minister of foreign affairs was assassinated today.

The minister was shot and killed as he was leaving his residence in Grunewald, a suburb of Berlin for the foreign office, in an automobile. The assassin escaped.

The murderer, who was driving in a motor car, slowed up as he was nearing Dr. Rathenau and shot twice at the foreign minister, the shots taking immediate fatal effect. Putting on high speed, the assassin escaped.

Dr. Rathenau was a guest at dinner last night of Alanson B. Houghton, the American ambassador. On receiving news of the assassination of the foreign minister this morning, the American embassy promptly hoisted its flag to half mast.

There were two persons in the car from which the shots that killed Dr. Rathenau were fired. Both the occupants are said to have opened fire upon the foreign minister, who fell from the floor of his machine fatally wounded, expiring shortly afterward. Large forces of police were quickly on scene.

Hefferich Attacked.
BERLIN, June 24.—News of the assassination reached the reichstag at 10 o'clock, just when the commission on taxation had convened. Chancellor Wirth announced the assassination, upon which pandemonium broke out among the various party groups.

Two socialists jumped up, shouting to Dr. Hefferich:

"You are the assassin!"

They threatened to pounce upon him and Dr. Hefferich hastily left the committee room.

On the reichstag lounges a heated outbreak of recrimination occurred between deputies belonging to the left and a party of representatives of the other extreme in the chamber.

When the news was communicated to the reichstag itself at 11:25 o'clock, it was received with deep emotion. Then amidst a turmoil, the body adjourned.

The assassination of Dr. Rathenau followed hard upon a vitriolic attack on the foreign minister by Dr. Karl Hefferich in the reichstag yesterday, when the nationalist leaders grilled the government generally and Dr. Rathenau in particular concerning the cabinet's reparations policy and its attitude towards the populations of the Rhineland and the Saar valley.

BERLIN, June 24.—(By Associated Press). Following the assassination of Foreign Minister Rathenau, it was announced this afternoon that the government would immediately decree the establishment of extraordinary courts for the trial of nationalist plotters and would proclaim a state of emergency for Prussia. All regimental reunions or militaristic demonstrations will be prohibited.

Wizard of Empire.
Dr. Walter Rathenau was styled the "wizard of the German empire" because, by his high power of organization and business efficiency, he devised expedients which kept "the people eating and the army shooting" when the blockade had shut off the importation of raw materials during the war. After the war, as minister
