FINAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BOYS ATTENDING Y. M. C. A. CAMP

One hundred and fifty boys in various communities in the county are receiving final instructions in the form of a circular letter, telling exactly what steps are necessary before the opening day of the Y. M. C. A. camp July 6. Any boy of twelve years or over not receiving such letter may get the information by getting in touch with the Y. M. C. A. office, or the secretary, Cash Wood. In order that the bill for supplies may be given in time, it is necessary to have every boy signed up and his camp fee paid down by Saturday, July 1. Five dollars per boy pays the bill for the ten days from the time the camp leaves Medford till it returns. This very low figure is made possible by the courtesy and kindness of many friends of the association who are offering their services in various ways. It is evident that there is a very narrow margin allowed in the expense account, so that camp fees must be made in cash as before stated.

A trip to the camp site will be made by those in charge early in the week to further prepare for the coming of the camp.

With the experience of many years in handling Y. M. C. A. and scout camps, it is confidently announced by those in charge that every reasonable caution is being taken to insure the safety and good care of the boys in camp. As far as all practicable, every contingency is being provided for and the campers will be as safe as they are at home. Discussion with parents of the details of the camp program is invited by the management. The trip will be under the personal supervision of Cash Wood, county Y. M. C. A. secretary. Other adults will be present to share the responsibility.

From present indications at least forty boys will make the trip.
