

LIBUSTER IN HOUSE CAUSES AN S. O. S. CALL

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Republican members of the house from the territory east of Kansas, now absent in Washington, were ordered back to the capital today by Representative Mondell, republican leader, owing to a one man filibuster, conducted by Representative Volght, republican, against the bill.

Prompt returns of republicans will insure passage of the bill. Mr. Mondell stated in telegrams to absentees, pointing out the Volght filibuster, that it was necessary to have all republicans here by Monday to carry out an executive program.

Representative Volght showed no disposition today to end his filibuster. He forced three roll calls, requiring minutes, within the first hour and half of the session. The largest number answering was 247, compared with 216, which is a quorum. Members left the chamber in large numbers after each roll call, against the wishes of Mr. Mondell that they remain on the floor.
