## THE ILLINOIS MASSACRE.

ACCORDING to one official announcement the massacre in  
Southern Illinois was due to the failure of the mine operators  
to keep out union strike breakers.

In other words, because certain workingmen failed to join a cer-  
tain labor organization, they were murdered in cold blood. Because  
certain workmen had no union cards, they were beaten, their bodies  
riddled with bullets, and their families thrown on the world to starve.

Rather a damaging confession this. Apparently in the opinion of  
at least one union official, failure to join a union invites, if it does  
not justify, murder.

This sentiment does not represent the view of organized labor of  
course, but unless such a statement is quickly repudiated by labor  
officials themselves, great harm will be done.

There was a Boston massacre once. From the seeds sown by that  
massacre, American liberty and independence was secured. The in-  
alienable right of any American citizen to either belong or not belong  
to a labor union, as he wishes, may well be fruit of this unspeakable  
horror in the mine fields of Southern Illinois.

## THE HOLE IN THE STOCKING.

## "Millions Now Living Will Never Die"

All true Christians accept the Bible  
as the inspired Word of God given to  
man for his instruction. It is an out-  
line of God's plan written in such a  
manner that it can be understood only  
as the Lord is pleased to unfold it.  
This unfolding occurs by the happen-  
ing of great events in the world. Pro-  
phesy means to foretell what is going  
to happen, and history is a record of  
what has happened; therefore when  
prophecy is fulfilled it can be under-  
stood.

Man's great desire is that he might  
live forever in happiness. Jesus said:  
"This is life eternal, that they might  
know thee the only true God, and Jesus  
Christ, whom thou has sent." (John  
17:3) Every man, then, who really  
wants to live, and who believes the  
Bible, would certainly be interested in  
the revealed plan of God that leads to  
life everlasting. Briefly stated, it is  
this:

Man was formed perfect and in the  
image and likeness of Jehovah, endow-  
ed with reasoning faculties and the  
senses, and given dominion over the  
earth, with the right to enjoy life  
and the blessings incident thereto eter-  
nally. One condition was attached,  
however, that he must be obedient to  
God. Eve was deceived and violated  
the law, and then Adam deliberately  
joined her in the transgression.

The result was that man was sent-  
enced to death. This judgment is set  
forth in Genesis 2:17-19. In substance  
it provides that man must return to  
the dust from which he came. God  
enforced this judgment by taking man  
away from the perfect food that was in  
Eden and by causing him to earn his  
bread by tilling the soil outside of  
Eden, which produced imperfect food;  
and the eating of this food poisoned  
man's system, and he gradually died.  
Under this condition all of his children  
were brought forth; hence all were  
born in sin and shapen in iniquity.—  
Psalm 51:5; Romans 5:12.

It follows, then, that if man is ever  
to have life he must be released from  
the judgment of condemnation and  
death and be provided with the means  
of sustaining life. The Bible discloses  
that this provision was long ago made.  
God promised to redeem man from  
death. (Hosea 13:14) Amongst the  
human race no man could redeem his  
brother. (Psalm 49:7) Therefore in the  
fulness of time Jehovah sent forth into  
the earth his beloved Son, who was  
born of a woman but not begotten by a  
man, born holy, harmless and separate  
from sinners. (Hebrews 7:26) As to  
why Jesus came to earth and lived  
here for thirty-three and one-half years  
and then was crucified, the Scriptures  
answer: He came "to give his life a  
ransom" (Matthew 20:28), that the  
people might have life. (John 10:10)  
As the perfect man Adam had been  
sentenced to death, the perfect man  
Jesus voluntarily permitting his life to  
be taken from him provided a corre-  
sponding price or offset, and the ac-  
ceptance of this sacrifice by Jehovah  
would result in the legal release of  
Adam and his offspring from the judg-  
ment above mentioned.

The death and resurrection of Jesus  
occurred more than eighteen hundred  
years ago. Why, then, has not his  
death resulted in bringing life to the  
human race? The answer is, that the  
Scriptures set forth that it is God's  
purpose to take out from amongst the  
nations a people for his name (Acts  
15:14), and after this he will set up  
his kingdom. Before Jesus ascended  
on high he informed his followers that  
he would return and receive them to  
himself; and from Pentecost until his  
kingdom he has been gathering out  
from the world those willing to make a  
voluntary sacrifice with him and be  
his faithful followers unto death. These  
says the Apostle, constitute with  
Jesus the seed of promise through  
which the blessings should come.—  
Galatians 3:16, 27, 29.

Because of the blessings that were  
expected to come to the race, the great  
event to which all Bible students have  
looked forward, both Jews and gentiles  
has been the end of the old order and  
the coming of the Messianic kingdom.  
Jews have not believed Jesus to be the  
Messiah, while Christians have. Every  
one of the Jewish prophets foretold  
the coming of the Messiah, however;  
and every one foretold that the setting  
up of his kingdom would mark the  
beginning of the restoration of man  
and all the things that he had lost.  
(Acts 3:19-24) If the Bible is to be  
believed, then the restoration of man  
to human perfection is the great ob-  
jective of the divine plan toward man.  
Unless God intends to give the human  
race an opportunity for restoration,  
then all the promises set forth in the  
Bible are meaningless and must fail.  
But we know that they cannot fail.

With one accord all the sacred writ-  
ers of the New Testament hold out  
that the death of Jesus was for the  
purpose of delivering man from the  
condition of death. Jesus, by the grace  
of God, tasted death for every man."  
(Hebrews 2:9) "There is one God, and  
one mediator between God and men,  
the man Christ Jesus, who gave him-  
self a ransom for all, to be testified in  
due time." (1 Timothy 2:5,6) "He is  
the satisfaction for our sins; and not  
for ours only, but also for the sins of  
the whole world." (1 John 2:2) The  
very foundation of the Christian religion  
is based upon the ransom-sacrifice  
and its resultant benefits to man. This  
is conceded by both Catholics and Pro-  
testants. That which is usually termed  
the Apostles' Creed, and which all  
Catholic and Protestant churches have  
accepted as correct, states that the  
coming of the Lord is for the purpose  
of judging the living and the dead.  
This is in substance the statement of  
the Apostle—2 Timothy 4:1.

The all-important question, then, is,  
At what time should man expect these  
long-promised blessings to begin? All  
faithful Jews have looked forward to  
the fulfillment of the promise of bless-  
ing of life on earth at the end of the  
world. Christians have had the same  
thought. By "world" is meant a period  
of time during which a certain social  
and political order exists. It does not  
mean the earth, "because 'the earth  
abideth forever.'" (Ecclesiastes 1:4)  
It was made for man's habitation.  
(Isaiah 45:18) The first world was  
from Adam to the flood; and there be-  
gan what is known as the second  
world, or present evil world, which the  
Scriptures declare must continue until  
the time for Messiah's kingdom.

In the minds of Jesus' apostles was  
this thought, then, of the coming day  
of blessing; hence just before his cruci-  
fixion they propounded this ques-  
tion: "Master, tell us, how may we  
know of thy presence and of the end of  
the world?" (Matthew 24:3) From then  
until now Jews have hoped for that  
time, and Christians have likewise  
hoped and prayed for it. The answer  
of Jesus was clear. His answer was  
couched in prophetic language; and  
with the fulfillment of the things that  
he foretold man is enabled to tell when  
he reaches the end of the world.

Students of divine prophecy, mark-  
ing the manner of fulfillments of other  
prophecies, for the past half-century  
have been looking forward with great  
expectation to the time of the Lord's  
return and the setting up of his king-  
dom. Bible students frequently called  
attention in that period of time to the  
fact that 1914 would mark the begin-  
ning of a different order of things in  
the earth. They based their conclu-  
sions upon this Biblical calculation:

God made a covenant with the na-  
tion of Israel, to the exclusion of all  
other nations. That nation became  
loyal to him; and he withdrew his  
favor, taking away the dominion of  
the earth and permitting the gentiles  
to establish a universal dominion,  
which period of gentile dominion he  
declared should continue for a period  
of 2520 years. This great event or  
transaction took place in the year 606  
B. C., and necessarily ended with 1914  
A. D. The Scriptures declare that  
when that time should arrive the na-  
tions would become angry. (Revela-  
tion 11:18) For this reason the great  
disturbance amongst the nations be-  
ginning in 1914 was no surprise to  
Bible students. Events that have trans-  
pired since then prove conclusively  
that their calculations made from the  
Scriptures are correct.

Now mark the answer of Jesus to  
the question: "How may we know the  
end of the world?" He said the begin-  
ning of that period would be marked  
by a world war—nation rising against  
nation, and kingdom against kingdom,  
accompanied by famine, pestilence and  
revolutions in various parts of the  
earth. (Matthew 24:7) Every one wit-  
nesses the fact that these things began  
to have fulfillment exactly on time in  
1914.

He said, again, that the Jews should  
be trodden down until that period, and  
that their return to Palestine would be  
an evidence of the dispensational  
change. The Jews have returned to  
Palestine and are rebuilding their own  
land. He further stated that at the  
time in question upon earth there  
would be "distress of nations, with per-  
plexity; men's hearts failing them with  
fear." Surely if those words had been  
written this year they could not be  
any more appropriate, because exactly  
what he foretold is now being fulfilled  
throughout the earth.

The time, therefore, is definitely lo-  
cated. The evidence is conclusive of  
the Lord's presence. The World War  
marked the legal end of the gentile  
dominion, the end of the old world;  
and there it began to pass away and  
will terminate with the greatest trou-  
ble yet. Then will begin the restora-  
tion blessings according to the prom-  
ise.

Concerning the law that God gave to  
Israel, Jesus declared that every jot  
and tittle thereof must be fulfilled.  
(Matthew 5:18). One provision of that  
law was that the Jews should keep  
every fifth year as a jubilee, and  
that they should keep these jubilees  
for seventy periods, or a total of 3500  
years; that they should begin to count  
this time when they entered the land  
of Palestine. Their entering into  
Palestine occurred in 1575 B. C., and  
the period of 3500 years must end in  
A. D. 1925. St. Paul plainly says that  
the things pertaining to the law fore-  
shadowed better things to come. (He-  
brews 10:1; 1 Corinthians 10:11) The  
provision of the law was that on the  
jubilee year every man who had lost  
something must have it restored to  
him. It must be a year of restoration.  
Hence this jubilee was a type fore-  
shadowing the reign of Messiah, or the  
time when the restoration of all things  
which God has spoken by the mouth of  
all his holy prophets, will take place.

Again Bible students call attention  
to the fact that 1925 marks the begin-  
ning of the great antitypical jubilee.  
Hence it is expected that that will  
mark the end of the wars, revolutions  
and anarchy in the earth, and condi-  
tions will rapidly begin to take a  
peaceable form under the direction of  
the great Messiah.

Without a doubt millions of people  
now on earth will be living then; and  
since the clear purpose of Jehovah is  
to give the obedient ones an opportu-  
nity to live, and since the Bible teaches  
—and all Christians have thus under-  
stood—that the coming of the Lord  
Jesus is to judge the living and then  
the dead, it follows that it can be with  
confidence announced that millions  
now living on the earth will enjoy this  
opportunity, and being obedient to it  
will never die. For this reason it is  
all-important now that every one who  
loves life, liberty, and happiness in-  
form himself as to the true teachings  
of the Scriptures. It is time to disre-  
gard creed fences, denominational re-  
lationships, and honestly seek the

truth as set forth in God's Word,  
which is being revealed before the  
eyes of the people. The Messianic  
kingdom is the only panacea for the  
ills of humankind. It is at hand. It  
will bring the long-desired blessings to  
the human race. It will fill the desire  
of all nations.
