WASHINGTON, June 26.—"I am tired, I am 69 years old, I want to rest now and be with my family," Chairman Joseph W. Fordney of the house ways and means committee declared today in announcing he had determined not to seek re-election from the Eighth Michigan district after a continuous service of 24 years.

By the time his term ends March 4, next, Mr. Fordney said the three big measures on which he has worked this session—tariff, revenue and bonus—would have been enacted into law. Coming from his committee, these major bills kept him steadily at work and while he is still hale and firm, Mr. Fordney says he is entitled to a rest.

News of Mr. Fordney's decision was an utter surprise to house members generally.

Representative Wm. R. Green of Iowa is the ranking republican member of the ways and means committee. Under the house seniority rules he will become chairman, members said, if the republicans retain control of the house in the November elections.

BARNES GIVES RALPH HAND HARD TUSSLE

EUGENE, June 26.—In one of the prettiest and cleanest wrestling matches seen in Lane county in years, Ralph Hand, Cottage Grove boxer, and George Barnes, Seaside, wrestled two hours and five minutes to a draw at the armory last night. Each secured one fall. A good-sized house saw the contest.

Barnes got the first fall at the end of one hour and 10 minutes of torrid mixing with a head scissor and arm bar, and Hand won his in 40 minutes with a leg scissor, referee's decision.

He had Barnes' bum arm bottled up tight, and many thought the Nebraska would not be able to stave off the Cottage Grove youth in the last 15 minutes because of the pain he was suffering, but the easterner went in again in hammer and tons fashion and came near downing the Grove expert a couple of times.

Both men showed a brand of high class wrestling that should assure them matches with any one in the country.

Barnes requested a return match, but nothing definite was done.

Dempsy to Fight Willis.

NEW YORK, June 26.—Articles for a contest between Jack Dempsy, world's heavyweight boxing champion, and Harry Willis, negro challenger, may be signed today or tomorrow.

Dempsy reached New York yesterday declaring his willingness to fight "anybody, any time, anywhere."

Coincident with his arrival, promoter Rickard announced terms for the proposed match with Willis were nearing a definite stage.

Managers of both boxers have expressed their willingness to sign for the combat, and apparently only certain details remain to be ironed out.

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
