## The Governor, Dad Gates and the Klan

A great many persons enthusiastically  
applaud Governor Olcott's opinion  
that the duty owed the people cannot  
properly be discharged by a public of-  
ficial who is a member of the KKK.  
Enthusiastic approval is also given the  
policy that members of the KKK  
should not be in positions where they  
must decide between the obligations  
they owe the public and the Klan. As  
it is generally believed that Charles F.  
Gates was removed from the state fair  
board because of his affiliation with  
the KKK, the public holds the opinion  
that the dismissal was for "the good  
of the service"—the only reason the  
governor gave for his summary action.

It is, however, said by many, includ-  
ing Mr. Gates himself, that he is not a  
member of the KKK. That he was  
solicited to join the Klan, there is no  
doubt; he says so. But he says the  
purposes of the order did not appeal to  
him, and that he declined to accept  
membership. Then it was proposed to  
hold a special initiation service for  
him, so that he might see and deter-  
mine for himself, without any agree-  
ment to join, if the obligations were  
such that he could assume with justice  
to himself and his fellow-citizens who  
are not members of the Klan. Mr.  
Gates consented to witness the cere-  
monies. What he saw, what obliga-

tions were imposed, what oaths had to  
be taken, he has not divulged. But as  
he did not join the Klan that its oaths,  
obligations, and purposes are incom-  
patible with the sort of Americanism  
of which Mr. Gates is a high type we  
may well suppose.

Mr. Gates is mayor of Medford; he  
has proved a wise and efficient offi-  
cial. Since he took office, many im-  
provements have been made in the  
city at slight cost to the taxpayers.  
Things that were necessary, and whose  
cost seemed to make them impossible  
of procurement, have been installed, to  
the betterment of civic conditions and  
to the satisfaction of the taxpayers.  
For the many improvements and the  
easy burden of taxation, the people of  
Medford give "Dad" Gates the credit.  
For his efficiency and ability as mayor  
the Spectator takes the record of im-  
provements made in Medford; for his  
popularity, the Spectator takes the  
word of his fellow-citizens; and for the  
belief that he is not a KKK, the Spec-  
tator takes his own declaration.

That Governor Olcott had every rea-  
son to believe that Fair Director Gates  
did belong to the outlawed Klan, there  
is, of course, no doubt. The attitude  
of the people toward the KKK is fully  
expressed in their approval of his let-  
ter dismissing a member of his official  
family who was suspected of affiliation  
with the Klan. Oregon demands that  
its officials, as far as their relations  
with the KKK are concerned, must be  
above suspicion.—Oregon Spectator.

## HARDING MAY TRY TO END STRIKE

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Govern-  
ment attempts to intervene in the  
bituminous coal strike were carried  
forward today when Secretary of La-  
bor Davis called John L. Lewis,  
president of the United Mine Work-  
ers of America, to Washington for  
a series of conferences, preliminary  
to taking the issues directly before  
President Harding. An impression  
was created in advance of the meet-  
ing between the president and Mr.  
Lewis that the government might call  
a national conference of operators  
and union leaders in the industry to  
consider a settlement.

## MAY ADMIT GERMANY LEAGUE OF NATIONS

LONDON, June 26.—Asked by  
Lord Robert Cecil in the house of  
commons this afternoon whether he  
could state the government's attitude  
towards the admission of Ger-  
many to membership in the league of  
nations, Prime Minister Lloyd  
George replied that Great Britain  
will be willing to support a proposal  
for Germany's admission.  
In answer to Lord Robert's ques-  
tion the prime minister said:  
"This is not a question which con-  
cerns Great Britain alone, it primarily  
concerns Germany herself. So far as  
his majesty's government is concern-  
ed we would support a proposal to ad-  
mit Germany to the league."
