

SENATE FAVORS KEEPING ARMY CONTROL HAITI

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Indefinite continuance of American military occupation of Haiti, but with a reduction of the marine force, was recommended in an unanimous report presented by the special senate committee which for months has been investigating American administration in Haiti and Santo Domingo. The committee deferred announcement of its findings on Dominican affairs "in view of the negotiations happily begun between the state department and the Dominican leaders looking to the termination of military government in Santo Domingo."

The declaration that early withdrawal, or of drastic reduction in the American marine occupation force in Haiti would be followed certainly by brigandage and revolution was made in the report, signed by Senator McCormick, republican, Illinois, chairman, and Senators Oddie, republican, Nevada; Pomerehne, democrat, Ohio, and Jones, democrat, New Mexico, who have held protracted hearings and recently toured Haiti and Santo Domingo.

The committee found that on the whole American administration in Haiti had been of great benefit to the Haitians, and was so regarded, it is said, by a vast majority.

"In brief, under the treaty between Haiti and the United States," the report said "the peace of the republic the solvency of its government and the service of people had been established for the first time for many years."

Four years later the family moved to Canyonville, but soon came back to Rogue River, and later built the hotel where the Del Rio orchards are now located at Rock Point.

Mr. White's mother prepared the first meal for the California-Oregon Stage Co., in the cow creek mountains and also the last one at Rock Point before the stage company gave way to the railroad.

The deceased leaves one daughter and one son. Mrs. E. J. Hottenroth, Haynes, Cal., and Harry B. White, Calexico, Cal.

The remains were brought to Gold Hill and funeral services in charge of Weeks-Conger Co., were held at the Rock Point cemetery at 10 a. m., Sunday.

Bowman, brother-in-law and sister of the deceased, arrived last night from their home in California, for the purpose of attending the funeral, and Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Bilderback, an uncle and aunt of the deceased, are also here from their home in Merlin. Ralph Darnelle, a brother, arrived this morning on train No. 14.

Darnelle was one of the California Oregon Power company's most trusted and experienced linemen and had been in electrical work in Medford for many years. He was 35 years, 11 months and 3 days of age at the time of his death, and leaves a wife and two children.

Burial was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

backed by the W. C. T. U., and Ministerial associations of this city and Ashland, and some of the ministers are Klansmen, just as there are members from all walks of life."

Mr. Hoogstraal further said that he had heard "no objections to the recall," but "that many had said, 'why not clean out the entire court house.'"

In connection with the sheriff's recall, it is reported that similar action is being contemplated against County Judge Gardner, and that the filing of the petitions against Terrill, will result in legal action against calling of the special election, on account of the expense involved, and that the heavy taxpayers of the county, neutral in the fight, will back this plan.

It is also learned, from reliable sources, that the selection of D. M. Lowe, to make the race against Sheriff Terrill, was preceded by meetings between the Ministerial association of Ashland, and the W. C. T. U. of Medford, and that Lowe was not the first choice. The favorite refused to make the race "on account of being too old" and "business interests," but that he recommended Mr. Lowe, and that his recommendations were accepted. Four or five names were mentioned for Terrill's opponent, among them being E. A. Fleming of Jacksonville; S. B. Sandifer, county prohibition enforcement officer and J. E. Hemstreet, former Medford policeman. Whether these names were ever considered in a meeting is not known.

During his term and a half in the sheriff's office, Terrill has been the stormy petrel of Jackson county politics, and the center of persistent agitation for the last year, chiefly on the prohibition law issue. He was the target of Evangelist Bulgin during his meetings in this city a year ago, and since then rumors and counter rumors of recall have been in the air constantly. One of the chapters of recent occurrence was the indictment and return from Siskiyou county of Elmer Simonds, a bootlegging episode with weird and peculiar sidelights. Terrill has been investigated by many grand juries, but no indictments returned.

Many conflicting reports anent the recall, pro and con, are abroad, the only point of agreement being, that the county will be thrown into another era of political bitterness and turmoil, if the election is held.

BROOKINGS BANK WINS DECISION OVER FED. RESERVE

PORTLAND, June 26.—Federal Judge C. E. Wolverton today issued an order making permanent a temporary injunction last December against the federal reserve bank of San Francisco in which methods used in the collection of checks drawn on the Brookings state bank of Brookings, Ore., were restrained.

The action resulted from the attempt of the federal reserve bank to collect at par checks on the Brookings bank, who contended it had the right to charge one-tenth of one percent exchange of checks. According to the law under which the federal reserve bank operates, it does not charge any exchange collected through it as a clearing house and it contended for the right to collect checks at par on the Brookings bank, which is not a member of the federal reserve. An agent of the federal reserve system was maintained at Brookings to present checks on the Brookings bank which had passed through the federal reserve bank. After the agent was withdrawn the federal reserve system sought to make collections by mail, and it was in connection with this feature of the case that the injunction was issued.

Judge Wolverton held that banks who were not members of the federal reserve system may charge a reasonable exchange on remittances if they see fit. He held this is a right banks may relinquish if they wish, but that they cannot be coerced to do so.

The idea of any one carrying away one of these helpless creatures just born a few hours or days before is a cruel crime! The little fellows need the care of their mothers."

2 FIRES AT ONE TIME, HOUSE IS BURNED DOWN

A fire which started at 2 p. m. today covered several acres of dry grass and chapparel west of the Jackson school and was threatening several houses in the outskirts of town when the fire department arrived. It was hot work for the firemen who had two trucks operating on the scene of action, but the flames were soon extinguished, having done no damage.

Before the large truck and the smaller chemical truck returned from the grass fire the whistle blew a second time and the Chalmers truck, the third truck of the city's fleet, left for

the burning residence of Walter W. Hammon and family which is situated between Apple and Bartlett streets near the Methodist church.

The little home had caught fire and was ablaze before the fire was discovered. The department did good work in keeping neighboring buildings from catching the blaze as all of them were as dry as tinder. According to neighbors all the earthly belongings of the Williamson family were destroyed, but none of the occupants of the house could be found to determine whether the property was insured or not.

Volunteers helped the regular department. The fire was practically under control before the large truck arrived from the grass fire. Had the city been without the third truck a number of other buildings would have undoubtedly burned.
