

BREAK IN CITY WATER MAIN IS BEING REPAIRED

In the midst of an unusual hot spell what might have been a calamity to Medford, but which fortunately according to indications this afternoon, will cause only temporary inconvenience in the lack of water for lawns and gardens today and tonight occurred early this morning when the main pipe line of the city's water supply was broken by a slide coming down on it from the Rogue River Canal company irrigation canal, at Bradshaw drop, near Wellen.

Fortunately the break is only 20 feet in extent and can be gotten at readily in the way of temporary repairs, and the city's crew of workmen who have been laboring to this end at high tension all day, hope to have the break connected again by early evening, or at the latest, by tomorrow morning.

The break was discovered at 8 a. m., and word, as soon as possible, phoned to the city water department. City Superintendent Davis hurried Assistant Superintendent Conrad and a crew to the scene, and had the fire siren sounded so that the water consumers should quit all lawn and garden irrigation. In addition a number of citizens, volunteers for this work, drove all over the city in autos telling in every neighborhood of the serious accident that had happened to the main pipe line, and warning that the water should not be turned on again until at least temporary repairs were finished and the pipe line was all right again.

Water was not shut off in the homes, as the city reservoir was filled and the supply there would hold out for ordinary use in the homes until night, unless there should be a big fire. The people are warned not to use any more water than necessary in the homes and places of business until the situation is remedied. By evening, the water pressure may be very low, anyhow.

Water will not be forbidden in the homes until it becomes necessary to maintain sufficient pressure in the reservoir for fires, if that contingency arises.

When the main pipe line break is repaired and the reservoir is filled to capacity again, the siren whistle of the fire department will give notification. The people are warned not to confuse this signal with the regulation signal blown for a fire alarm, which always designates the ward in which the fire is located.

wounded in the attack on the mine was not killed. It was said that the sheriff had not questioned any of the wounded on either side.

Lying on their hospital cots their wounds swathed in bandages, some of the wounded seemed that they were in danger and expressed fear of further violence if they leave the hospital unprotected. Herrin's law respecting citizenry believes a body of state troops would solve the problem and dispel any further danger to the imported guards and workers from the wrath of striking miners.

START MOVE TO HALT RECALL OF SHERIFF TERRILL

A new angle was thrown on the proposed recall of Sheriff Charles E. Terrill by the circulating and signing of the following card, yesterday and today, throughout the city and county:

To Chauncey Foley, Circuit Clerk, Jackson Co. Ore. I hereby request that my name be removed from the petition for recall of C. E. Terrill as sheriff of Jackson county, Oregon.

Precinct Jackson Co., Oregon, 1922.

The card was circulated when it became known that many people had signed without investigating, and when they became aware of the true status of the recall, desired to withdraw their signatures. According to the circulators, some claimed they signed the card, under the belief that the recall petitions would be circulated for other county officials, they being for a recall of all or a recall of none, and that the verbal charges made against the sheriff were too wild for belief, and that they did not want to be a party to a petty political row that has been raging for over a year.

This is permissible under the law, which provides that the county clerk must recognize such requests. As soon as the petitions for a recall are filed the county clerk must also check over the names on the petition with the registration cards, and cast out all not legal voters. The signers also must be naturalized citizens of the United States of America.

There is also a persistent rumor that petitions will be circulated for the recall of County Judge George Gardner, but so far, nobody has been able to catch sight of them. There has been as continuous an agitation for the recall of the county clerk, as the sheriff, but it has not been as noisy. All kinds of wild yarns have been circulated about both.

The opinion is crystallizing throughout the county, that there is as much politics, as uplift in the Sheriff Terrill recall, and his friends claim he has been the victim of systematic gossip propaganda for the last six months, with disgruntled office seekers as the chief circulators.

ANNOUNCE PLANS FOR NEW WING TO CRATER L. LODGE

Plans for the erection of a new wing to Crater Lake lodge were announced today by Eric V. Houser, manager of the operating company in charge of the resort. Collection of materials and work on foundations would begin July 1, Houser stated. Construction cost is estimated at \$60,000. A rock quarry will be opened in the neighborhood and other materials will be hauled over the trail from the nearest railroad point, a distance of approximately 75 miles.

Because of difficulties in collecting materials the new addition to the lodge could not be completed before the close of the tourist season this year, according to Houser. The present lodge, with auxiliary tent house facilities, offers accommodations for about 150 tourists.
