ART EXHIBIT IS ARRANGED HERE

Sam Hume, director of the Greek theater at the University of California, Berkeley, gave an informal talk at the public library Monday on the plans and ideals of the Western Association of Art Directors, and as a result steps will be taken to carry out certain features of the work here.

Mr. Hume set forth that western artists get their genre from their environment, not the atmosphere of London, Paris and New York, and that their pictures portray the spirit of the west. The association is endeavoring to make their works available to all, and to this end a traveling exhibit of paintings of western artists will be presented here at an early date.

It was also urged by Mr. Hume that the work of the artists, musicians and dramatists be co-ordinated so as to obtain the best results with the theater as the center. Good progress has been made in this plan in California, and it is hoped to duplicate the interest in this state.

RAPID PROGRESS BEING MADE ON FAIR BUILDINGS

The directors of the Jackson County Fair association will meet this evening at the exhibit building to consider the many details incident to the operation of the fair in September. The difficult task before them is to estimate the income and base the expenditures to come within same.

The entrance building, with the exception of being painted, will be finished by the end of this week and as this is but a sample of the character of all of the buildings to be constructed, the citizens of the county are given an early glance of what to expect when the entire building program is completed.

Farmers having these exhibits should not take an indifferent view of the fair but they should begin now to arrange to display them.

In the past there has been a charge made to enter stock which was to compete for a premium but the directors of the fair have decided that no such fee is to be charged this year.

SALEM, June 28.—Certification of \$400,000 in bonds for the Eagle Point irrigation district in Jackson county was approved by the state irrigation securities commission yesterday. The issue will be used in the improvement of the district, including the construction of a canal 18 miles in length, through which water will be diverted from Big Butte creek to the 6200 acres included in the district. No storage of water will be required.
