WALTER MILLER WON'T WRESTLE SPOKANE, WASH.

LOS ANGELES, June 28.—Walter Miller, claimant of the world's middleweight wrestling championship, announced last night that he will not meet the winner of the Ted Thye-Johnny Meyers bout at Spokane June 30 elsewhere but in Los Angeles. Miller's statement was made in answer to a challenge wired from Spokane to the Los Angeles athletic club grapple, which requires that the bout be held in Spokane for a \$3000 guarantee.

The local wrestler bases his refusal on the ground that he made a trip to the northwest several months ago to meet Thye, but he was forced to cancel the match because the promoters failed to live up to their financial agreement.

Boston in Last Place

CHICAGO, June 28.—(By Associated Press.) Connie Mack's Athletics are out of last place today and Boston is holding down the cellar berth as a result of the "Iron Man" performance of their star twirler, Eddie Rommel, in chalking up two victories over the Red Sox. Rommel earned a four to two decision in the first half of a doubleheader and came back in the seventh inning of the second game to stem a Boston rally, while his mates pounded Ferguson and won, 4 to 6.

Tillie Walker cracked out his thirteenth home run of the season, tying the total of his steam mate, Bing Miller.

The rejuvenated White Sox tossed their hats into the American league pennant ring by trouncing Detroit 9 to 5, after Ferdie Schupp had been driven from the mound in the first inning and ascending to a tie for third place with the Tigers.

The Yankees were idle but St. Louis lost part of its margin at the top when Cleveland snatched victory from the Browns with a six run rally in the eighth that sent Wright and Van Gilder to the showers. The score was 9 to 7.

Dutch Ruether registered his 10th victory of the season when Brooklyn disposed of Boston, 7 to 3. The Giants took a six inning affair from the Phillies, 7 to 1, rain cancelling a doubleheader program, while the St. Louis Cardinals tied Cincinnati in the ninth and won in the 12th 9 to 6.

Pittsburg checked its downward plunge by taking a doubleheader.

Golf Record Smashed

KANSAS CITY, June 28.—(By Associated Press.) Match play for the western amateur golf championship began today at the Hillcrest country club with Chick Evans of Chicago starting with Eddie Held of St. Louis.

Today's play began after two days of qualifying shooting which produced golf said to be the greatest ever seen in the preliminary rounds of a western amateur tournament and which, according to veterans of the links has never been equaled in any tournament of recent years. The quality of the field is shown by the fact that it took a score of 156 for 36 holes to assure qualification, seven men shooting off a tie at 157 for the 32nd place in the championship fight.

Cards which broke par were common, and Evans in becoming medalist with a mark of 143, shot a 67 yesterday six under par, tying the professional record made when putts were conceded, breaking the amateur record for 18 holes and breaking the professional and amateur marks for the first nine which he made in 33 against par 34.

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MERRY WAR ON IN LOWER CALIF. 21 MEN KILLED

CALIFORNIA, Cal., June 28.—Rumors of revolutionary activities in Lower California have been revived with the receipt here of unofficial reports that within the last two weeks 21 men have met death in and around Mexicali, just across the international boundary, the capital of the northern district of Mexican territory.

American authorities here today were still endeavoring to identify the body of one of eight men said to have been killed in a battle of a revolutionary nature more than two miles east of Mexicali Monday night. This body apparently had been dragged across the line, as it was found in an irrigation ditch on the American side. Seven other bodies were found on the Mexican side. All were Mexicans.

American ranchers near the scene reported they had heard firing throughout Monday night.

In addition to the eight deaths of Monday, thirteen others have been unofficially reported recently. These are said to have been executions of alleged radicals and revolutionists. As to this, however, there has been no official statement from the Mexican authorities.

Hecker Murder Trial Starts, Oregon City

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 27.—Russell Hecker, Portland youth indicted

on the charge of first degree murder of Frank Bowker, a musician at Clackamas, April 17, was placed on trial here today. The state's case was based on the allegation that Hecker killed Bowker while they were on a trip to a cache of liquor which Bowker

was to have purchased from Hecker. Bowker's body was found in a sack in the Calapooia river near Albany.

U. S. S. Connecticut Sails
PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—The battleship Connecticut, flagship of
