This will be the opening smoker of a series of regular Friday night amateur exhibitions which promise to be popular with Medford boxing fans as the prices of admission are low and the bouts will be first class according to Manager K. O. Bob Brown.

The bouts on the card are as follows: Chet Brown vs. Joe Blackburn at 145 pounds. Tom Sharkey vs. Bob Duey at 175 pounds. Lawrence Daw vs. Red Meadows at 152 pounds. The department used a 350 foot length of hose in extinguishing the blaze.
