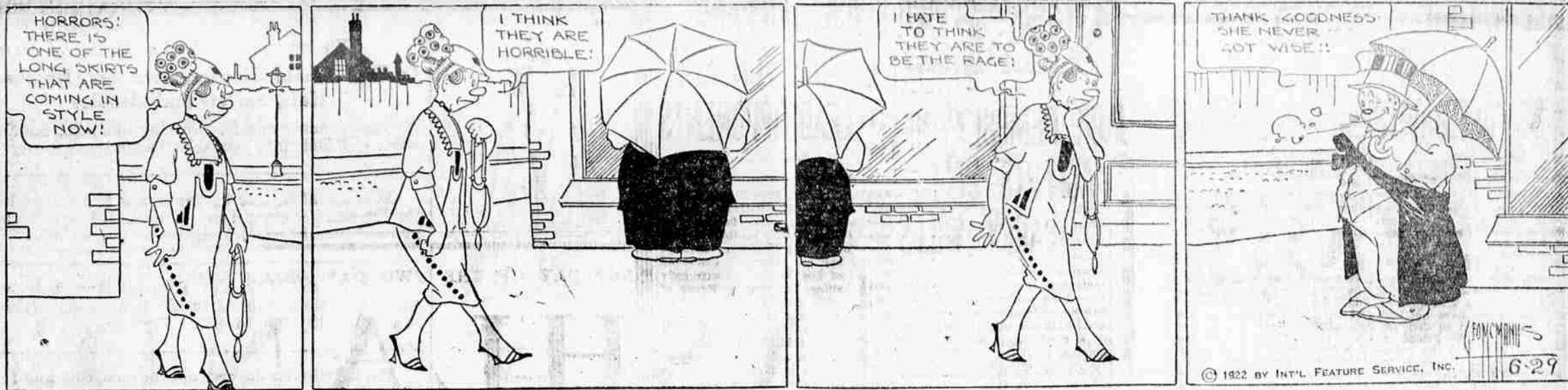


BRINGING UP FATHER

DEMPSEY WOULD
LIKE TO FIGHT
ONCE A WEEK

OAKLAND, Calif., June.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, said here recently that he would like to engage in a ring battle every week.

"I'd like nothing better," Dempsey added, "than to take on a number of fighters, one right after another. If possible I'd like to meet most of the men I boxed on my way to the top. It would be the best kind of training for me."

The champion expressed a desire to meet Bill Eronman, Jess Willard and Georges Carpentier in succession. He expressed pleasure when he learned that he probably would meet Brennan Labor Day.

Dempsey, during his recent visit to California, worked out daily. "I am still a little overweight," he apologized when here. "But I plan to come down shortly. Being heavy gives me something to train off."

Vaudeville work does not suit Dempsey. "It was a tiresome grind and I'm glad to get away from it," he said. "Five shows a day, no fresh air, and the old grease paint and everything. I sure got my goat and I wouldn't go back to it for anything."

"A lot of people have told me that I was a good actor. I'm here to say that I'm not and I know it. Fighting is my business and I'm willing to box 'em as fast as the promoters set them up."

THINKS FORD'S OFFER
WILL BE ACCEPTED

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Action by congress in appropriating \$7,500,000 for work on the dam means that "the completion of the Muscle Shoals development is now a certainty," Representative Almon, Alabama, in whose district the nitrate plant is located, declared in the house today.

Mr. Almon predicted that Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals would be "accepted by the house by a big majority when it reconvenes in August."

"Members of the house will have an opportunity during the recess to study the Ford offer and ascertain the sentiment of their constituents on the subject," said Mr. Almon, "and as a result the pro-Ford sentiment will be so strong that the leaders in the house will be glad to give us a vote on the Ford offer, which will result in an overwhelming majority in favor of its acceptance."

36,398,958 PEOPLE IN
U. S. FOREIGN BORN

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The total white population of the country foreign born or with one or both parents foreign born on January 1, 1920, was 36,398,958, the department of commerce announced today in a compilation of the 1920 census figures. This was an increase in the "foreign white stock" of the nation's population from 1910 of 4,155,576, or 12.9 per cent. The 1920 total includes, it was shown, 13,713,754 immigrants and 22,685,204 persons born in this country, one or both of whose parents were immigrants.

BIRTH OF MARION
OHIO CELEBRATED
EARLY IN JULY

MARION, Ohio, June 29.—President Harding, General John J. Pershing, Hanford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion, and other nationally and internationally known figures are expected here early in July to attend the celebration of the centennial of Marion's birth, June 2, 3, 4 and 5 having been fixed as the dates for the observance, but to date no definite program of speech making has been arranged.

Sunday morning, July 2, will be given over entirely to religious exercises in the churches and in the afternoon there will be a union church service in the Chautauqua pavilion, where nearly two years ago President Harding was officially notified of his nomination by the republican convention.

Monday afternoon there will be a musical program and in the evening the chief musical event of the centennial celebration will be staged. At that time former Marion musicians who have become nationally known artists will appear.

Tuesday morning there will be a program for the children, including a children's horse show. In the afternoon the local American Legion post will stage an Independence Day celebration and in the evening there will be a program of fireworks.

Wednesday is planned as the big day of the celebration, to begin with a mammoth parade in which all periods of the city's growth will be shown. The part of the American Legion in the program will be taken by representatives from most of the 550 posts in the state. In the afternoon it is planned to have a speaking program in the downtown section and at the fairground the Legion will have a barbecue. On that day the Legion is to have a state convention.

The final event of the program will be a pageant at the fairground Wednesday evening. The pageant has been written by Miss Eleanor M. Freeland, formerly of Marion, but now of Pittsburgh. It will depict Marion's history.

HERRIN MASSACRE

MARION, Ill., June 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—A special grand jury on July 10 will begin investigating the massacre last week of non-union men by union striking miners near Herrin, Circuit Judge Hartwell announced today. Coroner McCown began excavation of the Southern Illinois Coal company's strip mine, where the non-union men were employed following rumors that several bodies were buried there.
