

RECALL WAITING ON THE FILING OF AFFIDAVITS

Petitions for the recall of Sheriff Charles E. Terrill, scheduled to be filed last Monday, had not been filed with the county clerk up to this afternoon, but several requests, written and by telephone, had been received from signers, requesting that their names be withdrawn. Backers of the recall movement claim the filing has been delayed because they desire to file affidavits with the petition, and that these have not been made out, and as soon as they are the recall will be filed. Friends of the sheriff maintain that the reason the recall has not been filed, is because not enough signatures have been received. They frankly admit the report "that 1900 names were secured the first day," and point to the opposition to the recall springing up throughout the county.

A committee meeting of the heads of the recall in this city last evening, according to report, on the mezzanine floor of the Medford hotel. At this meeting plans were discussed, and petitions turned in. It was reported at this meeting that several petitions from county districts had not been turned in. One of these was the Applegate district. The petition in that section was circulated by Bert Moore, former county jailer, who resided in the midst of a debate in the county jail when Elmer Simons was brought back from northern California. A couple of days later Moore was re-employed to look after the court house lawn, etc.

According to reliable information, the Rev. Judson W. Oldfield, pastor of the Congregational church at Ashland, heads the recall committee that held a conference Wednesday evening. Out of three Medford ministers interviewed, two held lukewarm atti-

tudes towards the recall, and the third expressed flat-footed opposition unless on better evidence than wild rumors and gossip.

In spite of the claims that anywhere from 1000 to 2500 names have been secured, in record time, petitions are still being circulated throughout the county, and two paid circulators canvassed the Medford business section Wednesday evening. There was also activity in the residence district, one solicitor for the signature of an invalid lady, and inconsistent in her demands being requested by members of the family to depart.

Friends of Sheriff Terrill are planning on conducting a campaign of education, if the recall is filed, to refute the common, but unsubstantiated yarns that he rented stills seized in raids, and that every time a violator of the prohibition law was arrested, it was with difficulty that the sheriff was prevented from freeing him, only by the strenuous mental and physical efforts of a number of citizens, some of whom have had their eyes on the sheriff's office for a year. These bits of gossip have been circulated so long and consistently that a number of well meaning folks have accepted them as facts.

MEDFORD CHINESE LAUNDRY RAIDED

A party headed by S. B. Sandefur, raided the Hi Sing Chinese laundry on South Riverside last night and confiscated more than a quart of intoxicating liquor, an opium pipe and a small amount of opium in addition to a tobacco can half full of the cleanings from the bowl of the pipe which are re-used by dope fiends.

Several Chinamen were in Justice Taylor's court this morning and the defendant, whose correct name has not as yet been learned, was ordered to appear for trial Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock. He was released under \$500 bond which was signed by an Ashland Chinaman.

JACK DEMPSEY ACCEPTS DEF HARRY WILLS

NEW YORK, June 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey today formally accepted the challenge of Harry Wills, negro, for a bout for the world's heavyweight championship and requested that a conference be held to set the date.

Wills posted a \$2,500 forfeit with his challenge two weeks ago and the New York boxing commission gave Dempsey until July 19 to accept or be deprived of his title in New York state.

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey, champion, will get his first boxing workout today when he spars with Fred Zwickert, a middleweight of the Los Angeles athletic club, according to Gene Doyle, who is in charge of Wills' training camp.

The training for the first few weeks will consist of nothing but light work, such as skipping rope, shadow-boxing, and a few rounds of sparring, Doyle asserted, but as training progresses, tough, hard-hitting, seasoned battles will be called to give Jack his daily workouts.

Von Elm Among Leaders.
KANSAS CITY, June 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—The fight for the semi-final position in the western amateur golf tournament began today at the Hillcrest club, with most of the eight contestants champions of some kind and each a survivor of three days of the super-golf which has seldom been rivaled in any tournament, professional or amateur.

Chick Evans, of Chicago, six times western champion, present title holder and former national amateur and open champion; Dave Herron of Chicago, winner of the national amateur in Pittsburg a few years ago; Fred Wright, who eliminated Evans in the British tournament two years ago when "Chick" was conceded to be America's best bet; George Von Elm, trans-Mississippi and Pacific Northwest champion and loser of only one tournament in the last three years—these were among today's competitors.

Smoke Ball Is King.
CHICAGO, June 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Walter Johnson, "smoke ball" king of the Washington Senators, registered his third straight shutout of the season and the 97th of his sixteen years service in the majors yesterday when he blanked the Yankees, 1 to 0 in a thrilling duel with his youthful rival, Waite Hoyt.

The St. Louis Browns took advantage of the chance to increase their lead, by trouncing Cleveland, 9 to 0 after twice falling before the Indians, while the White Sox won their second straight from the skidding Detroit Tigers and went into undisputed possession of third place.

Cy Williams smashed out homer, No. 11 and Casey Stengel added another circuit blow to his list while the Giants and Phillies split a double header. Incidentally these were the only circuit blows registered in each league.

The Boston Braves knocked Dizzy Vance out of the box and ended their long losing streak by noosing out Brooklyn 5 to 4, while the Pirates climbed back to fourth place after taking another from Chicago, 7 to 2. John Collins with four bingles, led the Red Sox to victory over the Athletics 4 to 2.

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Great Pitching by Earl Hamilton and heavy hitting by his mates made it easy for the Pittsburgh Pirates to beat the Chicago Cubs, 7 to 2.

EUGENE GIRL KILLED, HIT BY AUTOMOBILE

EUGENE, Ore., June 28.—Elsie Jackson, 9, daughter of Thos. Jackson, was killed and her little sister, aged five, slightly injured when they were struck by an automobile at Boringfield last night. CHICK EVANS AND GEORGE VON ELM LEAD OPPONENTS

HILLCREST COUNTRY CLUB, Kansas City, Mo., June 29.—(By Associated Press.) The halfway point in today's 36-hole matches in the third round of the western amateur tournament found Dave Herron of Chicago, former national champion, and Fred Wright of Los Angeles in extremely tough battles, but "Chick" Evans of Chicago, title holder, and George Von Elm of Salt Lake City, running away from their men.

At the 18th hole Evans was five up on Ted Payseur, Des Moines, collegian; Von Elm led Francis Gaines of Omaha, five up; Wright was one up on Jess Tuttle, Kansas City, and Herron had the same lead on Clarence Wolff of St. Louis, getting it with a 16-foot putt for a birdie three on the tenth.

Von Elm's 71 was the best score of the morning, a thirty foot putt on the tenth for the birdie four helping him.

Evans easily outclassed Payseur and repeatedly conceded long putts to the youngster to encourage him.

Rathenau Suspect Caught.

BIDDING LIGHT ON PACIFIC HIGHWAY

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29.—Bids on seven road projects in Oregon, amounting to approximately \$350,000 were opened by the state highway commission here today. Bidding was light, one project involving repairs and abutments to the Pacific highway bridge at Myrtle Creek in Douglas county, failing to receive any offers.

DISCHARGED JOCKEY KILLS RACING MAN

RENO, Nev., June 28.—Leon Wing, racing secretary and one of the judges at the Reno race meeting was shot and killed this morning by Archie Zeigler, a jockey. Zeigler then ran into a barn and shot himself. His condition is serious.

Zeigler was suspended at Vancouver last season and he was refused permission to ride here by Wing and this is said to be the reason for the shooting. Zeigler died later.

BOOTLEGGERS FREED FROM CONDON JAIL

CONDON, Ore., June 28.—James Hunter, Portland police Bertillon expert, was called here today to examine fingerprints left by persons who liberated Joe Woods and W. J. Berwer, prisoners serving jail sentences on bootlegging convictions. The escape was discovered when a deputy sheriff went to feed the prisoners.

Shaniko Woman Murdered.
THE DALLES, Ore., June 28.—Mrs. R. R. Hinton, wife of a prominent sheep rancher, was found dead today at her home six miles northwest of Shaniko from a bullet wound. Coroner Burnett is investigating.
