

NEW REVOLUTION IN RUSSIA IF HAGUE FAILS

CHAUTAUQUA, N. Y.—A revolution in Russia which will dispose of the present Bolshevik regime will follow the inevitable failure of the proposed Russian economic conference at The Hague, says the prophecy of Count Ilya Tolstoy, son of the late Count Leo Tolstoy, the Russian author, in an address here tonight before the convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Inability to pay soldiers and other government employees, who have not been paid for months, will bring about the downfall of the Red government, Count Tolstoy declared.

"The Bolshevik leaders promised to return from the Genoa conference with money to pay the soldiers," Count Tolstoy said, "but they returned empty-handed." Now they have one more bundle of hay to hold in front of the starving horse—the Hague conference. But I am certain they will again be disappointed, and then there may be a revolution. It is difficult to predict what form the new government may take. The monarchistic party is very strongly organized, I am sorry to say, and a revolution may result in the setting up of a new monarchy for a time, but I am certain that eventually there will emerge the United States of Russia! This is what I hope for."

The willingness of British and other European statesmen to recognize the Bolsheviks was deplored by Count Tolstoy, who lauded the action of Secretary of State Hughes and the administration in withholding recognition of the Bolsheviks. "Recognition would only prolong Russia's agony," he said. "The Russian nation belongs to the people which the present rulers do not represent. The Bolsheviks have not been elected or otherwise legally empowered or entrusted with the disposal of Russian resources by the people, and they can offer for sale only stolen property, which cannot be attractive to careful investors."

"I am often asked what my father, Leo Tolstoy, would have said about Bolshevism," said Count Tolstoy. "The answer is given clearly in his teachings. He was opposed to all who wanted to overthrow governments, however despotic, by violence. The accumulated will of an enlightened people would eventually have overthrown the despotism of the Romanoffs without violence and bloodshed. My father was a firm believer in the principle of passive resistance, which is in accordance with the teachings of Christ and of all the greatest sages of the world. Therefore about Bolshevism he would have said, 'this thing is born of war and evil and bloodshed, and no good can result from evil.'"

"The Bolshevik experiment in Russia is one of the worst political failures the world has known," the speaker continued. "By spoiling the incentive of the people to work, through repeated confiscation of the product of their labor, the Bolsheviks have destroyed the creative energy that is the power for progress, the most valuable asset of any country. Those that continue to work in Russia do so out of fear for their lives, or out of sheer necessity in order to barely exist, not out of love for work, which theoretically, is the only basis on which communism can succeed."

NEW YORK CITY TO PUT WELCOME ON ITS DOOR MAT

NEW YORK.—New York, the second largest city in the world—some claim it is the largest—is going back to the favorite boom method of the small town. It is going to appoint a "Welcome Stranger Committee," figuratively to extend to the visitors the keys of the city.

This action was decided upon after the New York Hotel association set forth that folks in other parts of the country had got an entirely wrong idea of the city from what they had read about it in the newspapers.

The job of the new committee is to make it known that, despite the accounts of murders, suicides, holdups and scandals that have been featured in the news, New York is just as safe as any Gopher Prairie—with better water, milk and police protection to boot.

New York is particularly anxious to get this idea across immediately, for it is in the summer that honeymooners flock to the city from the ends of the land.

And the hotel men feel that these visiting couples, perched atop buses touring the city, are somewhat neglected. They need someone to shake them by the hand and show them the invisible ropes of the town, leaving them to pick out Lady Liberty, Grants Tomb and the Woolworth Tower for themselves.

A meeting was called at which shopkeepers, transportation lines and theatrical interests were all represented and it was decided that the visitor must be personally shown that the idea is all wrong that everybody is out to rob him as soon as he sets foot on New York sidewalks.

CANNIBAL BABIES TAKE JOURNEY OF OVER 10,000 MILES

CHICAGO, June.—Basanga and Boked, aged two and a half years and fifteen months respectively, are making a 10,000 mile journey to California from their home at Mondomile, a Congo village within a day's distance from an insurgent tribe of cannibals. According to the children's missionary father, Dr. Ernest B. Pearson, these cannibals eat the Belgian soldiers they capture, both to express their contempt for them and to show that it can be done. Basanga and Boked, whose Christian names are Mary and Paul, were born in a jungle-rimmed village and until they started on the three-month journey to America neither remembered ever seeing another white child. Mary speaks Lunkundo, a Bantu dialect, as well as she does English, and Paul has learned no English as yet.

The children are viewed with little interest the things that they see on their trip. Automobiles and trains are new means of torture for them, as a horse was the only means of conveyance known to them in the Belgian Congo. Their African names were given them by the natives, who according to their custom of calling parents by the names of their first child, dubbed Dr. and Mrs. Pearson as Basanga and Nyang'wa (father of Mary and mother of Paul).

Mrs. Pearson said that the natives call all women missionaries "mama" as a mark of respect, but that some of the single women at first object to the honor. Paul has the latest style in street wear at Mondomile, she said.

A woman who left her husband in the Congo recently was punished, according to Dr. Pearson, by being tied in the path of driver ants, which stung her terribly.

Dr. Pearson is a graduate of the University of Illinois College of Medicine. Mrs. Pearson, who was Miss Evelyn Uiter of Covina, Cal., is descended from the Bullock and Wiley families of Kentucky, and studied at Transylvania college, Lexington, Ky., and at Butler college and the College of Missions, both at Indianapolis, Ind. They serve under the Disciples of Christ.

ROCK ISLAND FLYER WRECKED, ONE KILLED

LINCOLN, Neb., June 28.—Engineer W. C. McClellon of Fairbury, Neb., was killed and a number of passengers on the flyer of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad, received minor injuries when the train went into a ditch, piling up five coaches and the engine near Prairie Home, Neb., early today.

The train, a limited out of Chicago, was made up of steel coaches, which probably saved the lives of many passengers. The giving way of the roadbed, following heavy rains was blamed.
