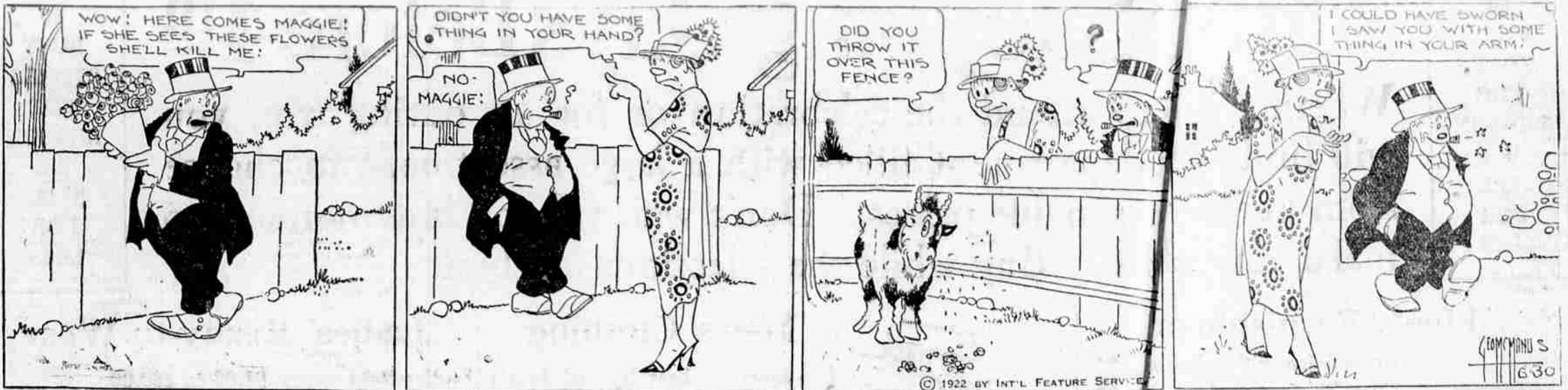

CLARK GRIFFITH
LAUNCHES ATTACK
ON JUDGE LANDIS

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Clark Griffith, president of the Washington American club, today in a statement took exception to the reported lecture recently given by Kenesaw Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, to members of the New York and Boston American league clubs, declaring he considered Judge Landis' remarks, "that the ball players must not gamble, bootleg or carouse around at night, a direct insult to 90 per cent of the ball players of the country."

Noting that Judge Landis' talk to the Yankees and Red Sox had been announced as the first of a series of similar talks, President Griffith declared: "There will be no lectures of the above mentioned kind perpetrated on the players of the Washington club."

This last statement of the Washington club president was considered in baseball circles here as a virtual defiance of the high commissioner of baseball and aroused considerable interest in view of the rule in the new governing code of organized baseball which prohibits public criticism by the magnates of the commissioner's actions.

Von Elm Star Performer
KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 30.—(By Associated Press). The real fight in the western amateur golf tournament began today at the Hillcrest course with "Chick" Evans of Chicago meeting Fred Wright of Los Angeles and George Von Elm of Salt Lake City facing Clarence Wolff of St. Louis in the semi-final rounds to decide what two men will fight it out tomorrow for the title, now held by Evans for the sixth time.

Evans, in fighting for the final chance to defend his title, faced a man with an international reputation in Fred Wright. The elm young shooter from the far west came into real prominence two years ago when he was the last American to be put out in the British amateur tournament.

During the present tournament Wright tied the course record of 70—three under par—in one of the early rounds, and every one of his cards has shown a total either under par or within a stroke or two of perfect figures.

Chick's average figures have not quite equalled Wright's, but he shot the more sensational game in one round and his work has been up to the high Evans standard.

There is little doubt in the minds of the spectators who have followed every match that George Von Elm probably is the player most to be feared in the tournament with the possible exception of Evans.

Von Elm has played the greatest golf of any man thus far. His total scores for qualifying and match rounds are within a stroke or two of par and several times he has gone under the ideal figures.

Von Elm holds two titles now—trans Mississippi and Pacific Northwest. He has won twenty-nine out of thirty tournament matches in the past three years, the only defeat being at the hands of Jess Guilford, national champion in the national amateur play at St. Louis last year.

Permanent Youth Is Not
Assured by New Glands

Disappointment is in store for those men and women who are seeking to regain their lost youth by the transplantation of glands, monkey or otherwise. It is a hard fact to accept, but in spite of all scientific discoveries thus far, youth once lost is lost forever. Such rejuvenation which results from experiments with various glands is fleeting and old age still creeps on.

This and many other interesting facts about glands are discussed in the July number of Hearst's International Magazine in an article called "What Your Glands Are" which has been written especially for the lay reader by a popular writer collaborating with a recognized scientist.

"The glands of which most is known" says the article, "are the thyroid, the pituitary, the adrenals, and the interstitials. There are some twenty or thirty others of which little is known as yet, and which may be just as important. It can readily be seen, however, how even the discovery of the functions of the first four would throw the world of thought into excitement."

"In the water in which tadpoles lived, a certain amount of thyroid extract was placed. The tadpoles began to change into frogs much faster than they would have done naturally. Then there are the experiments of the Austrian surgeon Steinach on white rats. Steinach closes the duct of one gland, and when this has been done, the interstitial gland, which is ductless, becomes greatly enlarged. From the enlargement of the interstitial gland, thus artificially brought about, remarkable results follow. The rat is rejuvenated. Old, blind rats become once more vigorous and active.

The result, unfortunately, is not permanent. After a few weeks, old age again creeps in upon the rat. Then Steinach produces a second rejuvenation by transplanting into the ageing rat a new interstitial gland taken from a young rat.

It is on the knowledge gained thru these experiments of Steinach that the experiments on men are being performed of which the public hears in newspapers, but the results so far obtained have not been conclusive and old age still creeps on.
