LINDAS FILES AS CANDIDATE FOR MAYOR OF CITY

The first candidacy for mayor to
succeed Mayor C. E. Gates, whose
term expires the first of the year and
who many months ago announced that
he would not seek nor accept re-elec-
tion to that office, was filed yesterday
afternoon by Benjamin F. Lindas. It
is expected that several other candi-
dacies will be filed within the next
month or so. The election of mayor
takes place Nov. 7th, at the general
election, when an entire new city coun-
cil also comes up for election.

Mr. Lindas filed his nominating peti-
tion, signed by 30 citizens, with City
Recorder Alford, along with his plat-
form whose main points in brief are
outlined as follows:

Provision for the appointment of 12
taxpayers; four to be appointed from
each ward to act with the mayor and
city council in matters of finance and
taxes.

No irrigation regulations except to
nozzle; filtering plant for the water
system; in water rentals, minimum
and maximum charge for a house of
six rooms, \$1 per month.

Immediate discontinuance of present
monopoly in city garbage business; ap-
pointment of a city scavenger to re-
move all garbage without cost to citi-
zens.

Appointment of city police matron
to look after moral welfare of girls
under age.

City market to be open six days a
week, without exclusive concessions or
price fixing.

Immediate removal of all city
licenses from teams, automobiles,
trucks and jitneys that are owned and
operated in the city by resident tax-
payers.

The Store That Makes its Competitors Hustle

Not Impossible to Talk by Radio With Other Worlds

WASHINGTON, June 28.—It may
not be entirely impossible to open
wireless communication with worlds
other than our own, says Dr. C. G.
Abbott, assistant secretary of the
Smithsonian Institution in its annual
report for 1920 recently made pub-
lic, but the cost would be immense.

If there are any other stars or
planets inhabited by intelligent
beings, and communication could be
rendered possible with them, what a
fund of knowledge might be learned
from them.

"If we could talk freely with intel-
ligences existing on another world,
having history, social customs and
laws, and religious faiths developed
absolutely independently from those
of this world, our conversation would
not only be of surpassing interest to
science and the humanities," Dr. Ab-
bott says, "but what a guide it might
prove to statesmen and sociologists!"

Great interest has been shown
within late years in reports that
wireless stations were receiving sig-
nals which could come only from
another world, he continues. How-
ever, the best information seems to
be that the wireless indications re-

ferred to are merely disturbances in-
troduced by solar or terrestrial
causes as yet imperfectly understood,
and NOT the work of intelligent
beings trying to communicate with
us. At the same time, Dr. Abbott de-
clares, computations have been made
which seem to make it within the
limits of possibility that wireless
communications might be exchanged
with the nearer planets, if it were
worth while doing so.

"Proposals have also been made
from time to time," continues the
scientist, "of communicating by
searchlights or mirrors in the ordi-
nary methods of heliographing. To
me these latter proposals seem alto-
gether too sanguine."

"Certainly for a planet like Venus
which is almost wholly covered by
the fogs, the chance of a beam of
sunlight or searchlight beam pen-
etrating to the surface where it could
be observed by the supposed inhabi-
tants, notwithstanding the glare of
their own atmosphere and the glare
of the whole relatively immense sur-
face of the earth as compared to the
surface of the reflectors or search-

lights employed, is quite beyond
probability. If it were the case of
communicating with the moon, there
would be little doubt but that it could
be accomplished."

"So far as we know, then, any
communications which can be made
with other intelligent beings, if there
are any, must be by means of wire-
less telegraphy or some as yet unde-
covered means of communication."
