

BOGGS & BROMLEY WIN MATCHES IN TENNIS TOURNEY

The West Side Tennis club handicap tournament has been formally opened and play will continue over the weekend. In the opening round of the tournament, Carter Boggs defeated Fletcher Stout 20-30, 22-29 and 22-29. Horace Bromley defeated Rawley Moore 20-30, 30-29 and 30-22. C. C. Lemmon won from Herb Alford by default as the latter injured his leg several days ago while diving from the springboard at Helman's and was unable to play.

The balance of the opening round will be run off today with the semifinals and finals scheduled for Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning.

This tournament is the first in Medford to be governed by the new Spaulding handicap rules and is creating no little interest among local tennis fans.

Another thing arousing interest in the ranks of local tennis players is the new Copco court which is being rushed to completion and which will be finished in the near future. It is planned to have the court ready for play Saturday afternoon of this week. There will, no doubt, be a number of Copco members "among those present" on the opening day.

ANOTHER GANG LIBERTY BOND YEGGS ARRESTED

NEW YORK, June 30.—The federal dragnet spread over the country for traffickers in stolen Liberty bonds today had gathered in five more men as alleged participants in the proceeds of the mail truck robbery in Los Angeles, March 3, and the First National bank of Claysburg, Pa. All were charged with possessing Liberty bonds, knowing them to have been altered, forged or stolen.

Arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitchcock, one of the prisoners, Thomas P. Lamon, who said he was president of the Trans-Coast Finance company, waived examination and was held in \$10,000 bail for the grand jury. Bail for W. F. Pierce, who it developed had been arrested in a similar connection was fixed at \$10,000. The others were Albert Fitzroy, Abraham Rosenthal and Robert Burns. They were held in smaller amounts.

LOS ANGELES, June 30.—The last big mail holdup in Los Angeles was last November, when three armed bandits stole a government mail truck on its way to the Southern Pacific depot, handcuffed the driver, Nelson Grimes, and looted four mail sacks.

Grimes was the victim of another holdup in March, 1921, when the mail truck he was driving was stopped at a railroad crossing by two armed men and several mail sacks stolen.

Bonds and securities valued at thousands of dollars were said to have been lost in these robberies.

NON-PARTISANS ARE BEATEN FOR CONTROL OF N. D.

FARGO, N. D., June 30.—(By the Associated Press).—For the republican senatorial nomination 1899 precincts gave Frazier 74,529; McCumber 79,481.

For republican gubernatorial nomination 1678 precincts gave: Nestos 85,733; Baker 67,015.

FARGO, N. D., June 30.—(By the Associated Press).—Defeat of Porter J. McCumber, senior United States senator from North Dakota and chairman of the senate finance committee, who sought renomination on the republican ticket, was indicated in returns available at noon today from Wednesday's state-wide primary.

Unofficial figures from 1515 of the state's 2064 precincts gave McCumber 65,890 votes, as against 67,541 polled by Lynn J. Frazier, non-partisan league choice, who was governor of the state for six years until he and two other league-endorsed state officials were recalled last fall.

While the league apparently had been successful in the senatorial race, it seemed apparent that it had been defeated in its efforts to capture the republican nomination for state officers, as returns pointed to the renomination of Governor R. A. Nestos, independent. This means no Non-Partisan control in the state as far as the republicans are concerned.

Harding Takes Hand
WASHINGTON, June 30.—(Declaration was made in forcible language at the White House today that the railroad labor board has the full and complete backing of the government.

The White House statement was phrased in the words "that the board is the government when it speaks."

President Harding was said to be disposed to back up the labor board to the utmost because its determinations in wages and other matters are made by the delegated authority of congress and its field of action is definitely marked out by law.

Labor Defies Board
CHICAGO, June 30.—(By the Associated Press).—Leaders of the railroad shop crafts whose nation-wide walkout is set for 10 a. m. tomorrow, today notified the United States railroad labor board that the shop men refuse to delay their strike pending negotiations begun by the board which were to have started at a conference at the board's headquarters at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

"If the telegram of the railroad labor board of June 29 (summoning the shop men's leaders to the conference) means that the board is issuing an order to the shop men that the situation remain in status quo until a settlement is reached," said the letter of B. M. Jewell, shop men's leader, to the labor board, "then the shop men regard it as void, because it forces them into non-acceptable employment."

The letter referred to the United States circuit court ruling in the Pennsylvania railroad case holding that the decisions of the railroad labor board are only advisory.

"Being administrative arm of the government," the letter said, "the board cannot coerce railroad employees into unacceptable employment. The transportation act did not and cannot grant the labor board authority to coerce railroad employees into unacceptable employment."

At 2 o'clock the time set for the conference at the labor board, B. M. Jewell had not appeared, nor had any other of the leaders of the six shop crafts, and at the headquarters of the shopmen on the north side, it was said that Mr. Jewell was not in the city.

SPROUL DENIES S. P. TRYING TO OVERRIDE COURT

SALT LAKE CITY, June 30.—(Flagrant efforts have been made in an anonymous way to mislead the public into the belief that the Southern Pacific railroad company is attempting to override the decision of the supreme court of the United States," said William Sproul, president of the Southern Pacific company last night just before departing for San Francisco.

"It should be remembered that the Southern Pacific has not sought and is not seeking control of any other lines, nor is it urging the separation of a line from some other ownership for its own advantage. We merely ask that the Southern Pacific lines be allowed to continue as a single operating unit in order that the public in its own interest may have the advantage of this company's unbroken public service as a common carrier, rather than a badly disrupted service, as a substitute.

"We ask this only in the orderly processes of the law. We believe that the great public interest is best served by recognizing the advantages of the larger and extended and convenient service given to that public by the present railway system of the Southern Pacific company under existing regulatory control. The commissions, state and federal are endowed with all the powers necessary to make their regulatory control potent and complete.

"There can be nothing improper in our asking the support of the public toward bringing this difficulty to an ultimate conclusion that will maintain operations of this transportation system as a unit justified by the general experience of the people so served. If necessary to accomplish this purpose it may even be that a new law should be enacted to meet the situation."

FORMER TEXAS GOVERNOR AND WIFE TO RUN FOR UNITED STATES SENATE



Mrs. Myrlam A. Ferguson, wife of former Governor James E. Ferguson of Texas, who was impeached during his second term of office, Ferguson decided not to take any chances of being ruled ineligible so he solved the problem by getting his wife to be a candidate. The result is that when the state democratic committee meets in Austin the committeemen will find applications by husband and wife for the same office. If Ferguson's name is not allowed to go on the ticket because of his impeachment, his wife will make the senate race and in this event Ferguson will campaign for her and if elected he will act as her private secretary.

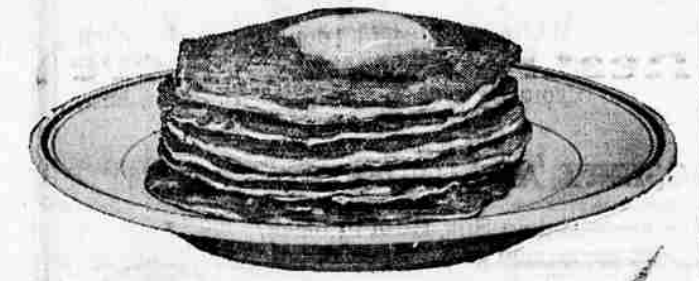

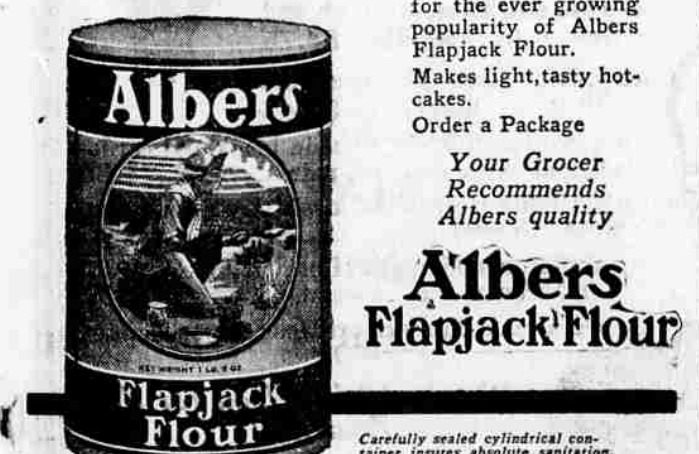
Jacksonville Bank Depositors to Get Ten Per Cent Only

SALEM, June 30.—Dividend checks for 5 per cent of the total deposits in the defunct Bank of Jacksonville are being prepared by the state banking department for distribution among the depositors of the institution, according to F. C. Brannwell, state superintendent of banks.

This is the first dividend to be declared since the bank was closed in August, 1920, and Brannwell states that he does not expect the total paid to the depositors out of the wrecked bank will exceed 10 per cent. Checks in the first dividend will aggregate approximately \$12,000, out of a total of \$250,000 in deposits.
