

DON'T DRINK THE WATER IN ROGUE WARNS DR. HOLT

BANKERS MUST AID COMMUNITY SAYS MANSFIELD

County Physician Declares 3 Reports Show Serious Contamination—Colon Bacilli Numerous—Investigate the Road Camps for Cause.

Don't drink water from Rogue river! This is the warning by Dr. W. P. Holt, county physician, made public today.

Dr. Holt has recently sent three specimens of water taken from the river from the Dodge bridge to Trail to Portland for analysis and each report has been "water not fit to drink."

The cause of the contamination is not known, but that it is a serious contamination is shown by the report of from 50 to 200 bacilli per cubic centimeter.

The colon bacilli form the dangerous element, and more than 2 colon bacilli per cubic centimeter is dangerous to health, according to official governmental reports.

Dr. Holt is investigating the road camps on the river, but as yet has found no condition which would account for the deplorable condition. The state physician means that human sewage is contaminating the water somewhere at least as far up the river as Trail.

That farming is the poorest paid business in the United States today that the banks of the country are killing the farmer who makes their business for them and that organized farming is the only salvation of agriculture. Were several of the scores of interesting statements made by George A. Mansfield, president of the State Farm Bureau, before a road sized audience at the Public Library last night.

Mr. Mansfield offered many suggestions on how to make farming a profitable business. He did not tell his audience how to grow this or that but he outlined to them how they might, if they would co-operate, change business methods and demand things of the rest of the population which would bring them a fair profit.

He stated that the department of agriculture reported, after an exhaustive survey of hundreds of farms in different states that farming was the poorest paying business in the United States for the money invested. Statistics which the speaker quoted showed that the farmer got only about one-third of what his produce sold for.

In order to remedy this condition co-operation of farmers must come about. The speaker pointed out that all other businesses are organized and showed conclusively that unless the farmer organized he would eventually perish. He advocated the establishment of a co-operative creamery and cheese factory in the Rogue River valley as well as the establishment of a co-operative factory for the manufacture of scratch food, etc., from the coarse grains. He urged that every member of the farming community be a member of the Farm Bureau.

Banks Are Criticized.
In order to back these co-operative projects which spell prosperity for the farmer the aid of the banks must be had. Mr. Mansfield stated that if banks wished to lead in the community in which they live, as they always have done, that they must get behind live, up-to-date, solid, safe enterprises.

At this point in his speech, Mr. Mansfield expressed his opinion of banks in general and showed how, in his opinion the banks of the entire country, blind with greed, were killing the goose with the golden eggs. He stated that every railroad of any importance in the entire U. S. is now controlled by a series of New York banks with interlocking directorates. The banks stated Mr. Mansfield, own the railroad equipment companies also. They charge their own railroads exorbitant prices for car wheels or other equipment and then raise the

road rates in order to pay the excessive expenses of obtaining the wheels, finally winding up by depositing the increased revenue from the procedure in their own pockets. The increased rates bleed the farmer and unless the bleeding is stopped the banks will kill the prosperity which fattens them.

The speaker pointed out that the banks are always organized and prepared and always appear in the legislature. He stated that they must quit the three-ball stuff and be willing to take a reasonable gain on their loans and do a legitimate business without trying to grab everything in sight.

He stated that banks would make loans to merchants for the purpose of buying a stock of goods and consider it good business, but that they refused to loan to the farmer who would harvest his crop and pay the loan as soon as the crop was sold. They don't seem to realize, stated the speaker, that the merchant can't pay them until the farmer has harvested his crop, sold it, purchased the merchant's stock of goods and paid him for it.

For a solution of this problem, Mr. Mansfield recommended co-operation through the state and national Farm Bureau. The representation of the farming interests at public hearings, in the legislature and elsewhere. A demand by an organized body of farmers that conditions be improved, that their financial solidity be recognized and that they be granted upon no longer would be very effective, stated the speaker. He stated that organization was the only salvation of the farming situation. The farmer now puts up with all sorts of unprincipled grafts and never objects. This is illustrated by the fact that an examiner in Portland heard a case involving the raising of the railroad shipment rate on coarse grains in Oregon 10 per cent he stated that it was the first time a farmer had ever appeared before him in Portland to protest being robbed. The farmer was Mr. Mansfield and he gave reasons and figures why the coarse grain rate in Oregon should not be raised.

K. K. K., IN ANSWER LIBEL SUIT, DENIES BRANCH IN COUNTY

Answers to the suit of B. F. Lindas for \$25,000 for alleged damages as the result of an affidavit, alleging Lindas sought, but was denied admission into the Ku Klux Klan have been filed in the circuit court by Attorney John Jefferys of Portland, acting for the organization and H. E. Griffiths, a Kiegle stationed in this city.

Griffiths in his answer asserts that the "affidavit was, and is true" and, further alleges that Lindas "seeks public notoriety" in filing the suit, and also "political power" and "prestige among the opponents of the Ku Klux Klan." It is also alleged in the answer that the plaintiff is not sufficiently versed in legal procedure "to start a suit," and in conclusion

prays that the suit be dismissed, and the costs and disbursements be assessed to Lindas.

The Ku Klux Klan, as an organization, files a short answer, stating that the seat of the order is at Atlanta, Ga., and that there is no branch in this county hence no action is possible, except in Georgia.

cluding the central hall and library, and the irregulars were forced to retire to the rear of the eastern section, a considerable portion of which was blown away by artillery fire.

Thomas Darcy, one of the signatories to the irregulars' proclamation, and chief of staff of the irregulars, was made prisoner.

LONDON, June 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—Irish free state troops have attacked strongholds of the irregulars in Letterkenny, Bencrana, and other centers in county Donegal, says a Central News dispatch from Belfast.

A Dispatch to the Press Association received here shortly before 1 p. m., said that the Four Courts was on fire and that a great explosion had shaken a large part of the city a few moments before the dispatch was filed.

Details are lacking, but it is believed the irregulars left a mine behind them and that the building was ignited and the mine exploded.

LONDON, June 30.—(By the Asso-

ciated Press.)—Reports received in official quarters from Dublin today stated that the Four Courts building had been blown up.

BELFAST, June 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—The republicans in the Four Courts at Dublin are escaping from the building by means of a tunnel which they constructed for use in an emergency, says a Dublin message received here this afternoon.

Their flight followed a tremendous explosion at 12:30 o'clock in the Four Courts, followed by a shower of legal documents, the message states.

30 Are Killed

DUBLIN, June 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—Unofficial estimates of the casualties in the two days fighting here place the number of killed at 30, with more than 50 wounded. This forenoon 12 deaths were reported and 20 wounded, the latter including both men in the fighting and private citizens.

DUBLIN, June 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—An Irish republican war news poster says that Eamon De Valera, the republican leader, is on active service with the Dublin Brigade, fighting for the Irish republic.
