Items of Interest From the Rogue River Valley

FORD CAR GOES TO LUCKY PERSON ASHLAND, MONDAY

ASHLAND, June 30.—"This car to be given away" is the legend attached to the Ford auto which will be drawn by somebody on Monday evening, July 3. The machine is a neat roadster, and is being driven around town and surrounding country in order to exhibit its good points. On Monday next occurs the original and unique parade of the Fords, and in connection with this spectacle one thousand dollars in cash prizes will be given away in addition to the car, which is of the 1922 model. Coupons are offered by a hundred local merchants. Minor prizes in the way of merchandise of all kinds are also available.

A ballgame for championship of southern Oregon is scheduled for Monday, also dancing afternoon and evening, with the big wrestling match the same night. Quilt pitching will be another diversion on both days, and those who think this is a tame pastime ought to watch the horseshoes flying through the air at the hands of all comers, women being eligible to the game as well as men.

The great spectacular event will be the parade, as staged by the Lithians, Tuesday morning at 10:30, in connection with which the pageant of 1776 will be a resplendent one, incorporating beautiful floats, decorated cars, marching organizations, bands, clowns and mountebanks affording unique and original features. Another boxing bout at the armory in the evening, theatrical attractions, and dancing at the great open air pavilion, street carnival at night, all to conclude with the most gorgeous fireworks display ever shown in Lithia, and there have been some hummers in this respect.

Shrine decorations at the depot have been removed, and a display more in keeping with the national holiday have been substituted therefor. Harold Simpson and Meredith Beaver, decorators, have had these duties in charge. "Old Glory," the colossal flag which has done duty at the Chautauqua auditorium for years past, is in evidence on city hall, where its graceful folds are the cynosure of all eyes. There is talk of the Shrine patrol participating in the parade. "Pop" Welschberger, the standard bearer, is still in California, but the personnel of the organization in the main is still available.

A committee is charged with the duty of impressing somebody into service, not as the goddess of liberty, but an individual personating Henry Ford, himself, to carry out a popular idea on "Ford Day." Fred Wagner, Al Kinney, Irving Finley, George Dunn, Emil Peil, and Bill Day have been mentioned in succession for this important proxy, many being called but few are chosen. The womenfolk, however, of the Muschel Shoals precinct of the First ward are urging Hubert Hyer for the place.

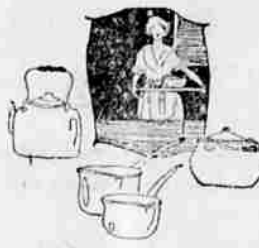
