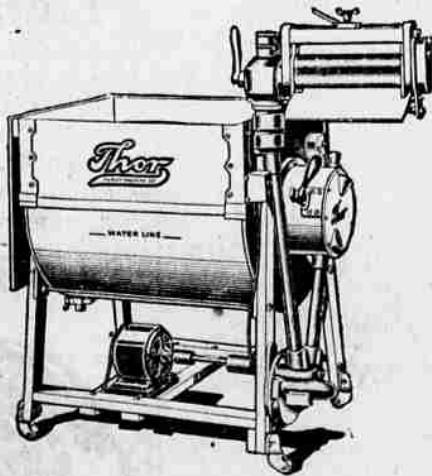

WORLD PRAISES U. S. EXPERIMENT IN PROHIBITION

CHICAGO, June 30.—Fourteen bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church at a meeting of the boards of benevolence of the church here today unanimously adopted a statement upholding prohibition and "anticipating with confidence the day when, despite the cupid of some and the treasonable intrigue of others, the life of the nation shall be lifted to the level of its laws."

The statement in part follows: "The bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church have noted the present discussion of the Volstead act and the 18th amendment to our constitution. Such discussion was to be expected. Ingenuity would be exhausted to discover or invent reasons for the repeal of the laws."

"Allowing that all results anticipated have not been realized, that fact lies not against the law but against those who have failed in its enforcement and against those who have encouraged the betrayal of administrative trust. When all has been said, the accomplishment in the writing of these particular laws mark the greatest chapter in America's story of moral reform. It has attracted the attention of the world. It has given to our industrial life an advantage recognized by economists everywhere. "The relation of the drink traffic to crime has long been familiar."

MASTER MIND IN BOND STEAL DENIES KIDNAPING CHARGE

CHICAGO, June 30.—John W. Worthington, alleged master mind of a ring of bond thieves and mail robbers today denied reports which had been circulated in official circles that he had been kidnaped and tortured by alleged former confederates and forced to turn over \$25,000 to them.

Speaking over the telephone from his hotel room, apparently with painful effort in a weak and husky voice, Worthington said he had been kept to his bed for eight weeks, but by a development from an illness from which he had suffered for years.

According to the reports, the alleged kidnaping was his second abduction by alleged former confederates in an attempt to extort property from him. Worthington, however, this morning said he had never been kidnaped or tortured.

Oregon's Contribution Sent to Near East

LOS ANGELES, June 30.—Half a million pounds of foodstuffs and clothing were to be started for the Near East from Los Angeles recently aboard the United American line freighter Nebraska.

The shipment represents donations for the famine sufferers of the Near East by residents of northern and southern California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada and Arizona.

CLUB WOMAN IN FAVOR ABOLITION OF COUNTY JAILS

CHAUTAQUA, N. Y., June 30.—Mrs. Thomas C. Winter of Minneapolis, Minn., was nominated for re-election as president of the general federation of women's clubs at the biennial convention in session here Tuesday. The remainder of the ticket, all unopposed, includes:

Mrs. William S. Jennings, Jacksonville, Fla., first vice president; Mrs. Wallace T. Perham, Glendive, Mont., second vice president; Mrs. James Hayes, Atlanta, Ga., recording secretary; Mrs. Florence Floore, Cleburne, Texas, treasurer.

The election will take place on Thursday.

Two resolutions concerning motion pictures were considered today by the resolutions committee. One resolution sponsored by the Georgia federation endorses the "better film organizations," the other, advanced by the federation chairman of moving pictures, Mrs. Wood Allen Chapman of New York, recommends co-operation with all organizations interested in moving pictures.

Today's program called for conferences on industrial and business relations, institutional relations, Indian welfare and social service.

"Conditions in the average county jail are intolerable," said Miss Julia K. Jaffray of New York City, chairman of the committee on institutional affairs. "County jails should be abolished and in their stead farm colonies should be set up under state control where convicts can be trained to work and where they are paid according to the amount of work they do."

Mrs. H. A. Atwood of Riverside, Cal., presented the results of a survey of Indian reservations and urged education for Indians with the ultimate aim of fitting them for full citizenship.

MEXICANS SEIZE U. S. AIRPLANE L. CALIFORNIA

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 30.—Four Americans seized by Mexicans at Tecate, Lower California recently following a forced landing of an airplane, were released today, according to United States customs officials here.

James Hennessy, commercial pilot, filed a complaint with Mexican authorities at Tijuana, Lower California, against the seizure and retention of his airplane, which he said he was taking to the Imperial valley of California to sell when engine trouble forced him to land at Tecate.

Hennessy said the three other Americans arrested at Tecate were in an automobile which the Mexican soldiers asserted contained 50 gallons of whiskey. Hennessy asserted he did not know these men and the United States officials here are withholding their names pending investigation.

S. P. HORSE GETS A PENSION FOR LIFE

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., June 30.—As a fitting reward for his many years of faithful service "Tom," veteran railroad horse employed in the Southern Pacific company's mill at West Oakland, California, is to be "pensioned," and sent to a ranch to spend the remainder of his days in equine bliss.

To add to "Tom's" cup of happiness, it has been decided to send him to the ranch of his former master, also a retired Southern Pacific veteran, F. V. Carman, formerly superintendent of the West Oakland mill, and well known inventor, who recently retired from active duty after 47 years of service with the company.

For 12 years Tom has diligently served the company by hauling shavings, lumber and doing odd jobs about the mill yard, but a small tractor now stands supreme in the domain where Tom formerly ruled.

Through his amicable disposition, Tom is a favorite among West Oakland employees and children in the neighborhood who often bring him lumps of sugar and other tidbits.

Carman's ranch is located near Modesto in the San Joaquin valley and Tom is to be allowed to frolic in green pastures to his heart's delight.
