R. R. STRIKE ON; THOUSANDS QUIT WORK

80 SHOPMEN WALK OUT IN ASHLAND

Strike On Pacific Coast Goes Into Effect Promptly at 10 A. M.—90 Per Cent Effective in Oregon, California and Washington—No Disorders, Traffic As Usual.

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 1.—One hundred and fifty shop craftsmen walked out here today promptly at ten o'clock. They have established headquarters here. The local Southern Pacific shops are virtually quiet and only maintenance of way men can be seen around the yards. Eighty men walked out at Ashland at the same time.

CHICAGO, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The power of the United States government coupled with public sentiment, will give every protection to every railway employee who remains on the job and to all men who take the place of strikers in the present railroad walkout, Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States railroad labor board, declared in a statement today.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Disorders in connection with the strike of union shop men, called for today, occurred at the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad company's roundhouse at Ivy City, Md., near here, early in the day when men said to be employees of the company drove from the vicinity of the roundhouse a detail of special guards sent there by the railroad to protect the property. The men are said to have mistaken the guards for strike-breakers. A hand to hand tussle took place before the guards withdrew, but no one was injured.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—The strike of railroad shop men was more than 90 per cent effective in California, Oregon and Washington, according to statements of union leaders an hour after it was called. Early figures showed that 9,750 men had ceased work, with several points yet to report. Railroad officials were not yet ready with their figures.

In California, 6,850 were reported to have walked out, 5,350 of them from Southern Pacific employ and 1,500 from the Santa Fe railroad.

Oregon reported 1,130 Southern Pacific shop men idle and that 500 Union Pacific men had walked out. In Washington state 4,196 shop men quit, of whom 1,276 were employed by the Union Pacific, 1,500 by the Northern Pacific and 1,420 by the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul.

CHICAGO, July 1.—Notwithstanding the efforts of the federal government, acting through the United States railroad labor board, to throttle a strike of the nation's railway shop workers, thousands of shop men answered the call of the union leaders and laid down their tools at ten o'clock this morning.

Beginning in the New England states at ten o'clock eastern time, the shop men walked out generally on the Boston and Maine, New Haven, Bangor and Aroostook and other roads. Gradually the walkout spread westward as the roundhouse clocks approached the zero hour, ten o'clock local time.

By noon defections were reported from every big road in the east, south and central west, including the New York Central lines, the Erie, Pennsylvania, Northwestern, Burlington, Chicago and Alton, Southern, Baltimore and Ohio, and the Rock Island.

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'UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER!' SHOUTS SUN YAT SEN TO HIS VANQUISHER

CANTON, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Unconditional surrender of Chen Chung-Ming and his troops, whom he branded "rebels," is the only arrangement Sun Yat Sen will make with the man who overthrew his south China government. Sun made this defiant declaration to the Associated Press correspondent today aboard the gunboat Yung Fung, on which he has established headquarters near Whampoa.

Blacks, Given Chance By Georgia Governor, Are Lynched By Mob

JESUP, Ga., July 1.—James Harvey and Joe Jordan, negroes, convicted of criminal assault and respited by Governor Hardwick, were taken from a deputy sheriff near Lanesbridge, Ga., and lynched early today, a telephone message to Sheriff Rogers here said. The negroes were removed from Wayne county to Savannah for safe keeping. J. R. Tyre, deputy in charge of the prisoners, reported the lynching.

HIGH EXPENSE OF RECALL MAY HALT ELECTION

Taxpayers Object to Paying \$3000 to Settle Political Fuss—Recall Would Cost More Than Sheriff's Salary for Year.

No recall petitions for Sheriff Terrell were filed with the county clerk today, and no reason was forthcoming why this long threatened action had not come to pass. In spite of the report that 1600 names were secured the first day, the petitions are still being circulated.

County Clerk Florey said this morning that the cost of a recall election would be over \$3,000, at the lowest estimate, a regular election costing \$5,000, and that the salary of the sheriff for one year is approximately \$2,400. Many taxpayers and property holders are strenuously opposed to the expenditure of county money in excess of the sheriff's salary, to settle a political fuss, and throw the county into turmoil for a month.

The opponents of the recall also argue that if the sheriff has been derelict or guilty of wrongdoing, the courts are still functioning, and the proper procedure is to take the issue there and settle it there, instead of through the medium of gossip and rumor, and systematic scandal mongering. Many desire to see so called evidence substantiated and are more or less dubious about the sources of some of the wild charges, which have been scattered incessantly for over a year.

It has also developed that there is a well defined split between the recall forces, one side maintaining that the recall is an "uplift movement," and the other that certain organizations have been made the tools of designing politicians and talkative office-seekers. The latter contenders point to the anxiety over who will be chief deputy sheriff, if the recall carries, as a clincher for their viewpoint.

There still persists considerable talk about a recall for other county officials, the rural districts are not enthused over the administration of county affairs in general and are by no means backward about mentioning it. Business men in both Ashland and Medford, as a rule hold that local conditions at this time, do not warrant a recall of anybody.

PLEADS FOR CESSATION OF COAL STRIKE

President Harding Urges Coal Workers and Operators to Reach Agreement and End Walk-Out—Rights of Public Paramount—No Time for Radicalism.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Miners and operators numbering about fifty and representing both the bituminous and anthracite coal fields in which work has been suspended since April 1, met at the White House today with President Harding in an endeavor instituted by the government to find a basis for negotiating a settlement of differences.

President Harding opened the conference in executive session with an address to the two parties speaking only about ten minutes.

The conference then was adjourned to a meeting room in the interior department and there continued in executive session.

A. M. Ogilvie, president of the National Coal association who is representative of the bituminous operators was elected chairman and William Green, general secretary-treasurer of the United Mine Workers, was elected secretary. Secretaries Hoover and Davis accompanied the party to the interior department meeting.

No Time for Radicalism
President Harding in convening the conference advised both parties to arrive with measurable promptness at an understanding "for your mutual good and the country's common good."

The president declared the present was no time for "the militant note of the radical" and reminded the conference that "toleration, fairness, the spirit to give and take and finally a sense of the larger obligations to the public are essential to successful conference."

Coupled with his appeal and admonition the president uttered what was regarded as a warning when he said that if the operators and miners could not "settle this matter in a frank recognition of the mutuality of your interests" then the larger public interest must be asserted in the name of the people where the common good is the first and highest concern.

"We wish you who best know the way to solution to reach it among yourselves in a manner to command the sanction of American public opinion," the president said.

Failing in that, the servants of the American people will be called to the task in the name of American safety and for the greatest good of all the people."

Guard Public Rights
Another pointed statement in the president's address was: "Labor has the right, capital has the right, and above all else, the American people has the right to be freed from these recurring anxieties (strikes) no matter what the causes are. That freedom must be established."

Since President Harding's call for the conference to consider possible methods for settlement of the controversy, it has been emphasized by administration officials that it was the desire of the government that the meeting should be held above the controversial issues involved and rather lay the basis and safeguard the way for another conference fully authorized to deal with these. It was reiterated as the administration's purpose today to give the participants free opportunity at the start to attempt to work out their own plans for a settlement.

Of the fifty men participating in the conference, half are miners union officials, three speak for the general committee of anthracite operators and the remainder are the operators selected to represent the various districts of the bituminous field.

President Harding, after welcoming those attending the conference, was leaving the city today for an absence of a week, but Secretaries Hoover and Davis were expected to remain in the conference.

No Signs of Weakening
There were no signs of weakening in the opposing contentions of coal miners and operators as they gathered at the White House. The operators in informal discussion appeared a unit in

EAGLE POINT BOY KILLED BY AUTO ON C. LAKE ROAD

Harold Denton, Ten-Year-Old Son of Elizabeth Denton of Eagle Point, Is Instantly Killed When Hit By Auto, Crater Lake Highway.

Harold Allen Denton, age ten years, son of Elijah Denton of Eagle Point, was killed in an auto accident Friday afternoon about six o'clock on the Crater Lake highway near his home. With two other boys, Harold was riding on a hay wagon, loaded with hay being hauled to the barn. When he reached the house, he jumped off to get a drink, and was struck by an auto driven by Ray McDonald, age 27 years, a tourist, whose home is at Center Lake, Mich. McDonald has been in the valley for about a month and with five others was returning from a trip to Crater Lake. The boy lived for 30 minutes after the accident. Dr. W. P. Holt attended him. Coroner Perl made an investigation of the tragedy, and from witnesses decided that the accident was unavoidable, and that no blame was attached to McDonald, who was deeply affected by the accident. The unfortunate youth stepped directly out in front of the approaching car and there was no time for applying the emergency brakes.

There will be no inquest and the funeral arrangements will be announced later.

CHICK EVANS TOO MUCH FOR VON ELM

HILLCREST COUNTRY CLUB, Kansas City, Mo., July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Chick Evans of Chicago won the western amateur golf championship for the seventh time when he defeated George Von Elm of Salt Lake City today 5 and 4 over the Hillcrest course.

KANSAS CITY, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Shooting in sensational fashion, Chick Evans of Chicago was five up on George Von Elm of Salt Lake City at the 18th hole of their 36-hole match for the western amateur golf championship.

Evans shot the first nine in 34, three under par and the second in 35, one under, against Von Elm's 77-49-77, the latter's wildness causing him much trouble. Chick's 69 medal score was four under par and was made through absolutely straight wooden shots and approaches which always stuck near the cup. Von Elm repeatedly pushed his wooden shots and frequently was in trouble.

800 Men Arrested For Witnessing Veil Dance, Chicago Club

CHICAGO, July 1.—Eight hundred men guests at the Emil Zola club, where the entertainment included a veil dance by four young women clad only in scant pieces of gauze, were arrested by police raiding parties early today. Patrol wagons from five stations working in relays were used to transfer the prisoners to several stations, where they were booked for disorderly conduct. Harry Cohen, host at the entertainment, was charged with violating a state statute prohibiting indecent public performances. The four women, after discarding their veils for more substantial attire, were booked on similar charges and ordered to appear in the morals court with Cohen. The raid establishes a record for the number of arrests in one day.

SOVIET WANTS \$1,612,000,000 GOLD TO START

Russian Spokesman at Hague Astonishes European Experts By Estimate of What Country Wants to Start in Business Again.

THE HAGUE, June 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—The sum of 1,612,000,000 gold dollars is the total amount of credits the central soviet government would like from the powers to inaugurate the immense task of reconstructing Russia.

Expressions of astonishment by the European experts were voiced when Maxim Litvinoff, Russian spokesman, announced the figure today. Further details were asked by the experts and these will be presented later in writing.

M. Litvinoff divided the credit requirements into four headings—first, transport, including railway, water and motor transport and the repair of ports and roads, \$525,000,000; second, agriculture, including irrigation, replacement of seeds and model stock farms, fertilizers, machinery and motor tractors, \$462,000,000; third, industrial reconstruction including textile, metallurgical and timber industries, \$375,000,000; fourth, commercial and bank credits, \$250,000,000.

The oil industry was not provided for in the estimate because it would be possible to lease oil areas to concerns which would furnish their own capital, Mr. Litvinoff said.

After declaring that Russia's pre-war wealth of 75,000,000,000 gold dollars had been reduced through war and foreign intervention, by five-twelfths, M. Litvinoff pointed out that the estimates submitted today had been cut two-thirds from the original figures. They represented Russia's urgent needs and would permit restoration of her economic life to a point where imports and exports could be balanced and interest could be paid on loans.

NEW \$80,000,000 AUTO MERGER IS EFFECTED AT DAYTON, OHIO

DAYTON, Ohio, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—An \$80,000,000 consolidation of manufacturers of automobiles, trucks and automobile parts with factories in seven states, has been completed here under the name of Associated Motor Industries. Will I. Ohmer of Dayton is chairman of the board. The merger includes seven automobile and truck factories in addition to motor, body, gear, ignition and other part makers. Offices will be here.

Full speed production will be started within a few days in all plants, it was announced. A number of other manufacturers of cars are being considered in the consolidation and some additions may be announced soon, it was said.

Besides the manufacturing plants involved, five assembling plants will be operated, located at Indianapolis, Boston, Louisville, Oakland, Cal., and St. Louis, Mo.

DEVALERA ON FIRING LINE IN IRELAND

Former President Leads Irregulars in Last Stand Against Free State Forces—Morale of Bitter Enders Believed Breaking—Dublin Bridge Is Blown Up.

DUBLIN, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The provisional free state government turned today to the task of clearing out the remaining nests of insurgents following the fall of the Four Courts, the chief stronghold of the anti-treaty forces.

The surrender this morning of more than 50 rebels who had been holding out in the Capel street areas was hailed as evidence that the morale of the republicans had been weakened by the yielding of Rory O'Connor and Liam Mellows, two of their strongest fighting leaders.

The plan of action against the irregulars who have established themselves in hotels and other premises, will probably assume the form of an encircling movement with "intense fields of action in certain areas."

Total Casualties 100
The total casualties in the three days' fighting have not yet been ascertained, but it is estimated they will not greatly exceed 100, the fatalities being placed at about 40.

The next area to receive attention will be the Sackville district probably, several blocks east of the Four Courts, where the republicans last night took over a block of buildings, including the postoffice and the Gresham Granville and Hamman's hotels.

It is reported on good authority that Eamon De Valera is in personal charge of the Sackville area for the republicans who are reported to be making elaborate preparations to repulse any attack, even breaking through the side walls in order to connect all the buildings. This morning the windows bristled with rifles. The ruins of the Four Courts were still blazing furiously this morning.

BELFAST, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The big main line bridge two miles south of Drogheda has been blown up, severing railway communication between Belfast and Dublin.

DUBLIN, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—More than 50 insurgents who had been holding out in the Capel street area surrendered to the government forces at 2 o'clock this morning and were marched to the Wellington barracks, says a statement issued by the national army headquarters. Capel street is in the vicinity of the Four Courts building which is still burning.

It is reported on good authority that Eamon De Valera is in command of a detachment of insurgents which is holding out against the government troops in Sackville street, several blocks east of the Four Courts.
