

U. S. BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR IS DULY BALANCED

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The government balanced its budget for the fiscal year ending yesterday, an accomplishment described by Under Secretary of the Treasury Gilbert as "no mean task." Prospects for the fiscal year 1923 "are not good," with a budget deficit estimated as high as \$485,000,000, he said.

Final treasury reports for the closing fiscal year will not be available for a day or two, but Mr. Gilbert who has charge of the government finances, declared that expenditures for the year would be less than \$2,900,000,000 or \$500,000,000 less than was estimated as necessary by the spending departments at the outset of the year, and that there would be a small surplus of receipts.

As to the coming year, the under-secretary pointed to the possibility of a deficit greater than already estimated as, he contended, appropriations for the next year have not yet been passed by congress.

The total gross debt of the United States was about \$22,550,000, a total reduction of over \$3,500,000,000 since its peak on August 31, 1919, he explained.

For the future, he asserted, liquidation of the public debt will have to be accomplished chiefly from surplus revenue receipts.

Enough has been accomplished, Mr. Gilbert stated, to assure the success of the treasury's plans for refunding the \$7,500,000,000 short dated debt, consisting of Victory notes maturing in May, 1923, treasury certificates of indebtedness and war savings certificates.

CINCINNATI COLT WINTS AT LATONIA

LATONIA RACE TRACK, Latonia, N. Y., July 1.—Thibodeaux, ridden by Jockey Earl Pool, won the \$15,000 Latonia derby here today.

Yoshimi finished second and Olympus third. Time for the mile and half was 2:33 4-5. Only three horses started.

CINCINNATI, July 1.—(By Associated Press.) Latonia again today was the battle ground of the east against the west, in the running of the 40th renewal of the Latonia derby. The race is for three-year-olds over a distance of a mile and a half for \$15,000. Hopes of the east reposed in Olympus and Brewster, a fleet pair from the stable of Harry Payne Whitney, while the westerners placed their trust in Thibodeaux, the Cincinnati-owned colt that defeated Morvich for second place in the \$50,000 Kentucky special a week ago and was less than his own length behind Whiskaway, winner of that event at the finish. Other western entrants are Yoshimi, owned by T. C. Bradley and Margaret Winsor.

declaring that no continuation of central competitive field wage agreements which constitutes the semi-national contract would be allowed, while John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, and his district presidents indicated themselves inclined to insist on this.

The bituminous operators withheld until the last minute the names of their representatives who had formal authority from their districts to treat with the miners union and the president. For the government, Secretaries Hoover, Davis and Fall went into the president's office. Attorney General Daugherty, although cloaked with the president for some minutes before the meeting opened, said the department of justice would not be concerned in the matter for the present.

TALENT HERD OF COWS MAKES BEST MILK AVERAGE

Two hundred and fourteen cows were tested in the Rogue River association in June, and 43 of these produced more than 40 pounds of butterfat. Rose, owned by E. B. Poyer of Ashland, again heads the list with a record of 1536 pounds of milk and 75.80 pounds of fat. Beut, in the herd of Fred Puhl of Medford, is second with 1383 pounds of milk and 69.15 of fat.

The highest herd average of more than 12 cows is held by R. E. Robinson of Talent, with a production of 864 of milk and 41.93 of fat. The herd of Joseph Sanders of Ashland averaged 760 pounds of milk and 32.25 of fat. The list of 12 cows or under is headed by E. B. Poyer of Ashland with 1656 pounds of milk and 46.65 of butterfat. E. Puhl is second with 867 of milk and 37.32 of fat.

FRENCHMAN SAYS FLAPPER IS MAIN HOPE OF WORLD

NEW YORK, July 1.—"Jazz should be our national pastime; the flapper, God bless her, is the hope of the modern world."

This is the opinion of Andre Tridon, noted psychologist and psycho-analyst, who today in an interview severely flayed "damn fool reformers" and upheld jazz as the "decent, satisfying" of our gorilla instincts and the flapper as a "revolt against government by old maids."

"The reformer," declared Dr. Tridon, is nothing more than a meddler who has nothing else to do. The average reformer is a damn fool who cannot get into the papers any other way.

"Jazz should be encouraged. It is the modern saturnalia which allows us to satisfy our gorilla instincts in a ballroom in a perfectly decent and open manner. It is an excellent substitute for the breaking down of stiff, formal social barriers and provides for an atmosphere conducive to decent fun and sport.

"Jazz should be our national pastime. It provides an outlet for our excess energy."

Turning to the flapper, the noted physician characterized her as the hope of the modern world.

"God bless her, for her picturesque costume and original ways," he declared. "She adds color to the drabness of the city. The flapper of today will be a better mother than the mothers of the past, because she will grow up with her children, mingle with them, understand and love them."

TARIFF 30 CENTS A BUSHEL ON APPLES

WASHINGTON, July 1.—With little discussion, the senate today approved a committee rate of 30 cents a bushel on apples, an increase of five cents over the house rate. Also, it approved a new amendment making a new rate of half a cent a pound on apricots, green, ripe or in brine, and a duty of 30 per cent ad valorem on apricots otherwise prepared.

Increases in duties on freights were voted by the senate in rapid succession. Rates approved included: Berries, edible in natural condition, 1 1/4 cents a pound, house rate 1 cent; prepared or preserved 35 per cent ad valorem; house rate 20 per cent.

Pineapples 22 1/2 cents per crate; in bulk three-fourths of one cent each; candied or otherwise prepared two cents a pound, house rate 3 1/2 cents.

Plums, prunes and prunelles, green, ripe or in brine, half cent pound, house rate same; otherwise prepared or preserved 40 per cent, original rate 35 per cent, house rate 20 per cent.

The roads to Fort Klamath are reported to be in good condition and the round up committee are anticipating a large crowd.

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U. S. Fuel Company Held By Mex Bandits 10,000 Peso Ransom

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The Palo Blanco camp of Penn-Mex-U. S. Fuel company near Tuxtla, Mexico, has been raided by Mexican bandits under a General Larraga and the property is held for 10,000 pesos ransom, according to a message from Consul Shaw at Tampico, to the state department, sent late yesterday. The payment was demanded by July 1 but details of the raid were unavailable the message added.

The Penn-Mex-U. S. Fuel company is an American concern.

The message did not say whether any Americans had been held by the bandits.

FILE MURDER CHARGE AS MAN IS BURIED

YAKIMA, Wash., July 1.—As funeral services were being held for Arthur Wright who died as a result of a gun fight on June 20, an information charging Claude Labbee with murder in the first degree for his alleged shooting of Wright was placed on file in the county jail and refused to talk. The dead man's widow, who is still in a critical condition, is named as one of the witnesses for the state.

FOREST FIRES GENERAL IN WASHINGTON STATE

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 1.—While fires are reported to be burning all over the state, no serious situations had developed today, State Forester Fred E. Pape said, although conditions are ripe for trouble. An easterly wind is a thing most feared.

State fire wardens are making their main fight along green timber lines as it is practically impossible to stop fires in old logging works, the state forester said.

Many fires of early May have started up again and are burning over the same ground. Continued dry weather seems to prevail and with it a more serious fire hazard is approaching, Mr. Pape declared.

more and Ohio and other big trunk lines.

There was no interruption of traffic on any line. Engineers and trainmen stuck to their posts, although, under instructions from brotherhood chiefs, they performed only their regular duties. All trains, the railroads reported, were running on schedule.

Statements from rail executives all over the country, although admitting large desertions from the shop yards, reiterated their stand that transportation was unaffected and would continue so, "perhaps for months."

No further effort would be made to settle the strike by the railroad labor board, it was said at the board's offices today. From Washington came word that the administration was solidly back of the board on its stand on the strike question.

The only action to complete the labor board's interest in the strike will be an official announcement of the board's views, an announcement expected to condemn the strike.

(CHICAGO, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The St. Louis Browns, who are on one of their most spectacular batting rampages, are leading the Yankees today by three full games as a result of their victory over Cleveland in the fourth contest of the series, 10 to 3.

Philadelphia and Boston continued their "in and out" game around last place, the Athletics dropping to the cellar again as a result of losing to the Red Sox, 4 to 1.

Olsen's two fumbles in the sixth inning helped Boston to win an unusual game from Brooklyn, 3 to 2. Neither Cadore, nor Fillingim, the opposing twirlers, issued a pass or registered a strike out.

Cincinnati broke out into a rash of home runs and double plays, four circuit clouts enabling the Reds to hang up a 9 to 5 victory, while the fielding features checked the Cubs when they threatened to rally.

Earl Smith's homer was the deciding factor in the Giants' defeat of Philadelphia, 6 to 4, while Sherdel blanked Pittsburgh 6 to 0, giving the St. Louis Cardinals their second straight over the Pirates.

CHICAGO, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Lawton Witt, the Yankee's outfielder is on the heels of the batting leaders of the American league, with prospects of becoming a dangerous contender for the first place honors.

George Sisler, the St. Louis Browns' star, continues to lead the race with an average of .425, compared with .424 last week. Harry Heilmann of Detroit displaced Tris Speaker of Cleveland for the runner-up honors with an average of .381. Speaker is three points ahead of Witt being .347. His figures include games of Wednesday. Sisler continues to add to his records of total runs scored.

Lawrence "Hack" Miller, the strong man of the Chicago Nationals and former slugger of the Pacific Coast league, slammed out twenty-two hits in his last 18 games. This boosted his average from .330 to .358 and landed him in third place among the players who have participated in 45 or more games, according to figures which include games of Wednesday.

Roberts Hornsby of St. Louis continues to top the batters with an average of .393. He has run his string of home runs to 17, which is far in front of his rivals.

JAPAN APPROVES ALL THE TREATIES

TOKIO, July 1.—(By Associated Press.) Approval by the privy council of all the treaties adopted by the powers at the Washington arms conference today had left the prince regent's signature the only formality remaining to place Japan's final seal upon the convention's aimed at world peace. The prince is expected to sign the treaties before his departure on July 6 for Hokkaido.

Secretary Taketomi of the foreign office, will take the treaties to Washington as soon as they are signed. There ratifications will be exchanged.

Bank Reserves Increase.

NEW YORK, July 1.—The financial condition of the clearing house companies and banks for the week show they sold \$186,867,490 in excess of legal requirements. This is an increase of \$20,492,690 from last week.
