

EXCEPTIONAL HEAT MARKED JUNE, .56 INCHES OF RAIN

The weather for June was unusually warm and its hottest day with 103 degrees maximum on the 25th was the highest June maximum of any day for four or five years past. The mean maximum for the month was 86.1, the mean minimum 49.1, the mean 67.5, and the minimum of 42 was reached on June 10th and 15th.

The June rainfall amounted to .56 of an inch. There were three days with 0.1 or more of precipitation, fourteen days were clear, five partly cloudy and 11 days were cloudy. The official weather bureau summary for the month was in part as follows:

MERCURY CLIMBS TO 108, NEAR TO HIGH HEAT MARK

The unusual and excessive heat for Medford yesterday with a maximum of 108 degrees reached in early afternoon, came within one degree of equaling the Medford heat record in the history of the local weather bureau of 109 degrees, which was chronicled August 13th, 1920.

"But that 'ain't nothin'," as the leading comedian is wont to sing in an Elk's minstrel show, for the prediction wired here this afternoon by the San Francisco weather bureau is "fair and warmer weather." This forecast, coming at a time when the sky was overcast with what seemed like coming rain clouds, promising welcome relief from the heat of the past few days, came near taking the remaining stamina out of many Medfordites, who found it too warm to sleep last night. It also gives a not overly joyful outlook to the Fourth of July outings and celebrations of tomorrow.

The temperature did not fall below 60 degrees during the night and morning, and that figure, which is today's minimum, was not reached until 5 a. m. Unless the temperature is much less than that of last night many Medford people plan to sleep on porches or in their yards tonight. Between 3 and 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the official temperature was 104 degrees. Many thermometers at homes or in the business streets yesterday recorded from two to six degrees higher than the official maximum of 108 degrees, according to their location and worth.

Rain clouds still hung over the valley this afternoon indicating a possible storm, despite the weather bureau prediction.

BIBLE AS SERIAL POPULAR FEATURE IN KANSAS PAPER

TOPEKA, Kans., July 3.—Is printing the Bible a good newspaper feature? Will the average person read the Bible if published in this way? After printing a weekly serial from the Bible for three months, Arthur J. Carruth, managing editor of The Topeka State Journal, declares that the publication of the Bible has proved to be the greatest success of any feature ever printed by The State Journal. Moreover, it is being read by many subscribers as faithfully as would be the installments of a popular novel, Carruth states.

"The publication of the Bible serially has had a marvelous effect," said Mr. Carruth. "It has shown that the subscribers are sincere in their demand for reading matter of a religious character, and also has shown to the public that the newspapers do not print only the sensational, that they do not attempt to appeal primarily to the masses and that they do not neglect the church." As an indication of the interest taken in the publication of the Bible, Mr. Carruth stated he has received inquiries from every state in the nation, many letters from Canada and a number of communications from foreign countries. A number of Kansas newspapers have taken up the publication of the Bible since The Journal started it. Mr. Carruth stated. He said out of about sixty ministers in Topeka, he has received communications from all and that in only two or three cases had they criticized the publication.

The publication of the Bible was undertaken by The State Journal at the suggestion of Dr. Charles M. Sheldon, of Topeka, editor of The Christian Herald and well known author. Each installment includes about 3,000 words. The Weymouth text of the New Testament, a translation in everyday English, is used. Already publication of the Book of Mark has been completed and the Book of Luke is well under way.

FANS GATHERING FOR CHAMPIONSHIP LIGHTWEIGHT BOUT

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., July 3.—(By Associated Press). This thriving little city with a lightweight championship bout on its hands began to fill up today with the first influx of fight fans for the ten round contest between Benny Leonard, the titleholder and Rocky Kansas, the Buffalo challenger, in Floyd Fitzsimmons' open air arena tomorrow afternoon.

Indications are that 25,000 ring fans will pay approximately \$75,000 to see the fight.

Both Leonard and the three-times challenger for the lightweight crown virtually ended their training yesterday without injury to his hands and is ready to set a furious pace for the Buffalo challenger.

While Leonard is confident of winning, he, nevertheless has deep respect for the hard hitting Kansas. Rocky has always given Leonard the most desperate sort of a battle. He is short and stocky and can rip in with a short left hook to the body that is dangerous. He has an attack that always has worried his opponents and with the exception of Leonard, recently has felled almost every man who faced him in the ring.

Kansas probably will face a weight disadvantage of about three pounds.

The champion plans to go into the ring at about 137 pounds, while Kansas probably will not scale more than 133 or 134 pounds, which is his best weight.

RUTH AND HOMER HITTERS POUND OUT NEW HITS SUNDAY

NEW YORK, July 3.—Apparently spurred to great exploits by a sudden spurt on the part of Babe Ruth, home run sluggers in both leagues fattened their totals in a week-end that reverberated with circuit blows.

Ruth hammered out his fourth home run in three games and his twelfth of the season yesterday while the Yankees were taking their fourth straight from Philadelphia 9 to 3. Tillie Walker cracked out a brace of circuit blows, making his total four in the last two games and bringing his season's total to 17, only three behind Ken Williams of St. Louis, the leader.

Williams walloped out his twentieth four-base drive yesterday and helped the Browns take their fourth in a row from Cleveland. St. Louis and Brooklyn each gained a full game on the Giants in the National league race as a result of double victories over Cincinnati and Boston respectively while the leaders were idle. Rogers Hornsby of the Cardinals failed to increase his home run total after having registered his eighteenth Saturday. Zack Wheat aided the Dodgers in the second game with his tenth circuit poke.

The Detroit Tigers recovered their batting eyes and checked Chicago's winning streak of eight games, trouncing the White Sox 12 to 6.

Walter Johnson's shutout streak which had lasted for three games was ended when the Red Sox beat Washington 2 to 1.

Johnston to Play in East. SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—William M. Johnston of San Francisco, former national tennis champion, will compete in five tournaments in the east this summer. It was announced here.

Johnston's first appearance will be at the invitation tournament, Seabright, N. J., July 31. After that he will perform in the national doubles tournament at Boston, August 21, the Davis cup challenge round at Forest Hills, N. Y., September 1, the national singles championship tournament at Philadelphia, September 8, and probably the east-west tourney at New York, September 15.

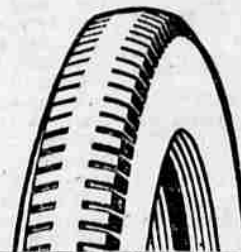
