LEONARD BEATS ROCKY KANSAS EIGHT ROUNDS

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., July 5.—(By the Associated Press)—Check of the attendance at the lightweight championship contest between Benny Leonard, title holder, and Rocky Kansas of Buffalo, N. Y., yesterday showed today that the crowd was just above 10,000, with receipts of \$59,830.

While no official announcement was made, it was reported Leonard got \$25,000 for scoring his eight-round technical knockout over the Buffalo challenger and Kansas received \$15,000.

Leonard, with Billy Gibson, his manager, left today for New York to prepare for his championship engagement with Lew Tendler, the Philadelphia lightweight to be decided at Jersey City, July 27.

Kansas, badly upset by his defeat, will return home tonight. He planned to have an X-ray picture made today of his broken arm. The arm was encased in splints after two physicians examined the injury, said to have been suffered in the third round when Kansas blocked a fast right hand chop by Leonard.

Leonard, in action yesterday, looked like a finely trained athlete. He did not make a false move and was master of Kansas from the start. He boxed with amazing skill and his footwork was perfect. He hit sharply and with astonishing accuracy.

"He is the greatest lightweight," said Leonard of Kansas. "If it is true his arm was broken his gameness is all the more remarkable."

Kansas was humiliated because his manager, Dan Rogers, tossed a sponge into the ring in the eighth round. He was all in as he fell into Rogers' arms after standing up two minutes and 27 seconds of the eighth round under a hurricane fusillade of Leonard's rights and lefts. He protested because the contest was stopped.

"I could not stand to see a game fellow like Kansas get punched when he did not have full use of both arms," Rogers said. "It was the merciful thing to do."

Kansas, bleeding and groggy from a series of wicked hooks to the jaw, was helpless before Leonard. His arms were hanging and he was not capable of defending himself. It was only a question of Leonard hitting him a solid smash to send him to the mat, but the sponge fell into the ring without a knockdown having been scored.

CHICAGO, July 5.—(By the Associated Press)—Holiday games in the major leagues were devoid of fireworks, the aspiring Detroit Tigers sustaining the principal damage when they dropped both ends of a double-header to Tris Speaker's lapping Indians, Cleveland winning 4 to 2 and 11 to 4.

The Athletics finally took a game from New York, winning the morning encounter, 3 to 1, but the Yanks gathered in the afternoon game 6 to 1.

The battling White Sox, with "No Hi" Robertson in good form, pulled out the morning game against St. Louis, 5 to 3, but dropped the afternoon contest to the league leaders by a similar score.

Rain fell in New York in the forenoon, while in the afternoon the teams battled to a 5 to 5 tie in four innings.

Rogers Hornsby's tenth homer of the season was a big factor in the St. Louis victory over Cincinnati, 6 to 5. In the second game, after the Cardinals had dropped a slugging bee, 11 to 9, in the forenoon.

Hard hitting gave the Cubs a double victory against Pittsburgh, 8 to 4 and 8 to 0.

Washington and Boston divided their holiday program, Boston taking the first 4 to 3, and Francis pitching the Senators to a shutout in the second, 2 to 0.

Goldie Rapp's great stop, starting a double play with the bases full, checked the Boston Braves after

they had scored three runs in the ninth and enabled Philadelphia to win the only game these teams played, 5 to 3.
