

SUBSCRIPTION IS STARTED FOR NEW FAIR BUILDING

A small crowd attended the Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon and the time was spent discussing arrangements for local merchants' exhibits at the coming county fair.

H. L. Walther of the fair board explained to the merchants present that all buildings of permanence were theoretically filled to capacity and that a new building would have to be constructed for merchants' exhibits unless the merchants were willing to use one of the tent houses which have been purchased by the fair board.

C. M. Kidd and J. C. Mann objected to the tent houses and decided that they were not substantial enough and would be too dusty for an exhibit of merchandise.

It was suggested that 50 merchants subscribe \$100 each for the construction of a building. This suggestion was made by E. C. Gaddis of the fair board who stated that this had been the original plan, but that it had not been put up to the merchants yet. J. C. Mann stated that he was willing to start the ball rolling with

a \$200 subscription if the other merchants would co-operate. A committee will be appointed to cover Medford and Ashland and to determine the attitude of the majority of merchants toward this scheme.

No songs were sung as the song leader was absent and the majority of the persons in attendance voted to devote the time to a discussion of the problem of the merchants' exhibit.

connection with the strike were few and scattered. J. L. McCollin, road master of the Kansas City Southern at DeQuincy, Ia., reported that he had been attacked and beaten by a number of men Saturday. Authorities expressed the belief that McCollin's assailants were strike sympathizers, and not strikers.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—Notice was delivered here today to striking shopmen by J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company (Union Pacific) notifying them that unless they register for their regular shifts by 3 p. m. Saturday, July 8, their pension and seniority rights would be forfeited.

Pickets in great numbers were on duty at the three railroad shops here today. Company officials said yards were operating from 25 to 50 per cent of normal and that 40 men were hired this morning at a joint terminal bureau.

BERLIN, July 5.—(By Associated Press.) Germany's notorious Bluebeard, Karl Gossman, committed suicide this morning by hanging, a half hour before he was to be taken to the criminal court, where he was undergoing trial for murder.

Rebels Weakening.

DUBLIN, July 5.—(By the Associated Press)—Bombardment by the artillerymen of the republican strongholds in Sackville street continued through the night and was re-commenced at 7:30 this morning after a lull at 3 a. m.

The battered exterior of the Hamman hotel and the Hibernian Bible society's premises adjoining show grim evidence of the devastating fire directed against them from the 18-pounder field pieces and armored cars of the provisional government forces.

To all outward appearances the rebel strongholds seem almost deserted.

The southern part of the city is

completely controlled by the provisional government. All approaches to the main streets are held by national troops. Raids for arms are being carried out successfully in many areas.

The result of these operations has been the tightening of the cordon around the republicans' last positions in Marlborough street, which was the irregulars' line of defense behind Sackville street, have at last been able to emerge from their terrifying seclusion.

Some of them had for days even experienced difficulty in obtaining food. Red Cross workers removed them to other parts of the city where they now are being fed and cared for.

The casualties during the week's fighting in Dublin now are placed at approximately 60 killed and 260 wounded.

News from the provinces regarding the progress of the national troops continues satisfactory.

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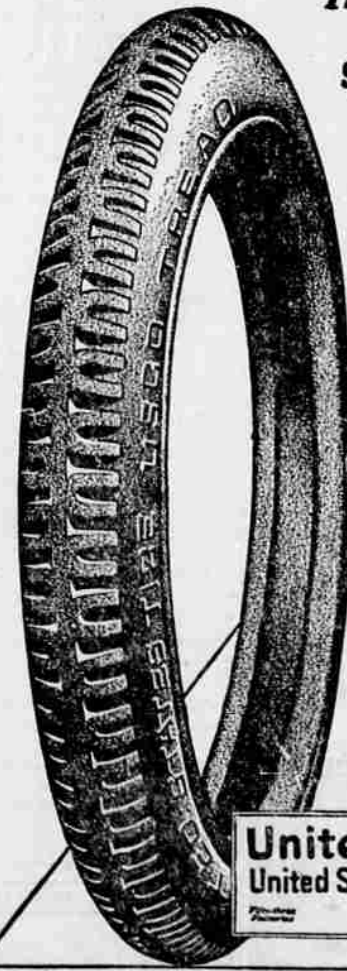
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
