

CITY TO BUILD NEW RESERVOIR IN EARLY FALL

Council Decides to Construct Reserve Reservoir in September Or October—Lid Is Clamped Down Hard On Water Law Violators.

The lid was clamped squarely down by the city council on the permitting of further violating of the water regulations last night, every councilman and the mayor ordering that arrests be made from now on of all water violators. The council is back of this promulgation to a man, and the orders are to arrest, and rearrest as often as necessary all offenders. The council, every member of whom, Messrs. Lumsden, Keene, Gaddis, Antle, Miles and Dresser were present, and Mayor Gates, are determined to break up the water-stealing and give all water consumers in every part of the city as square a deal as possible.

To this end, a change in the watering hours was made, which it is thought will give the people of the West side, especially in the south-west portion, more water.

Hereafter water users in the section of the city east of the railroad tracks on their regular water days can only water from 4 a. m. to 11 a. m., and instead of starting in again at 4 p. m. and watering until 11 p. m., must not begin until 7 p. m. and then can water until 11 p. m. Thus three hours of watering is cut off from the east side water users, because they have a better water pressure than on the west side, and the change will work no hardship whatever on them, the council figures. This three hours cut off from the east side, will give all parts of the west side a much needed pressure.

The water hours on the west side of the railroad tracks are just the same on their water days as heretofore, except that west of Oakdale avenue, and south of West 12th street, the water users who because of their extreme low pressure have been allowed to water every day at any time, must water during the hours assigned to the remainder of the West side.

Water Stealing Evils
Although the evening was a torrid one in the council chamber when the

shirt-sleeved councilmen began to discuss the water question and the stealing of water, the temperature grew warmer as Mayor Gates and the councilmen, one by one, related the evils of water stealing. Many dark and dastardly deeds of this kind were related, and instances told of where a number of water users have habitually used water as they pleased regardless of hours and required hose nozzle, actually defying the city.

The council means business at last in this enforcing of water regulations, and is unitedly back of those charged with the enforcement. The owners of commercial gardens with their lines of sprays must walk chalk from now on, and will be closely watched by other water users. It developed after the council meeting last night that one of the largest commercial gardeners of the city, after the council recently curtailed use of water by commercial gardens, had been going ahead using water as usual, with permission. It is said, from a councilman. No councilman has authority to grant any one permission to violate any ordinance of the city, the rest of the councilmen say, and they won't permit this man to violate any longer. "Treat every water consumer alike," is now the slogan of the city government.

Build Second Reservoir
Councilman Lumsden voiced the sentiments of the council and mayor when in the beginning of last night's discussion he earnestly declared that Medford has plenty of water for all consumers, if stealing of water were only stopped. While the city fathers were still heated up on the water question they said it was futile for water consumers to expect to get sufficient water in their homes for the bath tub, etc., while at the same time they had one or two hose nozzles playing on their lawns. If they would shut off the irrigating on their lawns, plenty of water in most cases would pour into the house.

Councilman Antle brought up the question of the city starting work as soon as possible in building an additional or reserve reservoir, and the mayor and every councilman was heartily in favor of doing this in the fall. Plans prepared by Olen Arnsperger, former city water superintendent, and Fred Cummings, the district water commissioner, many months ago for the building of such a reservoir, estimated that the expense would be from \$20,000 to \$23,000. The city council will look up these plans and confer with Messrs. Arnsperger and Cummings at the next council meeting, and prepare to start the work of construction September 1st or October 1st, next. The money for such building will be taken from the city water fund.

COUNCIL REDUCES TAX ON SMOKERS

"What is it you have on your mind, Ben?" sweetly inquired Chas. E. Gates, present mayor of Medford, to B. F. Linds, who wants to be the future mayor of Medford, as the city council went into session last night. Then the future mayorality aspirant, who filed as a candidate recently, started in and made a plea as attorney for the Medford Athletic club that the council throw off or reduce the \$30 license fee charged for all fictitious exhibitions when the club gives its weekly amateur bouts every Friday night.

The council agreed to cut the fee to \$15, on the stipulation that these weekly exhibitions be confined strictly to amateur bouts, approved by the city boxing exhibition, and that any time a professional bout is rung in the full charge of \$30 will be slapped on. This was agreeable to Linds, and K. O. Bob Brown, manager of the club, who was also present.

Attachment was filed in the circuit court today by Dr. Jarvis of Ashland for the collection of \$210 alleged to be due for medical services from County Prohibition Enforcement Officer B. S. Sandifer. CHICAGO, July 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—The 14,000 union men in this country will not be called out on strike for the time being at least, D. W. Holt, president of their union, announced this afternoon in calling a meeting of his executive committee here Saturday morning to decide what permanent action the signal men will take.

Jewell Wants Peace
A strong willingness to grasp the olive branch of peace was expressed today by B. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor.

A statement issued by Mr. Jewell referred to a letter sent him yesterday by Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States railroad labor board in which Mr. Hooper said the "board has been protecting the interests of the striking shopmen."

"Though the letter itself has not reached me," said Mr. Jewell, "I can, on the basis of press reports, say that the declaration that the organization of employees who have declined or who may decline, as is their legal right, to accept the dictates of the labor board, are not to be 'outlawed' does not remove or annul the official action of the board. The language of the resolution clearly means that the shop crafts organizations are to be supplemented by organizations of what may be termed 'whitewashed strikebreakers.'"

Any reply to Chairman Hooper's letter, Mr. Jewell's statement continued, will be determined after "careful consideration."
The statement concluded with a reiteration of his willingness to sit in negotiations with anyone who has a proposal "up his sleeve."

25 PER CENT OF RECALL SIGNERS NOT REGISTERED

No new developments arose in the recall of Sheriff C. E. Terrill, following the filing of petitions Wednesday, the county clerk checking over the list of names today, and reports that about one-third of the names have been checked with the registration cards, and that about 25 per cent are not registered. The county clerk further said that he had an opinion from District Attorney Rawles Moore that the names could remain on the petitions, if it was shown that they had been sworn in as voters, or were legal voters.

Attorney H. A. Canaday today made the following statement:

"I had nothing to do with the recall of Sheriff C. E. Terrill, and have not seen the petitions. I was in the court house when the petitioners filed them, and while passing down the hall from the county judge's office to the sheriff's office, I passed the delegation and a man I took to be the Rev. Oldfield of Ashland, asked me if any receipt was due from the county clerk for the petitions, and I referred him to that official for the information he requested. This was my only connection whatsoever with the matter. The informant of 'The Mail Tribune' no doubt mistook this casual incident for my active cooperation."

It was stated in yesterday's account of the filing of the recall that Attorney Canaday was among those present, receiving the information by telephone.

STATE TO PROSECUTE

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Oregon in and for Jackson county, and any and all subsequent terms of said court at and during which the matters and things herein mentioned are or may be pending, and to appear before the grand jury in said county at said term or terms of said court and manage and conduct the actions and proceedings of said grand jury relating to the said matters and things, namely:

"Certain crimes which have been committed in said county by persons therein falsely arresting or kidnapping certain individuals and by making felonious assaults upon them and by hanging and otherwise inflicting bodily harm and damage to and loss of their property; also, by threats and other unlawful means and felonious acts, putting and attempting to put divers other persons in fear of such harm, damage and injury to their persons and property; and any and all unlawful acts and things in any way connected therewith, or of a similar or different nature, insofar as you may deem it advisable."

Outrages Are Cited
The alleged outrages in Jackson county during the past several months cited in Governor Olcott's announcement today include the following:

On March 17, 1922, between 9 and 12 o'clock p. m. J. F. Hale, a citizen of Medford, was taken from his home by a party of masked men who threatened to hang him if he did not drop a certain civil suit and leave Medford at once. It is alleged in connection with this outrage that Hale was handcuffed, taken into the country and hanged from an oak tree and assaulted before he was permitted to leave and then he was ordered to leave the community, according to allegations.

Arthur Burr, colored, after serving 22 days in the county jail, in Jackson county, was alleged to have been taken onto the Siskiyou mountains on the night of March 14, 1922, and was hanged three times by the neck before being released and ordered to leave the community.

Henry Johnson, on the night of April 6, 1922, with others, was taken by masked men, a rope was placed about his neck and he was assaulted in various ways and accused of the commission of various crimes.

It is expected that Jackson county officials will receive instructions today or tomorrow from the attorney general to call a special session of the grand jury.
