

ASKS DYNAMITE TO USE IF BIG FIRE IS MEDFORD'S LOT

An important matter was brought at last Wednesday's night's city council meeting by Fire Chief Lawton, on which there was no discussion and neither was any action taken on the chief's request, because of the stress of other matters, other than a promise to take the matter up at a next meeting of the council.

The chief asked the council to purchase a suitable quantity of dynamite or powder as soon as possible for the fire department, to be held in storage for immediate use in combating a big fire in the city which could occasion a loss. This explosive would only be used in case that large fire was getting away from the firemen and had assumed proportions of threatened conflagration. The firemen could then stop a spread of the flames by blowing buildings in the path of the flames.

Chief Lawton declares the provision of explosives to be used only in case of dire necessity is a much needed part of modern fire equipment, which is used by all large cities and which is being adopted by most of the smaller ones.

NO QUITTING TILL BONUS PASSED

WASHINGTON, July 7.—"There will be no adjournment of congress until the soldiers' compensation bill has been made a law. It will be taken up and disposed of under a special agreement as soon as the tariff bill is passed."

This promise was made today by Senator McCumber of North Dakota, chairman of the finance committee, to Mrs. R. H. Smith, of Whitman, Mass., who delivered a third petition bearing a million signatures for enactment of the bonus bill.

KLEAGLE FAILS TO SHOW FOR TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—A bench warrant was issued today for Dr. John D. Eckles, dentist, a kleagle of the Ku Klux Klan, after he had failed to appear for trial on a charge of conspiring to violate the state corporate securities act. The charge was brought on complaint of a number of investors in an oil company in which Dr. Eckles was said to have handled stock. He was released on \$5,000 bail.

PARIS, July 7.—(By Associated Press.) Announcement was made today at the closing session of the disarmament commission of the League of Nations by Dr. Rivas Vicuna, Chilean ambassador at Paris, that Chile would demand the inclusion in the agenda of the fifth Pan-American conference, to be held in Santiago next March, of the whole question of world disarmament, both naval and military.

D'VALERA'S CHIEF, DIES OF WOUNDS IN IRISH BATTLE

DUBLIN, July 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Cathal Brugha, one of Eamon DeValera's chief lieutenants, died today of the wounds he received on Wednesday when trying to fight his way clear at the surrender of the republican garrison in the Sackville street area.

Cathal Brugha (Charles Burgess) was one of the most prominent of the republican leaders who opposed the terms of the Anglo-Irish treaty from the start and fought against it to the finish. He was DeValera's minister of defense in the first Dail Eireann cabinet, directing the campaign against the British in south Ireland up to the time the truce was signed in July of last year.

When the terms of the treaty negotiated by Arthur Griffith, Michael Collins and their fellow delegates, who met the British representatives in London late last year, became known, he declared his opposition to the pact and fought against it in the Dail debates and in public speeches.

His address against the ratification of the pact was one of the principal features in the debate, June 1 last. He charged Griffith with having broken an agreement not to sign the treaty until the document was submitted to the Irish cabinet and then he gave active support to the campaign of DeValera against the provisional government when the treaty was ratified.

KLAMATH WORKER IN TERRIBLE DEATH

KALMATH FALLS, Ore., July 7.—D. L. Hamilton, aged 42, died today from injuries received late yesterday when a logging truck upset, crushing his body and pinning him beneath a stream of boiling water from the burst radiator. He remained in that position 15 minutes before being extricated and the flesh was almost entirely scalded from one arm. He leaves a widow and two sons.

200 NAMES RECALL PETITIONS OUSTED

Out of 700 names on the recall petitions against Sheriff Charles E. Terrill checked with the registration cards by the county clerk, 200 had been thrown out as not complying with the election laws. This does not include the names of those who have written and phoned instructions to have their names removed from the petitions, on the grounds they were misinformed as to the real merits and interests back of the recall, which was fostered and fanned by a year of steady gossip and scandal mongering.

bush at any time of the night, and would have rendered the sheriff practically helpless in case of a serious emergency.

In the event that the United States government and the attorney general for Oregon succeed in obtaining indictments for local outrages and prosecutions should follow, additional jurors may be required to be chosen from the body of the county by the sheriff, under the direction of the court. It would be most unfortunate if, at that time, the sheriff should be a member of this secret organization on trial.

It is a time for people to think. If this society is innocent of the wrongs charged, that fact will legally develop; but it is no time for those who will be defendants in the event of an indictment, to attempt to further tie the hands of the law, so that justice may be rendered impossible.

We appeal to all good citizens to do whatever can be done by them in resisting this recall.

The petition asking the withdrawal of names from the recall, based on "all kinds of extravagant charges," declares "the effort is non-partisan and circulated in the interest of harmony in the community," "good government" and "economy," is as follows:

To the Voters of Jackson County, Oregon:

We regard the attempted recall of Sheriff Terrill as unjust to him and as a serious mistake on the part of those signing the petition. The petition is so indefinite as to give a public officer no opportunity to meet it. Those circulating the petition did not confine themselves to the allegations of the petition, but made all kinds of extravagant charges, creating a situation difficult, if not impossible, to fairly meet.

To hold an election within twenty days, based upon these indefinite charges, but in fact influenced by malicious mis-statements, is manifestly unfair. It is a time when the people of the community ought to be working together, instead of being pulled apart by political dissension, culminating in a special election held for that purpose. Such an election will be an unnecessary expense and an additional burden to the taxpayers, and no reasonable cause or excuse exists therefor. And it is reasonable to suppose that numerous damage actions will result from the present situation, entailing additional expense upon the taxpayers and creating discord and ill feeling among the people.
