

EUROPE STILL SPENDS MONEY ON ARMAMENTS

British Expert Gives Figures Showing How the Nations Abroad Are Continuing in Mad Rush for Military Supremacy—Policy Fatal.

LONDON, July.—Nearly two years ago financial experts decided that Europe could not afford to devote 20 per cent of its expenditure to armaments. How does Europe stand in 1922, after a whole series of conferences of which one only has found a means of affecting a reduction in one kind of armament?

I have been looking through the budgets of these European nations which have published their estimates for 1922.

The average percentage of the expenditure upon armaments to revenue of these eight nations is therefore 25.1. Six of the eight nations show a deficit, one only, ourselves, shows a small surplus, and one, Jugoslavia, balances its budget.

It is true that since 1920 there has been a general reduction of expenditure upon armaments, but income has fallen in most cases to a more than corresponding extent, with the result that the financial situation has not improved.

America's Attitude.
There is a greater depreciation of currency in most countries than there was then, and debt is being steadily piled up. In each of the countries I have cited taxation has been carried to its utmost limits and in each industry is grievously crippled by taxation.

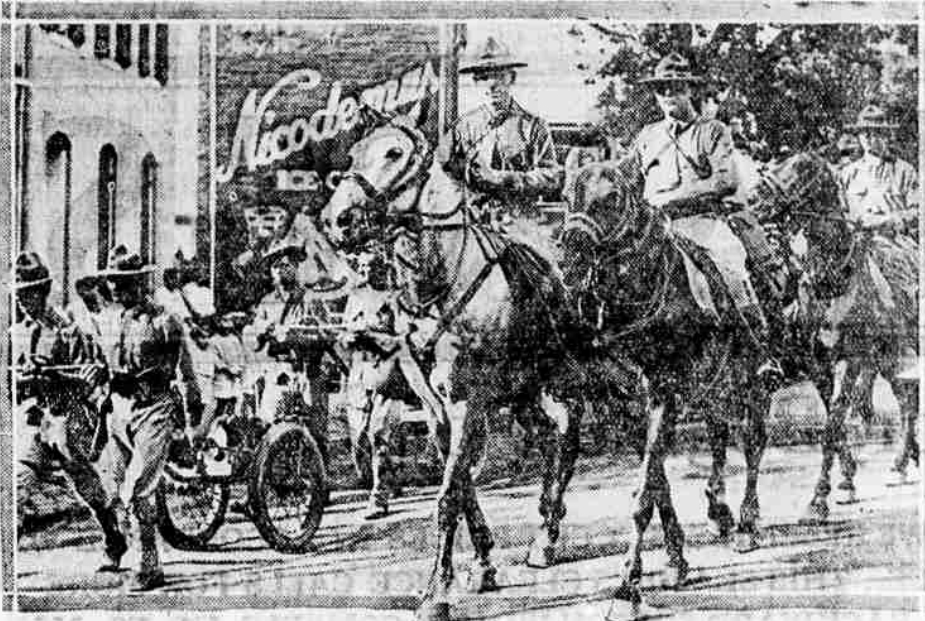
Can we, then, be surprised that America, in these circumstances, withholds her aid to Europe? Is she not right in her argument that by so doing she would be bolstering up a fake economic position and backing a fatal policy?

The conclusion of the matter is then, surely, that no plans for the financial rehabilitation of Europe have the least prospect of success; that no justifiable case will be of avail unless and until the question of reducing the burden of the expenditure upon armaments is taken up seriously.

That expenditure is commonly spoken of as national insurance, but what firm would contemplate spending annually 25 per cent of its revenue upon insurance? If the insurance offices were to insist on such premiums the directors would at once take counsel and see how the risks could be reduced. That is the course which the financiers of Europe recommended in 1920, and it is the only sane and practical course.

If the prime ministers of Europe would give their minds to the consideration of how to give practical effect to the Brussels resolutions in-

STILL SEE HOPE OF MINE PEACE

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Decision of the anthracite coal mine operators and union representatives to meet again today was taken as an indication at least of continued hope of reaching an agreement through the conference called by President Harding to consider methods of securing a resumption of work in the industry. Meanwhile the bituminous strike situation, negotiations in which have been deferred until Monday is engaging the attention of public officials as the matter of supply grows more serious.

1090 A. CABBAGE GROW IN OREGON

WASHINGTON, July 7.—A forecast of 54,770 acres planted to late commercial cabbage in "seven prominent states" was announced by the department of agriculture as of July. Acreage harvested last year was 44,560 acres, including Oregon 1090 acres.

MONTANA CHIEF TELLS REASONS CONLEY FIRED

HELENA, Mont., July 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Governor Joseph M. Dixon, a witness for the state, today declared he discharged Frank Conley, ex-warden of the penitentiary, "because no man who seeks to bribe a public official should remain in that position."

The governor, called to the stand by Attorney General W. D. Rankin in the state's suit for accounting against the former prison official, explained he had deposed Conley "without malice" for the best "interests of the state," and because he wanted a man at the head of the penitentiary that he "could work with."

Following the brief direct examination, Conley's attorneys waived cross examination. Governor Dixon did not explain his reference to a "bribe" in connection with the defendant, although he invited the court and the attorneys for both sides to ask him "any questions pertaining to the suit." He declared that "because of the brutal assaults" made upon him during the present trial he felt he should have a chance to explain his attitude.

The governor denied he had instructed the present warden, M. W. Potter, to "get Conley;" that there was any personal feeling on his part against the defendant; that in the prison investigation he had sought other than "the truth," or that he had deposed the penitentiary official "on a moment's notice." He said he "was amazed at the charge, I let Conley out on fourteen hour's notice."

The former warden, he insisted, knew he was not to remain and his appointment "was sixty days overdue."

BOOZE ON OCEAN HEARING CALLED

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Attorney General Daugherty has arranged to conduct a hearing next Thursday on the question of the legality of permitting the sale of intoxicating beverages on shipping board vessels. It was learned today at the department of justice.

PLANT OVER BILLION FISH CALIFORNIA IN FIFTY YEARS

SACRAMENTO, July 7.—(I. N. S.)—A total of 1,128,865,566 fish of various species were planted in the streams of California from 1871 to 1921, inclusive, according to a report just compiled by the state fish and game commission.

Quinnat salmon, of which the distribution is placed at 865,014,647 fish, represents the largest factor in the grand total.

Rainbow trout comes second, with a distribution of 81,578,454. Other important facts in trout distribution as shown in the report are: Cut-throats, 73,549,261; large lake, 1,218,649; Eastern brook, 23,218,930; Lock Levin, 27,777,570; German brown, 2,388,938; steelhead, 45,443,631; golden, 1,287,650.

The total distribution of all fish by the commission, the report shows, was only 15,000 in 1871, as compared to 33,319,720 in 1921.

At the present time the state owns and operates 30 fish hatcheries and egg collecting stations.

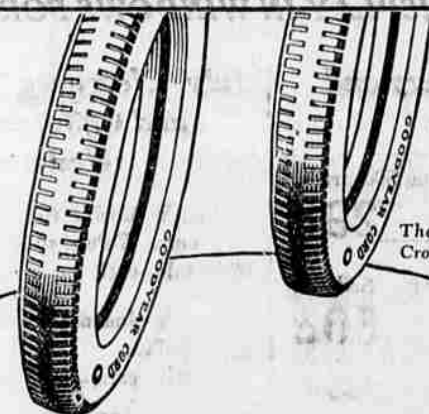
