JESSE WINBURN TO ENTERTAIN YOUNG FOLKS SATURDAY

ASHLAND, July 7.—One treat follows another, and Jesse Winburn will be "at home" to all the kids, either boys or girls, on Saturday this week, at Sap-and-Salt, up the canyon. This generous invitation list is extended to the young folks who participated in the parade and athletic events on the Fourth and their name is legion. In order to qualify for this hospitable event—the crowning aftermath of the celebration of the national holiday—simply register credentials with John Fuller, secretary of the chamber of commerce, and secure the required tickets. Those who have experienced the hospitalities of "Sap-and-Salt", know what is in store for them, but those who have not been guests at this ideal mountain resort, will be surprised at the cordial welcome and abundant refreshments in store for them. Parents need not fear the canyon trip as far as their children are concerned. The road is a fair one, and the itinerary will be completed practically by daylight. The departure hour is along about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, the return being scheduled between 6 and 7. Let the young folks meet at the chamber of commerce rooms at 2 p. m. on Saturday, in readiness for this jolly outing. Thad Powell is master of transportation, and each truck load of children will be duly chaperoned by members of a special committee, the personnel of which includes Mrs. F. G. Swendberg as chairman, also Mrs. E. A. Woods, Mrs. Barber, Mrs. Fred Homes, Mrs. Chas. Loomis, Mrs. C. W. Fraley, Mrs. Louis Dodge, Mrs. McWilliams, Mrs. Bernice Johnson, and Mrs. John Fuller of Ashland, also Mrs. C. E. Gates and Mrs. Barnett of Medford. Under transportation schedules like those in effect over the Scenic Drive, autos both going and coming within certain hours, have the right of way over the canyon trail, thus complications as to meeting cars ought to be avoided. All particulars in regard to a formal program at the picnic grounds have not been divulged, but there will be entertainment in plenty, with an abundance of refreshments on the side. Here is an outing worth while, and all the young folks eligible are urged to join in the festivities as afforded by the generous host.
