MERCHANTS PLAN ERECT \$7000 HOME FOR FAIR DISPLAY

Another seven thousand dollar building will be erected at the fair grounds providing the plans of the retail merchants of Jackson county can be financed before the first of August.

The business men who met at the Chamber of Commerce rooms last evening were enthusiastic in the plan to erect a building to house their merchandise displays. Every man in business in Jackson county will be given the opportunity to buy space, providing a cash rental is paid to cover a period of four years.

It is estimated that a space ten feet deep with a frontage of twelve feet will cost fifty dollars a year. The rental for four years is to be paid in advance and the entire amount is to be expended in the construction of the building.

The ones buying the space have absolute control over it for the four years and in case they sell their business the lease of this space is an asset which may be transferred to his successors.

Insufficient funds to construct all of the buildings which were included in the improvement program forced the directors of the fair association to advise the automobile dealers and the merchants that should they desire to make exhibits that they would also have to finance the building of a structure to house the same. After the four-year period the building would become the property of the county and a very nominal rental would be charged to those who make exhibits and money received therefrom would be applied to operating expenses of the fair grounds.
