

GIANTS BATTLE 18 INNINGS TO GAIN PIRATE VICTORY

CHICAGO, July 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Giants were holding their own against western rivals today, but only after the longest and most sensational battle in either league this season—their 9 to 8 victory over Pittsburgh yesterday in 18 grueling innings.

George Kelly's second home run of the game, with Ross Young on base turned the tide in the 18th, after both teams had gone scoreless since the ninth. The champions needed both rallies, for the Pirates came within a run of tying the count again in their last frame at bat.

Aside from Kelly the individual stars of the fray were Gooch and Carey of the Pirates, each of whom rapped off six hits. Carey's performance, however, was the more notable for he had a perfect day at bat, walking three times in addition to his half dozen bingles, besides stealing home once, second twice and scoring three runs. His record of six hits in as many times at bat has been duplicated only twice in the past score of years in National league history. Cuthbert turned the trick with Brooklyn in 1915 and Ned Bancroft of the Giants duplicating it in 1920.

The Pirate-Giant struggle, however was only one bright spot in a record-breaking day for both leagues. Other star performances were Rogers Hornsby's 21st home run, giving his team a ninth inning victory over Brooklyn and putting him ahead of Ken Williams in the clotting race; a nine-run rally by Ty Cobb's rampant Tigers in the ninth inning to gain a double victory over Washington, and Waite Hoyt's brilliant shutout of Cleveland, 1 to 0, putting the Yankees only a half game from the league lead.

The pace-setting St. Louis Browns dropped a 13-inning tussle to Boston 5 to 4, after Urban Shocker blanked the Red Sox in the first game.

Thillie Walker turned in his 18th homer, while the Philadelphia Athletics trimmed Chicago 6 to 3, with the aid of Eddie Rommel's clever twirling.

Lee Meadows pitched the Phillies to a 3 to 1 decision over Cincinnati and Grover Alexander held Boston in check while his Cub team mates pounded Frank Miller and Marquard for a 7 to 2 victory.

Ty Cobb's terrific hitting was a feature of Detroit's double victory over Washington 7 to 6 and 11 to 9 the Tiger leader collecting seven hits in 11 times at bat.

Babe Ruth's single brought in the only run of the New York-Cleveland game and gave the Yankees their third straight victory over the Indians.

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, England, July 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Walter M. Hoover, American champion carman won the Diamond sculls here today.

Hoover defeated J. Beresford, Jr. of the Thames rowing club in the final for the sculls in the Henley regatta.

Hoover's victory was an easy one. The time was nine minutes, 32 seconds. Hoover led throughout the race, sculling in fine style.

The final for the ladies plate was won by Brzenose college, Oxford, this year defeating Magdalena college, Oxford, by a length.

The Thames challenge cup was won by Worcester college, Oxford, which finished two feet ahead.

The Leander club won the grand challenge cup, defeating the Thames club by a length. The time was 7 minutes, 36 seconds.

The stewards cup was won by the Viking club of Eton, which easily defeated the Grasshopper club of Zurich, Switzerland.

HORNSBY LEADS FOR HOMER HONORS

ST. LOUIS, July 8.—Rogers Hornsby, second baseman of the St. Louis Nationals, and leading home run slugger of the major leagues this year, bides fair to break the National league home run record of 27, made by Ed Williamson of the Chicago club in 1884.

With only about half of this season's schedule played, Hornsby tied his home run mark of 1921 by knocking out his twenty-first drive yesterday and needs seven more to establish a new National league record.

The Cardinals' batter is one fourth base hit ahead of Kenneth Williams of the St. Louis Browns, leading American league home run batter, who held the circuit driving batting championship for the most part of this season, and was displaced for the honors earlier in the season by Hornsby and again yesterday.

SOVIET BOSS HAS 'NERVOUS ILLNESS'

GENEVA, July 8.—(By Associated Press.)—George Tchitcherin, Russian soviet minister who headed the soviet delegation to the Genoa conference, has entered a private hospital suffering from a nervous breakdown, according to dispatches today from Innsbruck, Austria, reporting his arrival there Wednesday. The dispatches said he had received many letters and telegrams but was not permitted to do any work.

KILLING AMERICANS LATEST SPORT OF TURKISH BANDITS

LONDON, July 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Americans are being secretly murdered by the Turks in Asia Minor and reports then circulated that they died of typhus and other diseases, according to J. Herbert Knapp, civil engineer of Los Angeles, who has arrived from Constantinople, after three years in the Turkish interior.

Mr. Knapp went to Turkey principally to investigate the death of Diarbekir of his brother, the late George P. Knapp, whom the Turks reported had died suddenly of typhus. He declares that his own investigation supported by affidavits on file with the American consul at Bagdad, convinced him that his brother was executed by shooting.

"The Turks hated my brother," said Mr. Knapp, "because he knew too much about the massacre of Christians which was then in progress."

MORE MEN NEEDED TO FIGHT FOREST FIRE, WASHINGTON

SEATTLE, July 8.—Calls for additional men to fight forest fires were being filled this morning by timber protective agencies of virtually every county in western Washington.

While cooler weather yesterday decreased the impetus with which the flames had been spreading, the volume of reports from every forest area of the state had aroused timber owners and state authorities to the peril, and crews were being augmented with all the men available.

Reports to State Forester Fred E. Pape late last night indicated that no new blazes of consequence developed yesterday although a number which had originated during the preceding days gained proportions which threatened to break from all possibility of control and to eat their way into stands of valuable timber.

In only exceptional cases are logging operations being carried on in western Washington, where loggers have responded to the appeal of Governor Hart and have turned their employees out to aid the organized fire fighting crews. Railroads have also added their men to the fighters.

WILD CAT OIL LAND IN MEXICO PROBED

NEW YORK, July 8.—Conferences between Adolfo De La Huerta, Mexican minister of finance, and American oil executives, relating to a plan for the development of wild cat oil territory in Mexico, have ended without an agreement.

Senor De La Huerta, who issued a statement yesterday announcing that his mission "consisted only in hearing the propositions made by the companies through their representatives," declared later that he regarded his mission as a successful one and at the office of one of the five companies involved, it was stated that "reasonable progress had been made."

BLACK SOX SCANDAL UP IN COURT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 8.—Charles Comiskey and his son, Louis, owners of the Chicago American league baseball club, are required to appear in Milwaukee July 12 before Court Commissioner Emil Ludwig for examination under the discovery statute in connection with the Felsch and Jackson cases, on orders signed by Judge John J. Gregory of the circuit court here today.

Summonses will be taken to the north woods for service on the Comiskays today. Felsch and Jackson are suing the Comiskays for alleged back salary, bonuses and damages for being ousted from organized baseball following the 1919 world's series scandals.

TO ROUT ALASKAN FISH PIRATES WITH AIRPLANE PATROL

BELLINGHAM, July 8.—Lieutenant Roy E. Jones, Seattle aviator in the government service who is on his way to Ketchikan to assist in apprehending fish pirates on the Alaska coast, was delayed last night by ignition trouble, which occurred at Chuckanut, five miles south of here. His machine was left at Chuckanut and he spent the night here with his mother, Mrs. Glenn Jones.

This morning Lieutenant Jones said he planned to hop off at noon today for Ketchikan, making two stops between here and his destination, the first at Alert Bay, B. C. and the second at Swanson Bay. He expects to reach Ketchikan at eight o'clock tonight. The distance from Bellingham to Ketchikan is 520 miles.

After leaving Seattle at five o'clock yesterday Lieutenant Jones stopped at Anacortes for gasoline at about six o'clock. Engine trouble developed shortly before he reached Bellingham.

Lieutenant Jones is accompanied by Gerald J. Smith, his mechanic.
