Very largely attended funeral services over the body of the late Senator Hugo G. Von der Hellen were held yesterday afternoon from the Elks temple with the local Elks lodge, of which the deceased was a charter member, in charge of the ceremonies.

Beautiful floral pieces surrounded the casket during the ceremony at which two hundred friends of the deceased were present. The burial was in the Central Point cemetery.

FREED OF BIGAMY CHARGE



Princess Nadeja Troubetskoy, member of a royal Russian family older even than the Romanoffs, who has been cleared of charges of bigamy, she married Captain Victor Turia, whom she later heard had been killed in action. The charges have been dropped and desertion substituted in the divorce suit now being heard.

JAIL TERM GIVEN, TRADED FAMILIES

SEATTLE, Wash., July 8.—(Special) Captivated by a pretty divorcee, Conrad Schwalm, age 32, deserted his wife, Tena Schwalm, and three children and fled with Mrs. Flora Perry, the divorcee, and her three children to Medford, Ore., testimony given by Schwalm in Justice C. C. Dalton's court showed, Schwalm was given six months in the county jail for trading families. Technically the charge was abandonment and non-support.

"What's the idea of deserting your own wife and children to become the godfather of somebody else's children?" queried Judge Dalton. "You must realize that the Mormon way of living is outlawed in this state and that you can't trade families. Six months."

Officers who arrested Schwalm in Medford notified Miss Thiel that he was found living in the same tent with Mrs. Perry and her children.—Portland Telegram.

Schwalm was arrested here several days ago by Medford police on orders from Seattle authorities.

Seek Strike Injunction
CHICAGO, July 8.—The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad this afternoon sought to obtain a federal injunction restraining striking employees from interfering with the operation of its shops.

Orchardists who have bands on their trees for trapping the codling moth larvae, should remove and examine them at once as the earliest of the summer brood moths are already emerging from them. If the larvae and pupae beneath the bands are not destroyed at once many of them will transform to moths within the next few days, and in turn deposit eggs for another generation of larvae in the fruit. In making the examination for the larvae, care should be taken to find not only those on the bands, but also all individuals spun up in their cocoons and hidden in the crevices of the bark.

This examination of codling moth bands should be repeated every ten days from this date to the first of September. If they are examined regularly at intervals as stated they will catch a surprising number of larvae and be the means of helping reduce the per cent of infestation in the fruit, but if they are not examined regularly they will serve only as more nearly ideal hiding places for the larvae and thus do more harm than good.

MINERS PREPARE FEDERAL ACTION

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 7.—(By Associated Press). Authority to call a special state convention of Illinois coal miners, should the federal government intervene in the nation-wide coal strike, was vested in President Frank Farrington, of the Illinois mine workers by his executive board and sub-district officers at a secret session last night, it became known today.

This authorized convention will act upon Mr. Farrington's plan for a separate wage contract for Illinois, which in turn will be submitted to the "rank and file" for a vote. This action will be taken, however, only in event the miners and operators fail to get together at Washington and the government steps in to bring the strike to an end.

NEBRASKA RAIN IS CAUSING FLOODS

LINCOLN, Neb., July 8.—A down-pour of rain last night amounting to slightly over an inch and a quarter in forty minutes, caused what City Engineer Bates estimated to be the worst flood Lincoln has experienced since 1906. In south Lincoln scores of basements were flooded and the city engineer said there was about fifty acres of lake in the outskirts of the city to the south.

moves which will indicate that union workmen are participating in movements of violence," said Mr. Johnston. "It is my belief however, that much of the disturbances already laid at the door of the striking railway workers, possibly may be charged up to the railroads themselves. A great many of the rail systems employ what is known as operators. These operators mingle with strikers, express sympathy with their cause and very frequently precipitate serious disorders. The strikers then are charged with being a lawless lot.

"In view of our past experiences with these operators or private detectives, we naturally feel that when strikers are accused of crimes it is always well to determine precisely who has been responsible for the commission of the crime."

CHICAGO, July 8.—(By Associated Press). All traffic on the Chicago and Alton in and out of Bloomington, Ill., has ceased, due to the failure of local authorities to furnish adequate protection to the few men remaining at work in the shop there and the road has notified the sheriff of McLean county and the adjutant general of the state that unless protection for workers is furnished by next Monday, the Chicago and Alton will undertake to reopen the shops under its own guard. Bloomington is an important division point on the Chicago-St. Louis highway.

This announcement was made by W. G. Biers, president of the road, on his return from Bloomington today, where he has been in conference with authorities in an attempt to restore rail activities at the Illinois city.

The strikers, he said, virtually took possession of the shops last night, firing shots and afterward advancing on the road's passenger station where officers and inspectors were driven from their work and one foreman was badly beaten, according to Mr. Biers.

SACRAMENTO, July 6.—A number of miniature riots opened shopmen's strike activities in Sacramento today. In a number of cases, groups of strikers dragged strikebreakers from cars, or met them as they left the cars, and admonished them not to go to the Southern Pacific yards. As the police patrol appeared on the scene at various times, activities ceased, only to be resumed with the departure of the police officers.

HOLY WRIT ONLY HOPE OF WORLD SAYS LECTURER

It does not grow old with age, 'The Word of God, which liveth and abideth forever, for all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass. The grass withereth, and the flower thereof falleth away; but the Word of the Lord endureth forever.' 1 Peter 1:23-25. The writings of man may grow old and get 'out of date,' they may become obsolete, but not so with the Word of God.

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, to whom it is not to go.

Teach me the danger of these realms below;

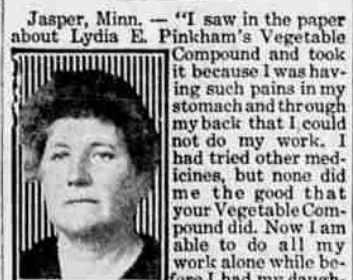
