

GARAGE, CHICKEN COOP, WOODSHED FIRE DESTROYED

Flame of Unknown Origin Threatens—Sparks On Dry Roofs Menace—Fowl Are Singed, But Active—Obey Water Rules Urged.

A fire which started at 3:15 yesterday afternoon and the origin of which is unknown destroyed a garage, two woodsheds and a chicken-house and threatened to become serious before it was extinguished. The blaze broke out in the upper story of a garage in the rear of the Arthur Wissing residence on West Thirtieth near New town and soon spread to the woodshed belonging to Mrs. Mary Fletcher. This woodshed adjoins the Wissing garage

on the east. The fire then crossed the valley and began consuming the woodshed and chicken-house belonging to J. A. Stewart whose residence fronts on West Fourteenth street.

No one was home at the Wissing residence when the fire started but young Carrol Wissing arrived at his residence shortly after and turned in the alarm.

The real danger was from flying sparks as all of the roofs in the city are as dry as tinder at this season of the year and the slightest spark at once causes a blaze on the dry shingles. The wind was from the north and the Stewart residence and the Bryan Pierce residence east of it caught fire on the roof soon after the garages and woodsheds began to burn. The small patches of flame on the Stewart residence were extinguished from the ground with a garden hose and volunteers climbed to the roof of the Pierce house and soon had the small embers extinguished and the roof well dampened.

Two chickens in the Stewart chicken house were badly burned although they were still about to run about when the fire had been extinguished. P. C. Bingham was on hand and volunteered to perform the humane act of beheading the scorched fowls.

The Aubrey G. Smith residence, fully 150 yards from the burning garages caught fire from a flying ember and help was at once summoned. The small blaze was soon extinguished.

In half an hour after the arrival of the department the fire was practically extinguished and the hundreds of people who had come in motor cars and on foot began to depart from the scene of activity.

The regular volunteer department arrived with the small truck but it was not found necessary by that time to make use of the extra equipment.

Despite the quick defeat of the flames and the arrest of a blaze that at first promised to gain the proportions of a conflagration citizens are again warned to shut off at once all water at the sound of the fire whistle in order to devote the force of the entire system to fighting the fire.

The loss of the garage and woodshed in the rear of the Wissing residence is estimated at \$300 while the loss entailed by Mrs. Mary Fletcher and by J. A. Stewart in the destruction of their outbuildings is estimated at about \$500 or \$600 in the aggregate as the Stewarts had a large amount of valuable tools and household goods stored in their outbuildings.

CARDINALS CLIMB VIA HORNSBY'S BAT BROWNS TO TEST

CHICAGO, July 11.—(By Associated Press). The St. Louis Cardinals were a half game nearer the league leading New York Giants today as a result of another devastating attack by Rogers Hornsby and his big bat. The great second bagger's 22nd homer of the season, with two on bases, clinched the Cardinals' seventh straight and fifth in a row over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 4 to 1.

The Giants, after coming close to a league record by pummeling three Pittsburgh twirlers for 28 hits and a 19 to 2 victory in the first game, lost a 5 to 4 decision to the Pirates in the second contest. The slugging achievement of the winners in the first game is one better than the American league mark, held jointly by Detroit and Philadelphia, but is eight less than the old National league record, set by Philadelphia against Louisville in 1894 and three below the modern mark established by the Giants in 1901 against Cincinnati.

The Chicago Cubs took their fifth straight from Boston, 4 to 0, and strengthened their hold on third place as Brooklyn continued its slump. This was the tenth victory for the Cubs of eleven games with Boston this season.

Two records almost unique in the annals of the game marked Detroit's 6 to 2 triumph over Washington. Each of ten Tigers in the lineup registered one hit, while the Washington outfield scored only a single putout. Shanks making the lone catch. St. Louis was unable to gain on the Yankees, who were idle. The Browns divided their third straight double-header with Boston, taking the first in 13 innings 5 to 4, and dropping the second 4 to 3.

The leaders start an important series with New York today with a margin of a game and a half at the top.

Home runs by Hauser and Galloway behind airtight pitching by Harris enabled the Athletics to beat Chicago's White Sox 5 to 2. Ray Schalk, star catcher of the Sox, fanned four times in a row.

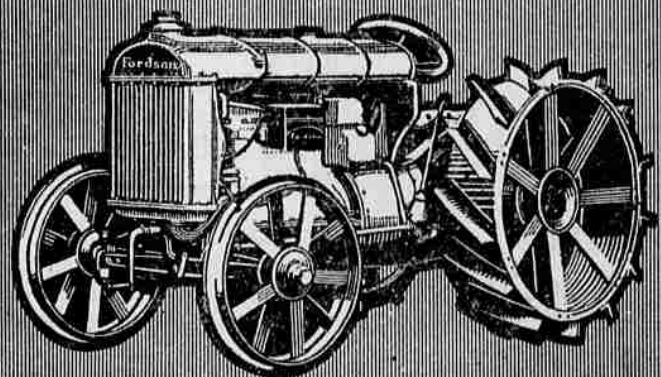

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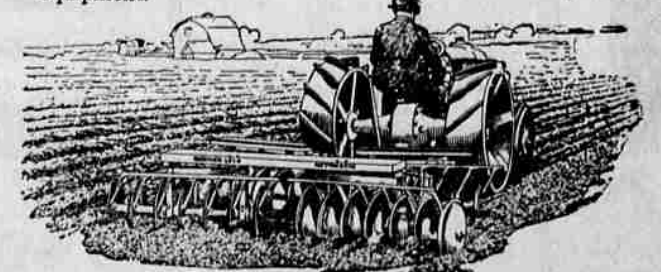
