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LYNCH NEW KING OF BANTAMS, BUT \$10,000 IS COST

NEW YORK, July 11.—Joe Lynch, cool and calculating held out a good left arm last night and permitted Johnny Buff to knock off his own crown—the bantamweight championship of the world.

In the beginning Lynch ripped a cut on Buff's lower lip, and from then on it was the challenger's fight. It was apparent in the early rounds when Buff found himself unable to go past that long left arm to land the devastating short blows to the ribs, that it was one of those rare occasions where an ex-champion "comes back."

As Buff weakened, Lynch drove his left into the champion's face, bringing it down and across with a powerful movement of the wrist and forearm and then, upon occasions, crossing over with a terrific right. Several times he had Buff on the ropes and at other times groggy and half blind.

Buff landed comparatively few blows and missed often. His one hope was a knockout, but his swings were far wide. He had weakened so perceptibly that Lynch sent him smashing to the floor when they flew together in the fourteenth round. Then Frank Bagley, his chief second, knew it would be unfair to ask him to go on. Buff was just recovered from an operation on a neck gland and, while he said he was fit, those who have observed him before, knew he was not himself last night.

Lynch paid nearly \$10,000 out of his pocket for the privilege of wearing the bantamweight crown again.

When the receipts and expenses were checked up today it was found that the gate was \$9,150.35 short of the guaranteed \$20,000. Under the terms of the agreement, Buff was to receive this sum if he lost his title.

Boxing authorities said it was the first time in ring history in America that a fighter won a title without receiving a cent, to say nothing of paying a big sum to the defeated man.

SATAN DELIGHTS TO BE PAINTED BLACK, EVANGELIST SAYS

That the devil is a real being and not a mere principle of evil; that God did not make the devil, but created an exalted angel, who from a state of perfection and holiness made himself into the devil, by rebellion against God was affirmed by Evangelist T. L. Thumler at the canvas pavilion on Ivy and Eighth streets last evening. A large audience listened with interest while the speaker, using the Bible as a basis of information, proceeded to show the falsity of some of the ideas that are commonly held regarding this chief adversary of the human family.

"Satan is pleased to be portrayed as a hideous being with horns, hoofs, and tail. He wants people to be looking for him only amidst that which is repulsive, ugly, and horrible and never in the company of that which appears respectable, innocent, and beautiful. He is able, the scripture tells us, to transform himself into an angel of light; and with this, of course, he puts on appearance of piety and zeal for the cause of Christ. We ought to understand that Satan makes it a point to associate with the most respectable company in the world, and presents his falsehoods in language that is calculated to charm the mind with its beauty and appearance of wisdom.

"In heaven this being was known as Lucifer, meaning light-bearer or day-star. His heart became lifted up with pride and he aspired to be equal with God. The result is thus described in Isa. 14:12-15: 'How art thou fallen from Heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning! For thou hast said in thine heart, I will ascend into Heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God; I will sit also upon the mount of the congregation, in the sides of the north; I will ascend above the heights of the clouds; I will be like the most high, yet thou shalt be brought down to hell, to the sides of the pit.'

"God could not tolerate this arch-rebel in Heaven, though we may be sure that he did not at once cast him out when his disloyalty began to be seen, but gave him opportunity to repent, but finally he was expelled from Heaven, together with an immense number of angels who had been led to sympathize with him and join in his rebellion. 'There was war in Heaven,' says the Prophet John; Michael and his angels fought against the dragon, and the dragon fought and the angels, and prevailed not; neither was their place found any more in heaven, and the great dragon was cast out, that old serpent, called the devil, and Satan, which deceiveth the whole world; he was cast out into the earth, and his angels were cast out with him. "Why doesn't God kill the devil and so free mankind from his power? some one may ask. The answer is that such an act as God's part would settle nothing but the question of which of the two was the stronger. The real question at issue, and which has been at issue since Lucifer rebelled in Heaven, is that of the character of God and of his government. Satan has maligning God before the universe, claiming that He is unjust and tyrannical. Christ came to our world to demonstrate, in human flesh and subject to Satan's assaults, the reality of Satan's accusations. This great purpose will not be fully worked out until the end of time; but when the controversy between the Kingdom of Christ and the kingdom of Satan shall be finished, when the lives of all men shall have passed in review at the judgment bar of God, the character of Satan and the nature of his government will stand fully revealed.
