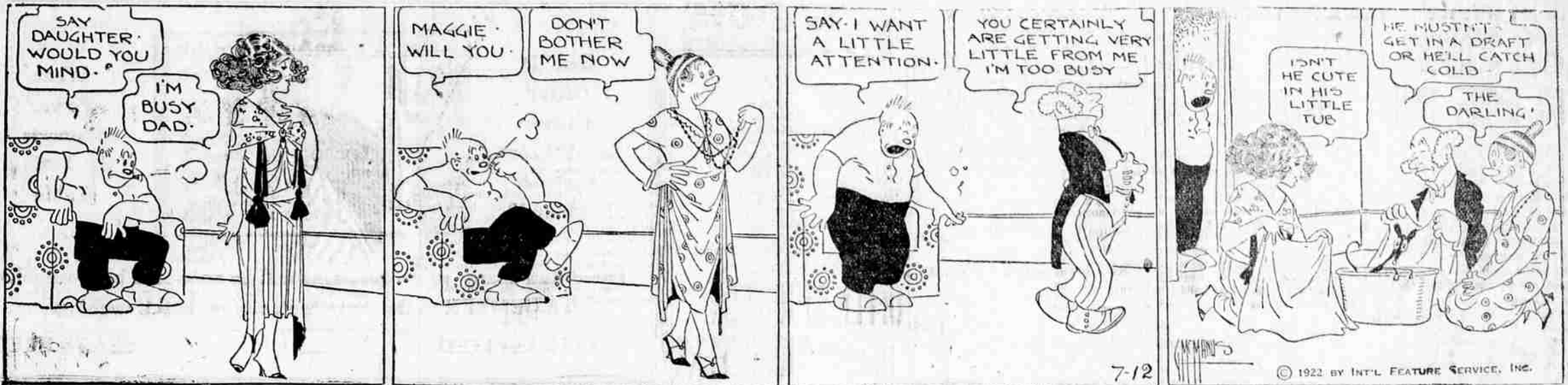


BRINGING UP FATHER

HUMANITY AT SEA,
CHAOS AT HAND,
SAYS REV. WALKER

"Humanity Today at Sea" was the opening thought of Evangelist A. G. Walker's lecture at the canvas pavilion last evening. "Lost in the maze and wanderings in the fog, humanity is groping about in the darkness of night and night."

The evangelist asserted that "the underpinning is gone, the bottom has dropped out of things, and the mortar from the cracks of civilization's walls is falling out. Chaos is apparent." These assertions were authentically vindicated from the utterances of Holy Writ and by allusion to the words of the greatest of the world's thinkers.

"Paradoxical however, while the nations of the world are lost in the maze, God walks in the light, for He is light. He knoweth what is in the darkness and the light dwelleth in Him."—Daniel 2:22.

"Nations have arisen. They have spent their brief but brilliant existence in tyranny and oppression and have passed unregretted and almost forgotten, only to give place to nations more vile, beastly, and tyrannical."

The evangelist described the true philosophy of history by these words: "In the annals of human history, the growth of nations and the rise and fall of empires appear as dependent on the will and prowess of man. The shaping of events seem to be determined by his power, ambition, or caprice. But in the word of God, the curtain is drawn aside, and we behold, behind, above, and through all the play and counterplay of human interests and power and passions, the agencies of the all-merciful one, constantly, patiently working out the councils of His own will."

Since "God is the ruler of the nations," some may wonder why governments are so corrupt. Mr. Walker said, "the power exercised by every ruler is Heaven-imparted; and upon his use of the power thus bestowed, his success depends." Some Bible texts were then quoted. "Righteousness exalteth a nation but sin is a reproach to any people." (Proverbs 14:34); "The throne is established by righteousness" (Proverbs 16:12); "Mercy and truth preserve the king; and his throne is upheld by mercy." (Proverbs 20:28).

"As long as nations carry out God's plans for their operation and existence, so long those nations exist; but when they fail to work in harmony with heaven's laws, when they give honor to men which is due alone to God, they go down into history,—for God overturns them." (Genesis 15:16).

The whole lecture was based on Nebuchadnezzar's dream recorded in the second chapter of Daniel, the details of which had gone from the mind of the mighty monarch of Babylon.

The empires of Babylon, Media, Persia, Greece and Rome including its ten divisions, were represented by various parts of the great image. The evangelist declared that "we are living down in the very toes of the image,—which consist of a composite mixture of iron and clay. These ten toes are ten kingdoms, viz.: the Vandals, the Heruli, the Ostrogoths, the Burgundians, the Visigoths, the Sueves, the Huns, the Lombards, the Franks, and the Saxons. The barbarian tribes coming down from the north, with the exception of the first three, became the modern European nations—Germany, France, Great Britain, Portugal, Spain, Switzerland, and Italy."

"In spite of the attempts of men to unite and consolidate these ten kingdoms both by brute force and intermarriage, as the prophecy declared would be attempted, the seven brief words, 'they shall not cleave one to another,' proved stronger than all the combined attempts of Charlemagne, Charles V., Louis XIV., Napoleon Bone-

parte and the Kaiser." (Daniel 2:43).

With impassioned appeal, the climax of the sermon was based on verse 44 of the same chapter: "And in the days of these kings (plural) shall the God of Heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed; and the kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever."

Hooper of the United States Rail-

road Labor Board in his statement of

July 1st, reading as follows:

"In this case the conflict is not

between the employer and the op-

pressed employees. The people of the

country, through an act of Congress,

signed by President Wilson, estab-

lished a tribunal to decide such dis-

putes over wages and working con-

ditions which are submitted to it in

a proper manner. It is the decision

of this tribunal against which the

shop crafts are striking. Regardless

of any question of the right of the

men to strike the men who take the

strikers' places are merely accepting

the wages and working conditions

prescribed by a government tribunal

and are performing a public service.

They are not accepting the wages and

working conditions which an em-

ployer is trying to impose. For this

reason, public sentiment and full

government power will protect the

men who remain in their positions

and new men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been

made for the full protection of all

new employees, the same as old em-

ployees who have remained loyal to

work.
