FRENCH SUSPICIOUS GERMANY'S APPEAL

PARIS, July 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—The French government has replied to the British note with a view to bringing about peace in the Near East, to which the Greeks and the Turkish nationalists would be invited to send representatives. France accepts in principle the plan for holding the conference, the details of which are to be settled upon later.

Lasseter of Ordway, Colo., a passenger.

BROWNS GAIN IN AMERICAN, GIANTS DRUB ALEXANDER

CHICAGO, July 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—Knocking Waite Hoyt out of the box, the St. Louis Browns yesterday evened the "crucial series" with the Yankees by taking the second game 7 to 4, and today had a lead of a game and a half over their New York rivals.

The Giants increased their lead to four and a half games as a result of driving Alexander to cover and downing the Cubs for the second time, 5 to 3, while Philadelphia upset St. Louis in both ends of a double header checking the Cardinals' winning streak of eight straight games. Rogers Hornsby rapped out his 23rd homer of the season.

Ty Cobb's five hits and Harry Heilmann's fourteenth homer helped the Tigers trounce the Athletics, 7 to 2, while Cleveland hit Karr and Penock for twenty hits, all of them singles and won from Boston, 11 to 7.

The Brooklyn Dodgers sustained their seventh straight setback in the west, losing to Cincinnati, 4 to 1.

Yellowhorse outpitched Frank Miller, but the Pirates could not hit in the pinches and Boston won, 4 to 3. Ulfen Fabege Washington down with four hits and Chicago was victorious.

News Summary of Last Night

CHICAGO—A flat refusal to meet with B. M. Jewell, head of the striking shopmen to discuss peace proposals was the answer of railway executives to a proposal made by Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States railroad labor board.

WASHINGTON—Members of all unions affiliated with the metal trades department of the American Federation of Labor were instructed in orders sent out from headquarters here that no further repair work will be authorized in locomotives coming from railroads on which strikes are in progress, to outside shops employing union labor.

NEEDLES, Cal.—Four men were wounded in a clash between strikers and roundhouse men here.
