It is understood that this figure, which was the actual cost of the property to the city, is satisfactory to General White. All that now remains to be done is to pass an ordinance in regular council meeting next Tuesday night authorizing the sale of the property. After the ordinance has been passed it is expected that actual construction work on the armory will begin within a period of six weeks. Confidence is expressed by the majority of councilmen that the ordinance will be passed at last night's meeting. Councilman Antle was not present. Due to the allowance of \$7000 to the city for its property the actual cash appropriation for the armory fund on the city's part will be \$13,000, the county's portion is \$20,000, and that of the state is \$40,000, making a total of \$73,000 for the actual construction work on the building.
