

LABOR CONVENTION IN DISORDER AS CHARGES HURLED

BREMERTON, Wash., July 14.—The convention of the Washington State Federation of Labor was thrown into disorder this afternoon when President William M. Short accused delegates who had spoken in favor of unit political affiliation with the farmer-labor party with practicing "sabotage" and efforts at a "germyrander that might thwart the convention's normal mind," by so delaying procedure that "many delegates would leave for home, leaving the affiliation group in control."

Fourteen speakers had expressed their views up to the time Mr. Short intervened, ten of them favoring the proposed combination of the federation with the third party, two in opposition and two attempting mediation.

An effort was being made this afternoon to limit debate on the question of political policy to reach a vote, but the disorder prevailing was so complete that success of the proposal was in doubt.

WAR DEPARTMENT TO MAKE SAVING

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Secretary Weeks had compiled a table showing that the war department books for the last fiscal year show prospective savings in the department for the period of approximately \$75,000,000 of which \$35,000,000 represents projects which were postponed to a later date, and \$40,000,000 funds which will be returned to the unappropriated balance in the treasury.

HERRIN MASSACRE PROBE UNLIMITED IN TIME, MONEY

ST. LOUIS, July 14.—Investigation of the recent massacre at the strip mine of the Southern Illinois Coal company near Herrin, Ill., in which a score of non-union mine workers were killed by striking union miners, will be pursued by the state of Illinois until the men responsible for the massacre are brought to justice, regardless of the time and effort required, Attorney General Edward J. Brundage of Illinois said here today.

Attorney General Brundage arrived here from Springfield, Ill., and plans to go to Marion, Ill., the county seat of Williamson county, to confer with State's Attorney Deles Duty on matters relating to the investigation.

The attorney general said he had a number of operatives from his office working on the case in Williamson county.

TURK WAR ON RED REGIME A FIZZLE

MOSCOW, July 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The campaign against the soviet regime in Bokhara, Turkistan and Khiva, headed by Enver Pasha, Turkish communist, is ending in disaster, according to advices to the newspaper Pravda.

The Bokhara red army, assisted by the Russians, defeated Enver's detachment near Blum and on July 2 the pick of Enver's forces led by him were defeated near Karatagh, losing more than 200 killed.

After this disaster Enver is declared to have fled into the mountains with the remainder of his army.

KIANGSI OUTBREAK HORROR UNRIVALED WANTON KILLING

SHANGHAI, China, June 21.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Missionaries and others in China during the recent uprising of mutinous troops in Kiangsi province declare the full extent of this horror may never be known.

A score of community centers were laid waste and thousands of innocent inhabitants were slaughtered ruthlessly. No foreigners, however, were killed.

The Kiangsi outbreak in the unrestrained looting of evil forces and the wanton slaughter and destruction, is said to surpass anything of a like nature in the past decade. Between 10,000 and 15,000 men were involved.

The mutineers swept over the country, looting, burning and killing, devastating towns and rural communities alike. The city of Kianfu was almost entirely wiped out and many hundreds of its inhabitants slain. The lives of upward of 100 foreign missionaries were in peril, but all escaped. The principal centers destroyed were the cities of Kianfu, Wanahsien, Lungchuan and Taiho, while upward of twenty smaller communities were damaged or wiped out.

Mrs. Edington's death will indeed occasion widespread regret, for to meet her was to form an affection for her.

Deceased was born March 2, 1854, on what was then the Occidental ranch, eight miles north of this city. Excepting three years, she had lived her entire life in this valley. She was the wife of the late Joseph B. Edington to whom she was married in 1893. No children came to their union.

Deceased was a member of the Rebecca unit at Canyon City, Oregon. A sister, Mrs. W. A. Trubody, of Napa and these three brothers survive: Robert Grigsby, of Callistoga; Alfonso Grigsby, of San Diego county; James P. Grigsby, of Sacramento. A number of nieces and nephews also survive. Deceased was an aunt of Lula M. Penland of Ashland.

The remains are now at the G. G. Pinkham Funeral Parlors. The arrangements for the funeral have not been completed.—Napa (Cal.) Register.

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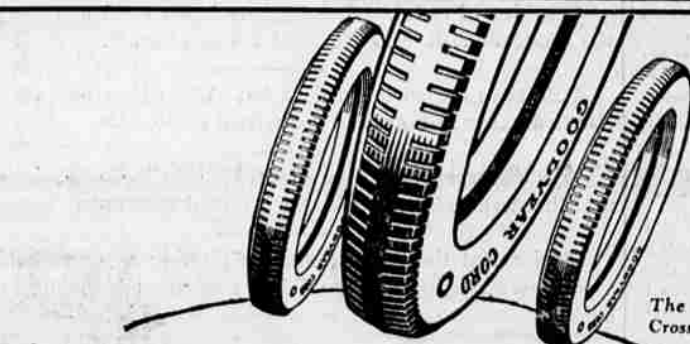
