

UNION LABOR ON TRAIL OF JUDGES AND POINDEXTER

U. S. Senator and State Supreme Court Members Are Listed for Strongest Possible Fight to Defeat—Prison Labor Condemned—Oppose Child Labor.

BREMERTON, Wash., July 14.—Organized labor in Washington is urged to "make the strongest possible fight to defeat United States Senator Miles Poindexter," and "the four reactionary members of the state supreme court who come up for re-election this year," in the report of the executive council presented to the annual convention of the organization here today.

A conference of representatives of farmers' and railwaymen's organizations "and other liberal groups" to accomplish this result is recommended. Other recommendations include:

A demand on congress to immediately submit a constitutional amendment abolishing child labor.

Continuance of the federation's support of striking coal miners and passage of a resolution expressing "our admiration for the self sacrificing, courageous and effective fight they are making on behalf of their own organization and the whole labor movement of the state."

Re-endorsement of the federation's stand in support of the co-operative movement through the Rochelle system.

Condemnation of the "industrial program being inaugurated at the state penitentiary and the exploitation by the state of prison labor," and demand that the legislature prohibit its continuance.

A "united demand" on state administrative officials that in the letting of road and construction contracts a clause be inserted requiring contractors to pay all classes of labor the wage scale paid for similar work in the closest industrial center.

United support of the state labor movement to "any local union or group of unions that may be attacked by injunctions during the course of any controversy and that a united and militant fight be made to compel the courts to abandon this unauthorized, illegal and vicious practice."

The report declares in conclusion the belief of the council that the "open shop hysteria that threatened to envelop our nation and crush our movement," is now "rapidly waning." It calls attention to the "militant policy being pursued by the American Federation of Labor to encompass the defeat of our enemies," and urges the state federation to co-operate in this campaign in the state of Washington.
