

LEGAL MOVES IN RECALL AGITATION UP THIS AFTERNOON

A lull came today in the agitation arising out of the recall of Sheriff Terrill, and even the bombardment of gossip subsided for the first time in two weeks.

However, it is the quiet before the storm. The anti-recall forces announce they will file application for an injunction restraining the county clerk from taking any steps towards holding the special election, late this afternoon.

The basis of the injunction will be the lack of sufficient charges and the validity of the names on the petitions. Another point will be the "report of the 1921 grand jury," the charges of malfeasance and non-performance of duty being therein set forth, the petitions said. The grand jury report mentioned says nothing about either, investigation shows. The report of February, 1922, does. This is only a few months, but renders the petitions incapable of holding legal water.

The recall forces announce they will file this afternoon the nominating petitions for D. M. Lowe, farmer and fair exhibit collector. Here will arise another legal matter to thresh out in the courts, whether a nominating petition should be filed with the recall, or later when convenient.

Those favoring the recall say that the petition filed Thursday was intended only as an endorsement of Mr. Lowe, in case Sheriff Terrill resigned.

GRACE WILSON SUIT IN MEDFORD TAX ACTION DISMISSED

The attorney for Grace M. Wilson in the case of Grace M. Wilson vs. City of Medford has filed a motion in the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon for the dismissal of the case. This case was decided by Judge F. M. Calkins in favor of the city of Medford last December. This suit grew out of the selling by the city of Medford of property for delinquent assessments. The city of Medford had sold all property which had delinquent assessments against it, whether signed up under the Bancroft act or under the charter amendment known as the amended Hanson plan.

Judge Calkins held in his decision in the Grace M. Wilson suit that the charter amendment known as the amended Hanson plan was constitutional and valid and that the city of Medford had the right to sell any property for delinquent assessments under the provisions and by the procedure laid down in said charter amendment whether said property was signed up under the Bancroft Act, or under the charter amendment known as the amended Hanson plan whenever said property had delinquent assessments against it.

The plaintiff, Grace M. Wilson appealed from the decision of Judge Calkins to the Supreme Court of Oregon and filed her transcript of the case in the supreme court a few months ago. They have now decided to abandon the appeal and have asked the supreme court to dismiss the case.

800 A. PASTURAGE ROXY ANN SLOPE SWEEP BY FLAMES

A grass fire raged on the southwest slope of Roxy Ann Thursday afternoon and night, burning over about 800 acres, most of it winter and spring pasturage of the Westerlund orchards. A mile or two of fence was destroyed, and about five acres of the orchard singed. The fire was put under control late Thursday night by back firing. In the afternoon it was subdued but the firefighters ran out of water, and it resumed.

According to reports, the fire started on the east side of Roxy Ann, and came over the crest, and was started when a match, being used to light a cigarette, was thrown carelessly or accidentally into some fox-tail. The result was like lighting powder.

All the cherry pickers were recruited to fight the flames. The same area was burned over by a fire two years ago. The principal loss is range feed for cattle.

education under former Commissioner Claxton distribute articles about chemistry written by R. E. Ross of the chemical department of the DuPont company.

Another illustration of how, he said, "great agencies of the government were victimized by the dye makers of the country and our public agencies turned to use in private propaganda," the senator presented correspondence designed to show that the dye exhibits recently shown at Chicago, Philadelphia, Rochester, N. Y., Washington and other cities and now in the national museum here, had been financed by the dye makers, having been prepared in the chemical warfare section of the war department. The correspondence was between Captain O. E. Roberts, Jr., and the DuPont company, the National Aniline and Chemical com-

pany and other concerns. Of the E. I. DuPont de Nemours company. Senator Moses declared that the people, through advances from the federal treasury during the war, "not only financed the DuPonts in the tremendous extension of their business but were also mulcted by the DuPonts to an extent which en-

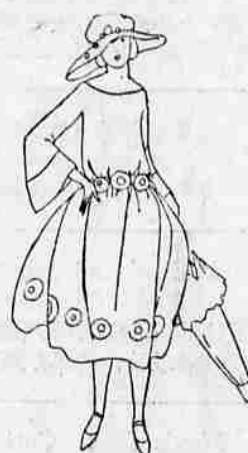
