News Summary of Last Night

BALTIMORE—A Baltimore and Ohio passenger train, bound from Washington to Baltimore, was fired upon as it neared Camden station. No one was injured.

MORRISTOWN, N. J.—Francis Klusen, 12 years old, was acquitted by a jury of murdering 11-year-old Janette Lawrence.

PHILADELPHIA—The Public Ledger in a copyrighted dispatch from Rongbuk, Glacier Camp, India, via London, announced that the expedition to climb Mount Everest has been abandoned as a result of an avalanche in which seven porters were killed.

CLEVELAND—Members of the American Federation of railroad workers employed here, voted to join the shopmen's strike at nine o'clock Monday morning. The union has a membership of 20,000. Approximately 1200 men will go out here.

EARTH PURIFIED BY FIRE, RESTORED, EVANGELIST SAYS

This old earth is to be restored, after it is purified by fire. God recreates it and makes it new. Here, where God placed man originally, a race of righteous beings, descendants of Adam and Eve shall dwell, asserts T. L. Thumler, who gave his lecture on "Eden Restored" at big tent last night.

"The history of sin has constituted a parenthetical clause between the Eden lost and the Eden restored. It was not God's will for sin to come, but he permitted it and he has overruled it to the benefit of the race; and while sin is disagreeable, in the end we shall be glad to have been here. We have experienced the fruits of redemption which we shall ever after enjoy.

"The righteous shall inherit the land and dwell therein forever." Ps. 37:29. "Blessed are the meek; for they shall inherit the earth." Christ: Matt 5:5.

"We have in these texts declarations from both the old and new testaments concerning the future reward of the righteous. This cannot apply in the present life, as righteousness, a very characteristic that diminishes the chances of worldly possessions.

In Ps. 73, we find David recounting his experience in observing the prosperity of the wicked, which caused him to stumble, until a view of their final punishment caused him to see that this life does not end all. God's purpose concerning the earth is to have it inhabited; had it not been for sin, the earth would have been inhabited by a race of holy, sinless beings. Shall we believe that God's original purpose is to be thwarted by Satan? Such would be the case if the language of our text is not fulfilled, and the righteous dwell in the land forever."

"The speaker called attention to certain scripture promises that have never yet been fulfilled. "But as truly as I live all the earth shall be filled with the glory of the Lord." Num. 14:21. "For the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea," Hab. 2:14.

"The promise to Abraham in Gen. 12:15, and confirmed to Isaac in Gen. 24:4 of the whole earth for a possession (see Rom. 4:13) and an everlasting inheritance for his seed, has never been fulfilled as yet. 7:5 most assert. In Heb. 11:9 we learn that they "sojourned in the land of promise as in a strange country," and in Verse 13 that they "all died in faith, not having received the promises," but saw them afar off and embraced them through faith. The reason for this is given in Verse 40—"that they without us should not be made perfect." The plan was broadened to take in more than the literal descendants of Abraham, comprising all who are his seed through Christ.

The hope of the Christian is based upon the Abrahamic promise, in Heb. 6:13-20. This point is clearly set forth, and that promise is shown to furnish "strong consolation" to those who have fled for refuge to the hope set before them. In Paul's wonderful defense before Agrippa, instead of claiming a new hope and faith, he declared that he stood and was judged for the hope of the promise made of God unto our fathers; and for that very hope was accused of the Jews.

"A possession has been purchased for the people of God. In Eph. 1:13, 14, the Holy Spirit is declared to be the earnest of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession." When a piece of property is purchased, possession is not immediately given. A deposit is usually made, an "earnest money." In this case we have a "purchased possession," not yet redeemed and the spirit is given as an earnest of our inheritance until the redemption takes place.

"Thank God! The time is coming when sin and its instigator shall cease to be, when all the universe of God shall ascribe praise and glory to his name.

"Fly swiftly round, ye wheels of time. And bring the welcome day."

SECTION HANDS MAY GO ON STRIKE

NEW YORK, July 15.—Prediction that E. F. Grable, president of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railroad Shop Workers would issue a strike order to the 400,000 men of his union "at any hour," was made today by William Parker, leader of the New York Central maintenance of way men and president of the union's association of eastern chairmen.

The New York Central men, he declared, "are up in arms," against Grable's action in holding off the strike, "for which they had voted overwhelmingly." Pressure is being brought to bear upon Grable by chairmen in all parts of the country, who in turn are merely relaying protests from the men, Parker said.

If Grable persisted in his refusal to order a strike, the general chairmen undoubtedly "would take things into their own hands," Parker declared.

Bank Clearings Gain
NEW YORK, July 15.—The actual condition of the clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows that they hold \$12,316,550 in excess of legal requirements. This is a decrease of \$25,590,940 from last week.

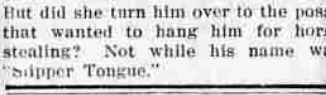
