

FORD AND FORDSON POWER EXPOSITION CARAVAN ON HAND

Arriving in Medford from Ashland this morning, the Ford and Fordson caravan is here for two days in which to demonstrate industrial, commercial and power farming equipment. The caravan will have its headquarters at the natatorium camp grounds.

Carrying the DeLoe light system, the caravan is amply provided with illumination for the night shows Monday and Tuesday. In addition to a program of evening lectures by experts in their respective fields, and a widely varied movie show, the "Frisco" jazz band has been engaged to tour the city streets Monday and Tuesday evening, rendering a number of selections, prior to returning to the natatorium grounds where the band will complete the musical program.

Teaching Medford at a time when ample opportunity for a number of special demonstrations is presented, the caravan will conduct a field day Monday and Tuesday at the grounds of the new Jackson county fair.

Being situated on the highway, south, where traffic is heavy, and also being convenient of access from any part of the city, this demonstration site offers an exceptional chance to see all manner of industrial operations.

The John G. Rose ranch, also on the highway, is close to the city and a most convenient location for a greater number of farmers than would be any other location.

Then, as was done with great success at Ashland, there will be demonstrations at various points within the city. The Ashland best and water departments utilized some of the caravan equipment Monday and Saturday. Ford trucks were used for hauling mail and for many other commercial and industrial purposes.

Upon concluding each day's work in the field, each of the 26 units, hauling or carrying its own equipment, will assemble at the natatorium camp grounds each evening. Records of each demonstration during the day will be tabulated for reference each evening.

The enterprise represents an expense of many thousands of dollars; a large number of highly-paid mechanics, specialists and officials are with the caravan; road conditions, considering the 4000 miles to be covered during the tour, are hard upon expensive equipment, and for these and other reasons, it is unlikely that a similar show will visit Medford for a number of years.

The caravan leaves early Wednesday for Grants Pass on the return to Portland and the completion of its statewide tour.

Dr. W. P. Covington of the Rockefeller Institute will address the members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce at their forum next Wednesday.

Five counties in Oregon will be given financial assistance from the institute, which Dr. Covington represents, in the employment of a full time county physician. Jackson county has been selected as one to receive this offer and the details of how a full time county physician will be a benefit to the citizens of the county will be explained.

Some five thousand dollars is being offered the county which is of a sufficient amount to receive the attention of the authorities. Members of the Public Health association and the Greater Medford club are extended the privilege of the forum to hear Dr. Covington.

NEW YORK GIANTS LOSE, CARDINALS HALF GAME BEHIND

NEW YORK, July 17.—First place in the National league today hinged on the outcome of the third game of the New York-St. Louis series. The Cardinals, who cut down the Giants' lead 3½ games in a week climbed to within a half game of the top yesterday by taking their second straight from the champions 1 to 0.

The Yankees sustained their second shutout of the season and dropped farther behind the league leading St. Louis Browns by losing the second game of the series to the White Sox 4 to 0. Red Faber held Murderers' Row to three scattered hits while Gleason's men pounded Joe Bush hard. Yaryan and Hooper lacing out home runs.

St. Louis by defeating Washington 2-0 increased their lead to one and a half games.

Hubert Pruett, sensational young southpaw of the St. Louis Browns, who attracted attention by striking out Babe Ruth three times, once with the bases full in the second game of the series with New York last week, has proved himself a real nemesis of the home run king.

Ruth has faced Pruett ten times in three games this season, records show, and fanned on seven of these occasions. He was walked twice and tapped weakly on the other times so that he has failed so far to connect safely with the youngster's fade-away, reputed to resemble the one that made Christy Mathewson famous.

HONOLULU, July 17.—The all-Chinese baseball stars took another extra inning contest from Stanford university yesterday, winning 8 to 7 in 11 innings. Stanford scored two in the ninth to tie the game, five all. Each team added two more in the tenth, but the Chinese drew one ahead in the eleventh and held the advantage.

Arrangements for the use of all airplanes available for mail service have been made should the mail service be curtailed by the railway strike, Arthur C. Leader, postmaster of Chicago announced today after conferences with heads of all airplane operating companies.

Seventy new shop employees of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad were suffering today from poisoning as a result of eating food served to railway strikebreakers. The men were stricken during the last three days.

It was indicated today that Dr. Louis Vait, in charge of the investigation of the origin of the poison had information which he expected would lead to the discovery of the culprits. Examination of the milk served to the workers had been made.

Gordon McKay, Pacific coast middleweight champion will box Wildcat Welty at the Medford Athletic club smoker Thursday night, the two men agreeing to terms Sunday. McKay is en route to Oakland, Calif., where he will meet Panama Joe Gans, and has a bout scheduled with Harry Greb, light heavyweight champion of America, at Pittsburgh, Pa., in September. McKay is rated as one of the best middleweights in the land, and local fans will have a chance to see the Wildcat in action against a real boxer. McKay will work out every evening at 7:30 o'clock, and the fans are invited to come and see him train.
