

LOWE PETITION FILED, ACCEPTED BY COUNTY CL'K

Petition Nominating D. M. Lowe in Recall Contest Filed at Noon Today — 156 Names On Document—Injunction Action Pending.

The petition nominating D. M. Lowe to make the race against Sheriff Charles E. Terrill, at the recall election to be held Saturday, July 29th, was filed with the county clerk at noon today. It will be accepted by that official. The petition, under the law requires 150 names, and 156 were on the petition. A majority were residents of Ashland, with representations from all other parts of the valley.

The affidavit required under the law, relative to the genuineness of the signatures, and other legal details were sworn to by George Iverson, a carpenter, and William D. Hughes, proprietor of a vulcanizing shop, both of this city.

The injunction against the special election, to be filed by the Citizens' League for Sheriff Terrill is still in course of construction, owing to the presentation of affidavits from scores of citizens, and other matters which must be legally correct as undoubtedly the application will be carried to the supreme court of the state for final adjudication. The injunction will probably be filed before the end of the week.

Accompanying the nomination petitions is a formal statement by Mr. Lowe stating that he is a legal voter and resident of Jackson county, that he will make the race and qualify if elected.

It was reported, that the special grand jury called to investigate the series of necktie parties in this vicinity last spring would be convened next Monday, but the report could not be confirmed.

REFUSED TO HALT, SOLDIER SHOT

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., July 18.—Military policeman Jesse A. Arwood is held at the camp guard house here following the death yesterday of Private Harry Quigg, who died from a bullet wound inflicted by Arwood. Quigg was under arrest for a misdemeanor when he started to run. Arwood reported to his superior officers. Arwood said he shot Quigg through the stomach when he refused to obey commands to halt.

A military board will investigate the case and determine if a charge shall be lodged against Arwood.

Quigg's next of kin, a sister, Mrs. D. Gate, 218 West 30th street, Seattle and a sister, Mrs. H. E. Martin, Homerville, Ohio, have been notified.

SUPREME COURT DENIES DISMISSAL OF MEDFORD CASE

SALEM, July 18.—The supreme court today denied a motion for the dismissal of the suit of Grace M. Wilson against the City of Medford.

This case was decided by Judge F. M. Calkins in favor of the city of Medford last December. This suit grew out of the selling by the city of Medford of property for delinquent assessments. The city of Medford had sold all property which had delinquent assessments against it, whether signed up under the Bancroft act or under the charter amendment known as the amended Hanson plan.

Judge Calkins held in his decision in the Grace M. Wilson suit that the charter amendment known as the amended Hanson plan was constitutional and valid and that the city of Medford had the right to sell any property for delinquent assessments under the provisions and by the procedure laid down in said charter amendment whether said property was signed up under the Bancroft act, or under the charter amendment known as the amended Hanson plan, whenever said property had delinquent assessments against it.

The plaintiff, Grace M. Wilson, appealed from the decision of Judge Calkins to the Supreme Court of Oregon and filed her transcript of the case in the supreme court a few months ago. They have now decided to abandon the appeal and have asked the supreme court to dismiss the case.

V. A. C. Ahl of Grants Pass was the attorney for the plaintiff and Fred W. Mears, city attorney, was the attorney for the city of Medford.

There was no decision handed down by the supreme court today in the Cameron case from Jackson county. The case involves the question whether a man has the right to run water through another man's ditch, by condemning a right of way thru it, and the principal litigants are Messrs. Cameron, Buckley and Devlin all Applegate district farmers.

RAISE FUND FOR OLCOTT RECOUNT

SALEM, Ore., July 18.—Friends of Governor Ben W. Olcott today launched a movement to raise a fund to defray expenses in connection with the suit brought on behalf of Charles Hall in which Hall's supporters contest the republican nomination for governor in the May primaries. Paul B. Wallace, Salem businessman is treasurer of the committee.

Big Freighter Aground
SEATTLE, July 18.—The big freighter Mobile City is still hard and fast aground off Protection Island this morning despite extensive preparations to float her with the high tide. The vessel is resting easy, apparently undamaged and is in almost the same position in which she grounded Sunday night.

TEN INDICTED BY GOVERNMENT FOR WAR FRAUD

WASHINGTON, July 18.—An indictment against ten persons, charging conspiracy to defraud the United States out of more than \$1,000,000 in connection with the disposition of government lumber following the war was returned today by the special federal grand jury, which has been in session since June 1 investigating the transactions.

Those named in the indictment are John L. Phillips, republican state committeeman for Georgia; John Stephens, partner of Phillips; Ernest C. Morse, Charles Shotwell, George M. Chambers, Frank T. Sullivan, Roland Perry, Charles Phillips Jr., Gus Eitzen, and Mitchell A. Tolant, Jr.

The indictment was the first to be reported by the grand jury empaneled to investigate war frauds, for which inquiry congress appropriated \$500,000 for the use by Attorney General Daugherty and a special corps of assistants.

AGUINALDO NOT TO ATTEND MEETING

MANILA, P. I., July 17.—(By the Associated Press)—Emilio Aguinaldo, formerly leader of the Filipino revolutionists, who had planned to attend the Spanish war veterans convention in Los Angeles, likely will be unable to make the trip owing to lack of public funds to finance it.

A Filipino committee is attempting to raise the needed amount, but it is not believed it will succeed, owing to the short time left in which to work.

STEPHENS CAR WINS SANTA ROSA RACE

The Stephens Sallent Six has won in its class and the sweepstakes cup in an economy run held at Santa Rosa July 11.

There were fourteen contestants and the run was held over 176 miles of the steepest and most winding roads in California. Each car carried an official observer and coasting or slipping of the clutch was not permitted.

Under these conditions the Stephens Sallent Six averaged 19.66 miles per gallon and 38.86 ton miles per gallon of gasoline according to Mr. Treichler of the Geo. L. Treichler Motor company.

The White Auto company of Los Angeles issued a sweeping challenge for the month of June offering to give \$1000 to any dealer of a six cylinder car selling in Los Angeles from \$1395 to \$2195 inclusive that could beat the Stephens Sallent Six in an economy run to San Francisco and return. There were no takers.

On July 7, a Stephens car with Fred Johnson at the wheel and George F. Stephenson of the A. A. A. as official observer left Los Angeles returning there Tuesday, July 11 with a perfect score for performance and averaged 40.4 miles to the gallon of gasoline and without using enough oil to change the position of the indicator on the oil gauge.

The Leggett affidavit follows:

"STATE OF OREGON,

"COUNTY OF JACKSON, ss:

"I, J. H. Leggett, being first duly sworn, on oath depose and say that I am over the age of 30 years, and that I am a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Medford, Jackson County, Oregon; that I was one of a party of four consisting of S. B. Sandifer, B. L. Moses, R. J. Schrader and myself, who went to Lake Creek, Jackson county, Oregon for the purpose of searching the premises occupied by J. W. Antle, for intoxicating liquor, that was reported to be on the said premises; that on arriving there, we searched the said premises of Mr. Antle, but found no evidence save and except an empty bottle that said Mr. Antle in the presence of the above named men and myself, made the following statement:

"That Sheriff Terrill of Jackson county, Oregon, was out a short time ago to warn me that Sandifer was coming out to raid me, and to be careful, that if he didn't find anything that he would plant it on me."

ROCKEFELLER FUND TO AID JACKSON COUNTY STRICKEN

Members of the Public Health association and the Greater Medford club interested in hearing Dr. P. W. Covington of the Rockefeller Institute, on the value of having a full time health officer for Jackson county, are extended the privilege of the forum of the Medford chamber of commerce which is to be held at the Medford hotel tomorrow noon.

The duty of the health officer is more for the prevention of sickness than to treat those in ill health, altho he will be required to give medical assistance to those who are unable to pay for same.

Dr. Covington will explain the method used in many counties to prevent sickness and avoid epidemics from becoming serious, which is an economic gain in dollars and cents to any locality. Thousands of dollars are lost annually in Jackson county in preventable sickness and an endeavor to save this loss is the object of the Rockefeller Institute in offering financial assistance to get a full time county physician here.
