

BANKER URGES REFORESTATION PACIFIC COAST

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—The Seattle chapter of the American Institute of Banking was unanimously declared the winner of a debate with the New York chapter at the annual convention of the institute here today. Seattle had the negative of the question "resolved that the United States enter into an agreement for the mutual cancellation of the inter-allied war debt."

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—Western states, particularly Oregon and Washington, should take steps for reforestation by acquisition of cut-over lands and raising new crops of timber, after the plan already adopted in New York, Pennsylvania, Minnesota and Wisconsin, said George S. Long of Tacoma, vice president and general manager of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company in an address before the convention of the American Institute of Banking here today.

Referring to a report by Forester Greely of the federal forest service, in which it was forecast that within 75 years the timber resources of the United States would be well exhausted unless proper steps are taken to grow a new crop Mr. Long said that while there was no immediate alarm of a timber famine, no time should be lost in taking conservative measures.

Mentioning the work the federal government is doing in the creation and management of forest reserves, Mr. Long said this field of operation should be enlarged and not left to the government alone.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—Seattle was early pitted against New York in a debate today at the convention of the American Institute of Banking on the question of "resolved that the United States enter into an agreement for the mutual cancellation of the inter-allied war debt."

New York had the affirmative and Seattle the negative.

New York's team included J. V. D. Striker, C. H. Schoch and E. A. Lahm with John Golden as alternative.

Seattle's representatives were Allen P. Hull, and Herbert C. Bryant, Casper W. Clark, with W. C. Phillips as alternative.

RUSSIA OFFERS A NEW PROPOSAL FOR SETTLEMENT

THE HAGUE, July 19.—(By the Associated Press.)—New proposals in connection with compensation for confiscated property and payment of the Russian debt were advanced by the Russian delegation at a meeting today with the entire Russian commission of the conference on Russian affairs here. The Russians suggested an arrangement by which Russia would undertake to negotiate directly with foreigners for the payment of compensation for confiscated property and bondholders for settlement of the Russian debt.

The Russians proposed that all the delegations including the Russian subject their project to their respective governments and await an answer for one week at The Hague. The Russians for the time being dropped the question of credits, they said the non-Russians had declined credits. It was announced that the non-Russian representatives would meet later to discuss the proposal.

Russia, her representatives said, would engage to make arrangements with claimants within two years.

MEXICAN BANDIT GETS AMNESTY

MEXICO CITY, July 18.—General Francisco Cabrera, the rebel leader, who has been operating for some time in the Huasteca oil region, has received official amnesty and has surrendered to the federal authorities according to advices received today from Tampico. Cabrera for some time was allied with General Goroza, who was killed by federal soldiers under command of General Guadalupe Sanchez.

HUBBY OF HAMMER MURDERESS CLAIMS HE'S MELLON' KIN

LOS ANGELES, July 19.—Mrs. Clara Phillips, accused by indictment of the murder of Mrs. Alberta Meadows here a week ago was denied the privilege of seeing visitors other than her counsel today. Even her husband, A. L. Phillips, was denied admission to the county jail where Mrs. Phillips awaits her next appearance in court, set for tomorrow morning. She is expected to plead then to the indictment having been arraigned yesterday. Her attorneys have declined to anticipate the formal plea, but their activities yesterday and today in getting a line on possible evidence led court officials to expect a plea of not guilty.

Sheriff Traeger had arranged to have a woman clerk from a downtown store who was believed to have sold Mrs. Phillips a light claw hammer shortly before the time of the murder, visit the jail today to see whether she could complete identification of the prisoner as the purchaser. Mrs. Meadows was killed by blows about the head from a hammer.

The defense attorneys today declined to discuss a statement published here and attributed to Mr. Phillips that he was a second cousin of Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the United States treasury, but word received here from the family of Secretary Mellon denied any relationship.

First Special Grand Jury in 120 Years Is Called in Ohio City

ST. CLAIRSVILLE, O., July 19.—(U. N. S.) A special grand jury—the first special grand jury to be called in the 120 years of Belmont county's existence—has been convened here. It was called to investigate coal strike rioting which has resulted in the death of one man and the injury of three others.

LITTLE RED SCHOOL CALIFORNIA DOOMED

SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 19.—(U. N. S.) The little red school house is doomed. It is picturesque but inefficient.

Such was the statement of Sam H. Cohn, assistant state superintendent of state instruction, in announcing the outcome of comparative tests recently held by the state department of education to determine the effectiveness of the rural educational system.

The state tests showed an alarming condition, Cohn said. City school children are from two to three years more advanced in mental development than rural students in similar grades. The school system employed in the country is responsible for this situation and not the students, it was declared.

The one room rural school is not a success as a teaching institution, Cohn said, and it is fast passing.

Vancouver to Row
PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—Oarsmen from Vancouver, B. C., who are to participate in the annual championship regatta of the North Pacific Association of Amateur Oarsmen here Friday and Saturday are due to arrive here tonight. The Victoria, B. C., crews are expected to reach here the following morning.

ALLOW SHIPMENT OF LIQUOR TO YUKON

DAWSON, Y. T., July 19.—Special permission from the United States government for the trans-shipment through Alaska of a consignment of liquor to Yukon has assured this territory a two years' supply of drinkables.

When an order issued at Washington recently definitely banned the carriage of intoxicating liquor through United States territory enroute from one country to another it began to look as if the Yukon would have to go dry in spite of its popular vote in favor of government sale of liquor. All present roads to the Yukon lie through Alaska.

Nothing to Do But Work.
WASHINGTON, July 19.—President Harding has "no plans for the summer except work." It was stated at the White House today. At least fifty houses have been tendered to the president as a residence during the summer, but none of the offers has been accepted.
