ANOTHER PROGRESSIVE WINS.

AND NOW comes R. B. Howell of Omaha. Howell challenged
the Old Guard in Nebraska, as Beveridge did in Indiana, as
Pinchot did in Pennsylvania, as Brookhart did in Iowa, and like them
he has won by apparently a large plurality.

The writing on the wall is fairly plain. The Republican party of
the middle west is in revolt, not against Harding personally, but
against that conservative leadership which he represents. In the
rural districts particularly, the Republican voters don't like the pro-
posed tariff, they don't like the proposed Ship Subsidy, they favor
the farm bloc, and they intend to change leadership in the senate,
from the right to the left.

Of course there will be those who will see in this striking phenom-
ena, defeat for the Republican party in the fall. They will inter-
pret these primaries as a condemnation of the Harding administration
and a desire for radical political change.

We doubt this. Unless we are much mistaken there is no enthu-
siasm but a very general satisfaction with Harding as president. A
vast majority of the people feel that he is doing the best he can under
the circumstances, and are inclined to give him their support.

But they aren't satisfied with congress. They do not like many
of the measures which Harding has approved, and some of the ad-
visers the president has accepted, but the major blame they place on a
vacillating and do-nothing congress. Consequently they are proceed-
ing as rapidly and effectively as possible to change the leadership in
congress, and reform the Republican party, rather than split it.

In other words the victories of men like Beveridge, Brookhart, and
Pinchot, instead of showing a weakness in the G. O. P. rank and file
shows, in all likelihood, a decided vitality and strength. Instead of
sending dissatisfied voters to the Democratic party, they are keeping
those voters in the fold, and making the Old Guard decidedly un-
happy and uncomfortable, but still within the party because they
have no other place to go.

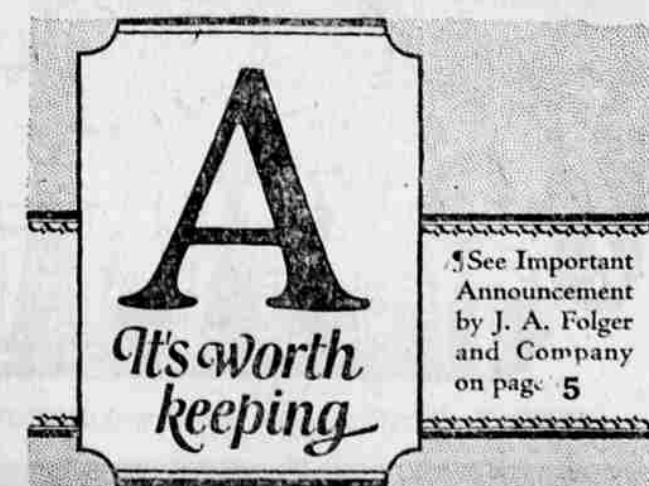

LOS ANGELES, July 19.—Johnny Meyers of Chicago, claimant of the world's middleweight wrestling championship who is training here for a proposed match with Walter Miller, western title holder, is short of training partners. He has issued a call to all middleweights and light heavyweights ambitious for exercise to work with him afternoons.

Giants Are Wobbling
CHICAGO, July 19.—(By Associated Press). Holding the lead in the National league by the scant margin of a half game, the Giants moved on to Cincinnati today after a disastrous series in St. Louis, in which they dropped three out of four games to the fast-going Cardinals. Rickey's men took the final game, 9 to 8, a see-saw slugfests, in which the lead changed five times. Eddie Ahmstutz cracked out his tenth homer of the season during the battle.

After dropping three in a row to Chicago the Yankees pounded three White Sox twirlers for twenty hits and a 14 to 4 victory in the final game. Bill Shawkey struck out ten men. Harry Hooper hit his third homer in as many days. Mousell and Witt registered four hits apiece, the former driving in seven runs.

Home runs by Speaker and Wood, coupled with Morton's effective pitching gave Cleveland a 6 to 3 victory over the Athletics and its ninth straight win, the longest winning streak in the American league this season.

Bob Veatch's homer with the bases full tied the score in the seventh, but the Red Sox came back with another run and defeated Detroit, 6 to 5 for the first time this season on their own grounds.
Three of the five hits gathered off Rixey were homers—two by Nicholson, and one by Boeckel—but the Reds hit Oeschger for fourteen safe blows and won from Boston by 9 to 3.

Cobb Not Dead Yet

CHICAGO, July 19.—Kenasaw Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, took a look at the papers today and learned to his surprise, that Ty Cobb was giving George Sisler a desperate fight for batting honors of the American league.

Cobb batting 406; Sisler 420; Cobb gets five hits in one game, including a home run, read the commissioner.
"Ain't it a shame about poor old man Cobb?" Landis said. "They said he was slipping and ready for the home for the aged."

"Five hits in one game—one a homer," mused the former federal judge—"and this after seventeen years in the American league."

LOS ANGELES, July 19.—Teddy Hayes, Jack Dempsey's trainer, has arrived here and plans to hold a conference with Jess Willard concerning the projected bout between Jess and the champion late this fall.
