

ANTI-PAROCHIAL SCHOOL MEASURE IS WITHDRAWN

DETROIT, July 19.—With the certainty that the proposed amendment to the state constitution, requiring all children of school age to attend the public schools, will not be submitted to the state voters at the November election, interest in the primary campaigns now centers in the three-cornered republican race for United States senator.

The proposed amendment, known as the anti-parochial school measure, was withheld for the election next spring. This measure was expected to vie with the senatorial race for interest throughout the state.

The three candidates seeking the nomination here on Sept. 12 are United States Senator Charles E. Townsend, long a Michigan representative in the upper house at Washington; Congressman Patrick H. Kelley of Lansing and Major John G. Emery of Grand Rapids, former national commander of the American Legion.

No democratic aspirant yet has entered the race but the party strongly has urged Governor Woodbridge N. Ferris, one of the few democrats in the history of the state to become governor, to take up the fight. The invitation to the former governor was extended some time ago at a convention of the party in Grand Rapids.

The republican senatorial fight will be one of the greatest political battles in the history of the state that saw the birth of the party, in the opinion of Michigan politicians. The issues are clearly defined but the one most often heard arises from the charges brought against Senator Truman H. Newberry, junior senator from Michigan, with respect to campaign expenditures. Senator Townsend's opponents, particularly Congressman Kelley, are assailing the senator because he championed the cause of Senator Newberry on the floor of the senate.

CHINA'S FINANCE MINISTER SHUTS UP HIS OFFICE

PEKING, July 19.—(By Associated Press.) Minister of Finance Tung Kang today closed the doors of the department of finance with the announcement that they would remain closed until funds had been found for the empty treasury. He predicts that President Li Yuan Hing's government will be able to weather the present crisis.

The minister presented his resignation to President Li, but the latter refused to accept. Officials who applied at the treasury doors found them locked and the department's employees dismissed.

In announcing that the finance department had ceased to function temporarily Tung Kang said that the government was unable to meet its current expenses, that thousands of government employees were clamoring for back pay, due many months, while the military governors of the provinces were demanding huge sums, ostensibly to pay their troops.

China's finances, said Minister Tung, are hopeless, unless the provinces are compelled to furnish their share of the expenses of the federal government.

FATALLY WOUNDED JAILOR KILLS MAN

JACKSON, Miss., July 19.—Russ Harris, jailer, and Henry Bond, moonshiner, sentenced to hang for the murder of a prohibition agent and a marshal near Richton, were killed in a gun fight in jail here late yesterday. Harris was shot by Bond. Harris then took the pistol away from the prisoner and shot him dead. Harris mortally wounded, walked from the jail to the sheriff's office and expired while telling of the shooting.

COUNTY Y. M. C. A. SUMMER CAMP IS A BIG SUCCESS

Happy, tanned and hard as nails fifty-four boys from different parts of Jackson county rolled into the city Saturday night with all the joys of the big Y. M. C. A. camp behind them. Every one of the company were in the pink of condition and overflowing with good nature. With the exception of the usual few whom the changed environment and an unusual appetite put the test of for a meal or two, and the inevitable victims of more or less poison oak, no illness whatever occurred in camp. No doubt careful attention to the ration was responsible.

From the first burst of the bugle at 6:30 a. m., when the boys rolled out for "setting up" drill, to the final note of "taps" at 9:30 p. m., the days were uniformly filled with activity. The fat boys lost flesh and the lean ones gained, and there is little doubt that every camper returned in better physical condition than when he started.

As is customary with Y. M. C. A. camps, the conduct of the camp had a touch of the military, both to give added interest and to aid in the discipline. On the opening day seven lieutenants were chosen from among the older boys. As many sergeants were also appointed. All adult leaders were ranked as captains. The whole group thus constituted composed the official staff. The remaining campers were then divided into squads and a scout and a sergeant placed in charge of each. Each squad then became responsible for certain duties during the day. Each squad also had their own flag and their own song.

With this somewhat complete organization all camp matters were handled with the least possible friction or dissatisfaction. Cases of insubordination were very few and were promptly dealt with. Penalties for infraction of the camp rules took the form of extra detail work, such as handling the pick and shovel in the warm sun for a few hours to provide a garbage hole, or building an extra table, helping to wash the pots and pans, etc. It is only fair to say that small necessity for levying such punishment occurred during the entire camp.

A number of men visited the camp for a day or two, assisting with the Bible study classes and in other ways.

One of the features of the camp was the nightly camp-fire. Songs, talks by the visitors, announcements and the not-to-be-forgotten stunt night, made these occasions to be held in memory. The Daily Camp Flag was published and read by the editor, Harold (Professor) Sharn.

Fishermen among the campers were fairly successful. The swimming was ideal. With a daily instruction hour for the uninitiated, a good number of the boys were taught to swim. Fithos, baseball, volleyball, quoits all had their enthusiasts.

Special mention should be made of the service of Mr. J. I. Thomas of Medford, who was present for the whole period of ten days and by constant hard work and uniform good nature helped to make the camp a success. Mr. Homer Billings of Ashland during the last five days had a vital part in the conduct of the camp also. Mr. Lester Newberry of Talent was also of great assistance in getting camp set up and in running order.

Credit should be given to the dozen or so men who used their autos to get the boys to camp and to the people who loaned tents and other equipment. Friends will be glad to know that the \$5.00 charged each boy will probably cover all expense.

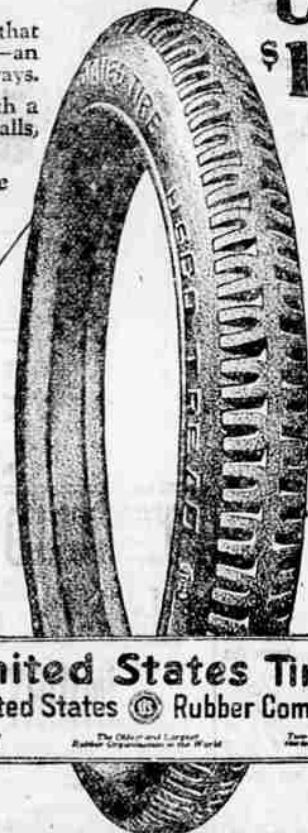

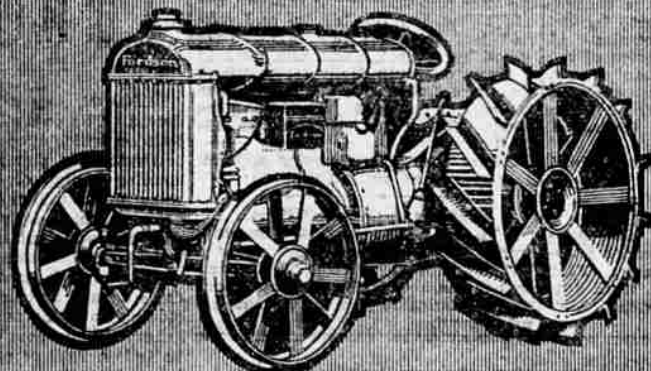

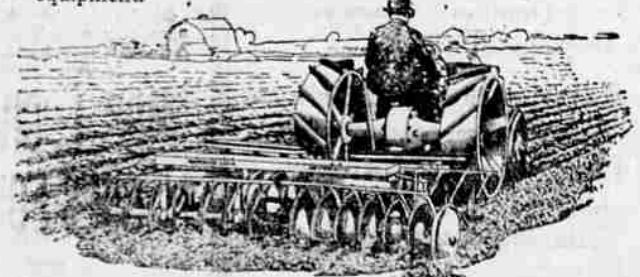
